News Media Information

KINNICK STADIUM is located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes' drive from Interstate 80 and the lowa City airport, about 30 minutes from the Cedar Rapids airport.

PRESSBOX at the stadium is on the west side and accessible by elevator. One of the nation's finest, it was completed in 1958 at a cost of \$490,000 (cost to build Kinnick Stadium was \$500,000 in 1929). The first deck has 89 seats for working press. The second deck contains ten booths for radio and television. The third and four levels have photo and radio booths and VIP areas. A pregame lunch is served on the first and second decks. The pressbox is 100 feet high and extends between the 25-yard lines.

PRESS TICKET requests should be directed to George Wine, sports information director. Requests should be filed early enough in advance to allow time for processing.

ATHLETIC OFFICES are located on the east side of the Iowa Field House. The Field House is also on the west campus, near the stadium.



The Athletic Director

CHALMERS (BUMP) ELLIOTT is in his tenth year as lowa's top athletic administrator. He was appointed to the position June 11, 1970, and oversees a staff of 40 men, 11 intercollegiate sports, and a large physical plant.



Bump's rise through the Big Ten ranks has been punctuated with success at every stop. Highlights of his tenure at lowa include 11 Big Ten championships in four sports plus four NCAA wrestling titles.

Elliott has been personally involved in four Big Ten football titles and four Rose Bowl appearances. He was an assistant coach at Iowa for five years and helped build the Hawkeyes into the power of the Big Ten that began with league and bowl championships in 1956.

lowa won two more Big Ten crowns in the next four years, but Bump was

tapped by his alma mater, Michigan, to join the staff there in 1957. He became head coach two years later, and his term as Wolverine boss was highlighted by conference and Rose Bowl wins in 1964. Elliott's 10-year record was 51-42-2 when he quit coaching after the 1968 season to accept administrative duties. After 18 months as Michigan's associate AD, he became athletic director at Iowa.

Elliott played three sports at Michigan in 1946-47-48. A brilliant halfback, he topped the Big Ten in scoring in 1947 with 54 points and spurred the Wolverines to Big Ten and Rose Bowl championships. He led his team in pass receiving and averaged more than five yards a carry. He earned All-America honors, as did his brother Pete, a Michigan quarterback. Bump also played parts of two seasons (1943-44) as a Marine trainee at Purdue. He was selected the Big Ten's MVP in 1947.

Elliott's first coaching job was as an assistant at Oregon State (1948-51). Then he served on the staffs at Iowa (1952-56) and Michigan (1957-58) before becoming head coach there.

Bump is a native of Bloomington, III. His father, Dr. J. Norman Elliott, was a physician there and also coached at Illinois Wesleyan and Northwestern. Bump was discharged from the Marines in 1946 and received his degree at Michigan in 1948. He and his wife Barbara have three children: Bill, Bob, and Betsy. All are married. Bump was born in Detroit January 30, 1925.

The Head Coach

A tall, square-jawed Texan experienced in rebuilding ailing football programs is the man in charge of putting the Hawkeyes back on their feet. Hayden Fry was appointed Iowa's football coach December 9, 1978, bringing with him 17 years of head-coaching experience at the major college level.


Considered by his colleagues a daring and innovative coach, Fry appears to be the ideal candidate to pump new life into the Hawkeyes, who haven't had a winning season since 1961. He believes he can make lowa a competitive, colorful, tough, and exciting team. His achievements at Southern Methodist and North Texas State would indicate those are not idle promises.

Both schools were in the doldrums when Fry arrived, but it didn't take him long to perk things up. At SMU, where he coached 11 years (1962-72), Hayden put the Mustangs in three bowl games with a freewheeling, wide-open style of football.

In 1963, his second season, SMU received a Sun Bowl invitation. His 1966 team won the Southwest Conference championship with an 8-3 record, which is still SMU's best season since 1948. That team played in the Cotton Bowl.

Fry took his team in 1968 to the Bluebonnet Bowl, where it whipped Oklahoma, thus making him the only coach who has had teams in the three major bowls in Texas. His record at SMU was 49-66-1 and he was athletic director his last nine years at the school.

Hayden was coach and AD for six years at North Texas (1973-78), inheriting a sick program and making it a big winner (33-11) in his final four years there. Included were seasons of 10-1 in 1977 and 9-2 in 1978, the fourth best



record in the nation during that twoyear period.

His record at North Texas, which won only seven games in the four seasons prior to his arrival, was 40-23-3. His entire North Texas staff accompanied him to lowa.

Hayden has a 17-year head coaching record of 89-89-4, an excellent worksheet considering he started at ground zero at both SMU and North Texas. He has the reputation of being an offensive-minded coach, which is well earned. His 1968 SMU team, for instance, went to Ohio State and put the ball in the air 76 times! That's still an NCAA record for most passes in one game.

Fry likes to open up his offense and use a bit of razzle-dazzle, but he believes that success starts with sound defense. His 1978 North Texas team proved that, winning nine games and leading the nation in three defensive categories: interceptions, return yardage, and take aways.

Named the Texas College Coach of the Year four times, Hayden broke the color barrier in the Southwest Conference when he recruited Jerry Levias, a black wide receiver, at SMU. He has attracted outstanding assistants, including Bum Phillips, now head coach of the Houston Oilers.

A second cousin of the late President Lyndon B. Johnson, Fry has served many years on the UPI coaches panel and is active in the American College Football Coaches Association. He has coached in several postseason all-star games, including the Hula Bowl, the East-West Shrine Game, and the Blue-Gray Game.

A native of Odessa, Texas, Hayden was an all-state quarterback there and led his team to the 1946 Texas high school championship. He was named most valuable player at the Texas prep all-star game that year and enrolled at Baylor, where he played four years (1947-50). He quarterbacked the Bears to a 26-13 record and earned a degree in psychology in 1951.

Fry was a player-coach with the Quantico Marines (he reached the rank of captain), head coach in his hometown of Odessa three years (1956-58), assistant to John Bridgers at Baylor two seasons (1959-60), and an aide to Frank Broyles at Arkansas in 1961 before moving to SMU as head coach.

An entertaining public speaker, Hayden has made nearly 100 appearances before various groups since he arrived in Iowa. He was born in Eastland, Texas, February 28, 1929. His wife's name is Shirley and he is the father of four sons—Randy, Zach, Kelly, and Adrian—and a daughter, Robin. Randy, Zach, and Kelly played for him at North Texas.

Quoting Hayden

These comments were made by Hayden Fry at his first lowa press conference.

"If I didn't sincerely believe that lowa can win in the near future I wouldn't have left a ball club that was 19-3 the last two years. I know this will be a tough job but that's been my life. I have a world of experience related to situations similar to this."

"I've been shot at and hit many times in my coaching career. You might say I have been around the horn."

"We are prepared to compete with people who have been winning in the Big Ten as long as it is ethical and within the rules."

"The one question I always have my coaches and players ask themselves is: 'Will this help us win?' If the answer is yes, then do it!" "When you take over a program that's been down, you have to plow up some snakes and kill 'em."

"I believe in treating a player like a king until he shows me he's a bum. My players will be representatives of this University that people can be proud of."

"We run a multiple offense similar to that of the Dallas Cowboys. We may throw 50 passes a game. We may run the statue of liberty play out of our end zone. We may line up with only one player behind center. But we don't overlook the main objective, which is to win."

"We'll take what the other teams give us. We'll scratch where it itches."

"I can't get over the attitude of the people in this state. They really love their University. The number of fans that show up for football games here is amazing."

Coaching Staff

Barry Alvarez Tight Ends



A former all-Big Eight linebacker at Nebraska, Alvarez coached Mason City to the 1978 Iowa AAAA state title. He joined the Iowa staff in 1979

after three years at Mason City. He also coached at Lincoln, Nebraska, and Lexington, Nebraska, and has a high school career record of 37-13. He has been named coach of the year in both Iowa and Nebraska. He played in the Orange and Sugar Bowls while at Nebraska and in the postseason Blue-Gray and Senior Bowl games in 1968. Barry and his wife Cindy have two daughters and a son. Born 12/30/46.

Bill Brashier Defensive Coordinator and Defensive Backs



A veteran defensive coach, he spent 11 years on the North Texas State staff, the last six under Hayden Fry. He has been a head coach at high

schools in San Antonio and Freer, Texas. He was a three-year starter at North Texas State as a defensive back, quarterback, and punter. He still holds the school record for pass interceptions with 19. His 10 interceptions during the 1951 season is also a school record. He holds two degrees from North Texas State. A navy veteran, Bill and his wife Ann have two sons (Randy and Scott) and a daughter (Lee Ann). Born 5/30/29.

Tom Cecchini Linebackers



A native of Detroit, he is a former Michigan all-American who played for Bump Elliott. He coached at lowa in 1974-75-78, the last year as de-

fensive coordinator. He served two years as defensive coordinator at Tulane. He was head football coach at Xavier University for two years after serving two years there as an assistant. He was freshman coach at Michigan for four years. He played in the North-South all-star game and was twice named national lineman of the week. He holds two degrees from Michigan. He and his wife Lynn have two boys (David and Jason). Born 9/12/46.

Howard Cissell Defensive Ends



A former Canadian pro player who was with Hayden Fry six years at North Texas State before joining Fry at Iowa. He played for three years

with the Montreal Alouettes and was named all-CFL one season. He has a total of ten years as a high school head coach in Arkansas. He lettered four years in football and track as a halfback and hurdler at Arkansas State. He holds degrees from Arkansas State and the State College of Arkansas. He and his wife Jane are the parents of two sons (Howard and Jon) and a daughter (Deanna). Born 8/21/36.

Clovis Hale Offensive Line



A native of Roscoe, Texas, he joined Hayden Fry at Iowa after spending one year on the North Texas State staff. He served as head foot-

ball coach at Lake View high school in San Angelo, Texas for five years. He has served apprenticeships under Baylor Coach Grant Teaff and Texas Coach Fred Akers. He lettered twice at McMurry College (Texas) and was named the team's outstanding lineman his senior year. He and his wife Jean have two sons (Joe Bill and Dusty). Born 10/23/41.

Dan McCarney Tight Ends



A cocaptain at Iowa in 1974, he joined the Hawkeye staff in 1977. He was an offensive guard at Iowa and was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons.

He served as a graduate assistant at lowa before joining the full-time staff. He lettered three times at lowa. He holds a degree from lowa and is a bachelor. Born 7/28/53.

Bill Snyder Offensive Coordinator, Quarterbacks-Receivers



A native of Saint Joseph, Missouri, Snyder is a graduate of William Jewel College in Missouri. He was an honorable mention all-American as a de-

fensive back. He joined Hayden Fry at lowa after spending three years with him at North Texas State. He served as offensive coordinator and swimming coach at Austin (Texas) College. He was a head high school coach for five years in California. He served as a graduate assistant under John McKay at Southern Cal. He holds degrees from William Jewell and Eastern New Mexico. He is the father of a son (Sean) and two daughters (Shannon and Meredith). Born 10/7/41.

Carl Jackson Running Backs



A former collegiate academic all-American, Jackson joined Hayden Fry at Iowa after three years at North Texas State. He served as a high

school coach in Port Arthur and Aldine, Texas. A four-year letterman in football, basketball, and track as a prep in Bay City, Texas, he went on to collegiate stardom at Prairie View A&M. He placed third nationally (NAIA) in the long jump in 1961 and second in 1962. He holds two degrees from Prairie View A&M. He and his wife Doris have a son (Carl) and a daughter (Cheryl). Born 8/16/40.

Hall of Fame Hawkeyes

Eleven men who have been associated with Iowa football are members of the Hall of Fame, named by the National Football Foundation and/or the Helms Athletic Foundation.

Six men have been named to the Halls of both foundations: Howard Jones, coach; Nile Kinnick, player; Gordon Locke, player; Fred (Duke) Slater, player; Dr. Edward Anderson, coach; Edward (Slip) Madigan, coach.

Four men have been named to the Hall of the Helms Foundation: Calvin Jones, player; Ossie Solem, coach; Emlen Tunnell, professional player; Eric Wilson, publicist. Aubrey Devine was named to the NFF Hall as a player.

Retired Numbers

Numbers 24 and 62 have been retired at Iowa to honor the players who last wore them. Nile Kinnick was No. 24 with the legendary Ironmen of 1939. The versatile halfback was concensus all-America, a Phi Beta Kappa scholar and recipient of the Heisman Trophy. Guard Calvin Jones wore No. 62 while earning all-America honors three times and winning the Outland Trophy in 1955. Both Kinnick and Jones died in airplane crashes.

DEFENSE

The Outlook

It won't require an expert to notice that Iowa's 1979 football team has undergone a severe face-lifting. Nothing about the Hawkeyes will look the same. Even the uniforms will be different.

Hayden Fry is the man responsible for the change. He comes to lowa with 17 years of head-coaching experience at Southern Methodist and North Texas State and a reputation for keeping fans on the edge of their seats. He has junked a conservative approach that produced two 1978 lowa victories and installed his wide-open, pass-on-anydown style of play.

Hayden will spread his attack from one side of the campus to the other, using more sets than you see in a novice bridge game. The Hawkeyes will only pass when they have the ball. Defensively Fry uses blitzes, stunts, and slants. He likes reckless football.

Whether this fresh approach will give lowa immediate football improvement is questionable in light of heavy personnel losses and a wicked schedule. But it should be fun to watch.

The defense was hit especially hard by graduation, but Hayden beefed up his first recruiting class at Iowa with ten junior college transfers. The Hawkeyes are forever fighting a brutal schedule, which this year includes five 1978 bowl entries plus Big Ten cochamp Michigan State, banned from postseason play by an NCAA probation.

"We probably have the toughest schedule in America," says Fry. "We are also very short on depth and speed. But our players demonstrated a tremendous attitude in spring practice. They have a great desire to win.

"Hey, don't ever count us out. We have the type of offense and defense that can make things happen on any Saturday. When we get hot, we have a chance. We'll play a very aggressive defense and a wide-open offense. We are approaching the season with a very positive attitude, although the odds will be overwhelming at times."

THE OFFENSE: The Hawkeyes had serious problems last season, once going 15 quarters without scoring a touchdown. But the only key loss was fullback Jon Lazar, and the offense stayed ahead of the defense in spring practice. "The first time that's happened in my 27 years of coaching," says Fry.

The story here may be at quarterback, where Hayden plugged a hole by inserting a 6-5 left-hander, Phil Suess, who languished on the scout squad last fall. Suess maintained a firm grip on No. 1 all spring and was impressive in the final squad game, hitting 28 of 45 passes for 378 yards and three touchdowns. If he keeps the job he will have beaten out two veterans, Jeff Green and Pete Gales, plus two jucos who each threw for more than 2,000 yards last season, Tony Ricciardulli and Gordy Bohannan.

There is an abundance of good receivers, including Brad Reid, the leading scorer and MVP last season. Other

wideouts include Mike Brady, top receiver two years ago, and Keith Chappelle, who led the juco ranks with 70 catches in 1978. Two-year starter Jim Swift and Jeff Davis make tight end a solid position. "The strongest segment of our ball club is wide receiver," says Fry.

Tailback Dennis Mosley, a speedy senior, had an exceptional spring and has strong support in Phil Blatcher and Kenny Burke, both sophomores. Dean McKillip has taken charge at fullback. Veteran backs Tommy Renn and Dennis Martin missed spring drills while injuries mended. The interior line has quality players, and the best are center Jay Hilgenberg and Sam Palladino. "The potential is there for a fine offensive line," says Hayden. "And we have some speed at tailback."

THE DEFENSE: After steady improvement, the Hawkeyes were disappointing last year and finished near the bottom of most Big Ten defensive statistics. To compound the problem, eight starters are missing. The defensive front was especially hard hit. "We have a lot of new players and we're changing the defensive front from a 4-3 to a 5-2," says Fry. "We have also changed pass coverage from man-to-man to zone."

Pass coverage was a problem the past two seasons, but the new staff believes the secondary is the most improved segment of the team. Veteran cornerbacks Cedric Shaw and Mario Pace impressive throughout spring were drills. Mike Jackson returns after a redshirt season to play strong safety. Lou King, Bobby Stoops, and Jim Frazier make free safety look like a strong position. The Ellis twins, Kevin and Kent, are versatile veterans. "These youngsters have the potential to put together a very good secondary," says Hayden.

Defensive end is manned by three

good athletes: Jim Molini, Bryan Skradis, and Bill Bradley. The picture is not as bright at linebacker, where Todd Simonsen and Leven Weiss are the best prospects. "We believe we have three excellent defensive ends," says Fry. "Linebacking, however is a big concern and will receive priority when fall drills begin."

Tackle John Harty won all-Big Ten honors as a freshman but was slowed by injuries last year. Other top candidates are veteran Mark Mahmens and juco transfer Ron Hallstrom. Noseguard is handled by Pat Dean, a converted defensive end, and Don Willey, a former offensive guard. "These two positions showed a lot of progress late in the spring, enough to give us encouragement that we can have a good defensive line," says Hayden.

KICKING GAME: This is in good shape with the return of veterans Dave Holsclaw and Scott Schilling. Holsclaw did all the kicking (punts, placements, and kickoffs) two years ago and punted last season while Schilling handled the other duties. Both will be pressed by Reggie Roby, a high school all-American with a powerful leg. "Roby will have an impact," predicts Fry. "Our kicking game at the end of spring practice was in good shape, although we must improve punting against the wind."





- 1900—A share of the conference championship highlighted another unbeaten season.
- 1901—Loss to Minnesota ended string of 23 games without defeat.
- 1921—First unbeaten and untied team (7-0) was coached by Howard Jones and won clear Big Ten title.
- 1922—Another perfect season (7-0) included share of conference crown with Michigan.
- 1923—Loss to Illinois ended string of 20 straight victories.
- 1929—Suspended from Big Ten for one year.
- 1939—Dr. Eddie Anderson coached the Iron Men, led by halfback Nile Kinnick, recipient of the Heisman Trophy, the Maxwell Award, and the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1952—Forest Evashevski named head coach.
- 1955—Guard Cal Jones received the Outland Award.
- 1956—Won the Big Ten and appeared in Rose Bowl for the first time. Finished 9-1 in all games and beat Oregon State at Pasadena.
- 1957—Tackle Alex Karras received the Outland Award.

- 1958—Big Ten champions again and made California a victim in the Rose Bowl. Honors included No. 1 ranking by the Football Writers and Grantland Rice trophy by Look Magazine. Led the nation in total offense. Quarterback Randy Duncan was named the Helms Foundation Player of the Year and received the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1960—Shared the Big Ten title with Minnesota. Evashevski quit coaching to devote full time to the athletic directorship after the completion of 8-1 season.
- 1961—Shutout by Purdue ended string of 78 games in which one or more touchdowns were scored.
- 1963—Notre Dame game was canceled following the assassination of President Kennedy.
- 1964—Some 28 Iowa and Big Ten records were broken despite 3-6 season.
- 1968—Big Ten scoring and total-offense marks set by Hawkeyes.
- 1969—Black boycott disrupted spring practice.
- 1972—Iowa Stadium was renamed Kinnick Stadium in honor of Iowa's Heisman Trophy winner of 1939. AstroTurf was installed.
- 1978—Hayden Fry named head coach Dec. 9.

Herky and the Hawkeyes

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawkeye was originally applied to a hero in a fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Author Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived and hunted with them.



In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of lowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James G. Edwards of Ft. Madison. Edwards, editor of the Ft. Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawk-Eye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name and were rewarded when territorial officials gave it their formal approval.


The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawk, was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism. The impish hawk was an immediate hit and he acquired a name through a state-wide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 30 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot with a black leather head and gold felt feathers. Since then Herky has become a familiar figure at Hawkeye athletic events.

Floyd of Rosedale


A bet in 1935 between Minnesota Governor Floyd B. Olson and Iowa Governor Clyde Herring gave birth to Floyd of Rosedale. Tensions between the two state universities had been running high and a wager was made in an effort to relieve the situation. After lowa lost the game, Herring presented Olson with Floyd of Rosedale, a fullblooded champion pig and a brother of Blue Boy of Will Rogers's movie, "State Fair." Olson presented the pig to the University of Minnesota and commissioned St. Paul sculptor Charles Brioscho to capture Floyd's image. The result is a bronze pig 21 inches long and 15 inches high. Floyd currently resides in Minneapolis as a result of last year's Minnesota victory.
