THE SERIES - - This is the 35th game in the series and Iowa has a 17-15-2 lead. The Hawkeyes won the last game between the two schools (21-16) last year in Iowa City. The Spartans' last win came in 1999 (49-3) at East Lansing. Iowa has won four of the last five meetings between the two teams. Iowa has an 8-7-1 record in games played at Michigan State.

COACHING RECORDS - - Kirk Ferentz is in his sixth year as a college head coach and his third year at Iowa. His career record is 19-41 and he's 7-20 at Iowa. He is 1-1 against Michigan State. Bobby Williams is in his second year as a head coach and has a career record of 8-7. He is 0-1 against Iowa.

IOWA ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Iowa (3-1, 1-1) will play its second consecutive road game Saturday, when the Hawkeyes travel to Michigan State (2-1, 0-1) for MSU's Homecoming. Game time is 11:10 a.m. CT in Spartan Stadium (72,027). The game is sold out.

ON THE TUBE

ESPN2 will televise the contest to a national cable audience. Mark Jones, Chris Spielman and Holly Rowe will call the action.

RADIO BROADCAST

Iowa games are broadcast on the Hawkeye Radio Network. Gary Dolphin handles the play-by-play, with color commentator Ed Podolak and sideline reporter Mark Allen. The Hawkeye Radio Network includes more than 50 stations throughout the state.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,019 games since beginning football in 1889. Overall Iowa's record is 505-475-39 (.515). That includes a 320-190-16 (.623) record in home games, a 185-285-23 (.399) record in games away from Iowa City, a 242-320-25 (.434) mark in Big Ten games and a 202-156-15 (.562) record in Kinnick Stadium.

RESULTS TO DATE

Iowa opened the season with a 51-0 win over Kent State, defeated Miami, OH 44-19 and Penn State 24-18 before a 23-14 loss at Purdue. Michigan State opened the season with wins over Central Michigan (35-21) and Notre Dame (17-10) before a 27-26 loss at Northwestern. Iowa's contest at Iowa State, originally slated for Sept. 15, has been rescheduled for Nov. 24.

IN THE RANKINGS

Both Iowa and Michigan State are listed among teams receiving votes in the ESPN/USA Today coaches poll. The Spartans are also receiving votes in the Associated Press poll.

ON THIS DATE

Iowa is 9-4 when playing on October 6. The Hawkeyes defeated Wisconsin 30-10 in 1990, Purdue 40-3 in 1984, Northwestern 58-6 in 1979, Indiana 14-10 in 1962, Wisconsin 13-7 in 1956, Pittsburgh 34-17 in 1951, Chicago 13-0 in 1928 and Cornell College 60-0 in 1894. Iowa lost to Northwestern 31-15 in 1973, to Purdue 40-0 in 1945, to Ohio State 7-6 in 1929 and to Nebraska 47-0 in 1917.

Michigan State will be celebrating Homecoming this weekend. MSU holds an all-time record of 55-27-3 in Homecoming games, including a 4-1 record vs. Iowa. Iowa was also the MSU Homecoming opponent on its last visit to East Lansing in 1999 when the Spartans recorded a 49-3 win. Iowa recorded a 21-7 win at MSU in 1995 to spoil Homecoming festivities.

HAWKEYE HUDDLE AT MSU

The National I-Club and the UI Alumni Association invite all Iowa fans to the "Hawkeye Huddle" Saturday morning prior to the Michigan State game. The "Hawkeye Huddle" will be held at the Michigan State Union, located at Grand River Avenue at Abbot in East Lansing. The Huddle will be held from 9-10:30 a.m. Saturday. The free reception features snacks, refreshments, Hawk Shop door prizes, Herky, and the Iowa cheerleaders.

INDIANA GAME TIME SET

Iowa's will host Indiana in its next home game. Kickoff is set for 11:10 a.m. and the game will be broadcast by ESPN Plus.

Coach Kirk Ferentz

Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) is in his third season as Iowa's head football coach. Ferentz and the Hawkeyes posted a 3-9 record in 2001, winning two of the final three games of the season while playing one of the strongest schedules in the nation. Ferentz, at Iowa, holds a record of 7-20 and in five seasons as a college head coach his career mark is 19-41.



Ten of Iowa's 27 games in the last two seasons have been decided by seven points or less and 13 of the 27 were played against opponents who were ranked in the top 25 at the time.

Ferentz, 46, joined the Iowa staff after serving as assistant head coach and offensive line coach of the Baltimore Ravens of the National Football League. He had been part of the Baltimore (Cleveland Browns prior to the move) staff for six years.

Ferentz was named head coach of the Maine Bears in 1990 and held that position for three years. Ferentz was a member of Hayden Fry's Iowa staff for nine years as offensive line coach (1981-89). He coordinated Iowa's running game during his coaching stint with the Hawkeyes. Iowa appeared in eight bowl games during the time Ferentz was an Iowa assistant. A pair of Rose Bowls (1982 & 1986), two Holiday Bowl appearances (1986 & 1987) and a pair of Peach Bowl visits (1982 & 1988), along with appearances in the Gator (1983) and Freedom Bowls (1984) highlighted his previous Iowa stay. Iowa's record in those nine years was 73-33-4 and included two 10-win and two nine-win seasons.

Ferentz was born in Royal Oak, MI and attended high school in Pittsburgh, PA. Kirk earned his bachelor's degree in English Education from the University of Connecticut in 1978, where he was a football captain.

Ferentz is 1-1 vs. Michigan State and 1-0 vs. Spartan Coach Bobby Williams.

MSU COACH BOBBY WILLIAMS

Bobby Williams is in his second season as the Michigan State head coach, taking over the Spartans prior to their Citrus Bowl win at the end of the 1999 season. Williams is 8-7 as a head coach, all at Michigan State. Williams is in his 12th season at Michigan State, having served 10 years as the MSU running backs coach. Williams has also coached at Purdue, Ball State, Eastern Michigan and Kansas. Williams was a four-year letterman as a running back and defensive back at Purdue. Williams is 0-1 vs. Iowa and Hawkeye Coach Kirk Ferentz.

THE SERIES

Iowa holds a 17-15-2 advantage in the series that began with a 21-7 Michigan State win in 1953. The Hawkeyes have won four of the last five meetings with MSU, including a 21-16 decision last season during Iowa's Homecoming activities. Iowa holds an 8-7-1 advantage in games played at East Lansing, including a split of four games in the 1990's. The Spartans won 49-3 in 1999 when Iowa last visited Spartan Stadium, spoiling the Big Ten debut of Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz. Here are the series results:

THE LAST MEETING

Iowa drove 84 yards in 11 plays in the final quarter for the game-winning touchdown as the Hawkeyes celebrated Homecoming with a 21-16 win over 25th-ranked Michigan State. Starting from its own 16-yardline following a blocked field goal attempt, Iowa scored the winning points on a 43-yard pass from Jon Beutjer to Kevin Kasper with 2:47 remaining.

After opening the game with a 75-yard scoring drive, the Iowa offense struggled until its final, game-winning drive. Trailing 16-7, the Hawkeyes got a big lift from the special teams when Kahlil Hill answered a Michigan State touchdown with a 90-yard kickoff return, closing the gap to 16-14 late in the third period. Beutjer led the Iowa offense by completing 17-25 passes for 146 yards and one TD, while RB Ladell Betts rushed 24 times for 88 yards.

DE Aaron Kampman, who had 16 tackles, a pass interception and a blocked field goal, led the Hawkeye defense and was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week. LB LeVar Woods had 10 tackles and an interception and DT Jerry Montgomery had nine tackles. Montgomery also blocked an MSU PAT and tipped the pass that was intercepted by Woods, following Iowa's final touchdown.

Purdue 27, Iowa 14

Purdue rallied for 10 points in the fourth quarter to take a 23-14 win over Iowa last weekend in West Lafayette. Iowa took a 14-13 advantage late in the third quarter on a seven-yard pass from Kyle McCann to Kahlil Hill. But Purdue rallied to take a 20-14 advantage with 12:07 to play and the Boilermakers secured the win on a 37-yard field goal with 1:38 left in the game.

Iowa's first score of the game came in the first quarter when McCann completed an eight-yard scoring pass to FB Jeremy Allen. That tied the score at 7-7 as Purdue had scored on an 86-yard interception return. The Boilermakers led 13-7 at halftime after field goals of 39 and 42 yards. Iowa trailed at halftime despite holding Purdue to two first downs and 58 yards total offense over the first two periods. Purdue ended the game with 217 yards total offense. Iowa recorded 14 tackles for loss in holding Purdue to a season low in total offense.

Iowa's third quarter scoring drive of 69 yards was set up by an interception and 19-yard return by DB Bob Sanders. Sanders and LB Fred Barr led Iowa's defense with 15 tackles each.

McCann led the Iowa offense by completing 21-32 passes for 167 yards and two TDs, but the Iowa ground game was held to 33 net yards. WR C.J. Jones had six catches for 77 yards and WR Kahlil Hill had seven receptions for 43 yards. The yardstick:

IOWA, MSU NOTES

• The contest at Michigan State is one of two Iowa will play this season on artificial turf, the other being Northwestern. Iowa last season was 0-3 in games played on artificial turf.

• Iowa defensive coordinator Norm Parker was the defensive coordinator at Michigan State from 1983-94.

• Phil Parker, Iowa's defensive backs coach, earned all-Big Ten honors as a Michigan State defensive back from 1983-86 and he was a graduate assistant at MSU in 1987.

• MSU assistant Pat Perles is the son of former MSU Coach George Perles. Pat Perles played at MSU at the same time Iowa assistant Phil Parker was on the squad and Perles coached with Parker for three seasons at Toledo.

• MSU assistant coaches Morris Watts (1965-71) and Bill Miller (1981-82) were previously assistant coaches at Drake University in Des Moines, while MSU assistant Sal Sunseri was an assistant coach at Iowa Wesleyan in 1993.

• Iowa's win over Michigan State last season came during Iowa's Homecoming weekend and marked the first Big Ten Conference win for Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz.

• Iowa's roster includes six players from Michigan, including FB Robbie Crockett, WR Kahari Stewart, QB Matt Bohnet, RB Fred Russell, TE Andy Thorn and TE Tony Jackson. Stewart and Bohnet are true freshmen, while the other four players have seen action for the Hawkeyes this season.

• Iowa and Michigan State have both defeated teams from the Mid-America Conference this season, Iowa defeating Kent State and Miami and the Spartans defeating Central Michigan.

FINAL GAME NOTES

The interception by Purdue in the first quarter was just the second this year thrown by QB Kyle McCann (McCann had another tipped pass intercepted in the fourth quarter).

Purdue in the second quarter became the second team to score a field goal against Iowa without gaining any yards on the drive. Purdue lost two yards before a 39-yard field goal gave the Boilermakers a 10-7 advantage. In Iowa's win over Penn State, PSU recovered an Iowa fumble at the Iowa 20 and gained no yards before kicking a field goal.

Purdue's touchdown drive in the fourth was just the second touchdown drive allowed by Iowa's first team defense in four games. Penn State, with a 90-yard drive in the third quarter, is the only other team to score a touchdown against Iowa's first defensive unit. Purdue's other touchdown came on an interception return.

IOWA INJURY REPORT

DB Chris Smith and OL Andy Lightfoot have each missed Iowa's last two games, although Smith did make the trip to Purdue. Smith and Lightfoot both started Iowa's first two games of the season.

OL Alonzo Cunningham, who saw his first action of the season vs. Penn State, missed his third game of the season when he sat out the contest at Purdue.

SPARTANS WERE IDLE

Michigan State was idle last weekend after a 27-26 loss at Northwestern Sept. 29. Michigan State had taken a 26-24 lead over the Wildcats with 18 seconds remaining on an 84yard kickoff return by Herb Haygood. MSU's PAT kick was blocked, allowing Northwestern to win with a field goal. Following the kickoff, Northwestern used a 54-yard pass play from Zak Kustok to Jon Schweighardt to get in field goal position and David Wasielewski booted a 47-yard field goal to give the Wildcats the win as time expired. Along with Haygood's kickoff return, Charles Rogers had a 64-yard punt return for a score. MSU's T.J. Duckett rushed for 104 yards in the game and QB Ryan Van Dyke completed 19-31 passes for 233 yards.

DEFENSE MAKING A STAND

Iowa's defense has been much improved in the first four games of the season. Iowa held Purdue's high-powered offense to just one touchdown and two field goals as the Boilermakers had just 217 yards total offense (Purdue's other touchdown came on an interception return). The Boilermakers had just two first downs and 58 total yards in the first half. Iowa recorded 14 tackles for loss at Purdue. The Boilermakers gained more than 15 yards and ran more than five plays on just three of 16 possessions.

The Hawkeyes recorded a shutout in the opening win over Kent State and led 44-0 vs. Miami before the RedHawks scored 19 points in the second half. Iowa held Miami to no pass completions and just 26 yards total offense in the first half. Miami gained 226 of its 338 total yards in the final 22 minutes of the game after Iowa led 44-0.

Against Penn State, the defense again played better than the score might indicate. Penn State had one 90-yard scoring drive in the third quarter and one 58-yard drive in the first quarter that resulted in a missed field goal. PSU's other nine drives covered 25 yards or less and none lasted more than six plays. Penn State scored a touchdown on a blocked punt, a safety on an Iowa fumble in the endzone and a field goal after recovering an Iowa fumble at the Iowa 20-yardline.

The Iowa defense has come up with eight turnovers in four games, with nine QB sacks and 33 pass break-ups. In four games, Iowa opponents have gained less than 20 yards on 32 of 49 possessions.

PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

Senior QB Kyle McCann was named co-offensive Player of the Week in the Big Ten Conference for his play in Iowa's Sept. 8 win over Miami, OH. McCann completed 13-16 passes for 201 yards and career-high four touchdowns.

Sophomore PK Nate Kaeding was named special teams Player of the Week for his play in Iowa's win over Kent State. Kaeding made all three of his field goal attempts and added 6-6 PATs, setting a school record with 15 kicking points.

IOWA LEADERSHIP COUNCIL

Iowa's Leadership Council for the 2001 season includes 13 players, including five seniors, three juniors, two sophomores, two redshirt freshmen and one true freshman. Permanent team captains are named at the conclusion of each season.

The Leadership Council for 2001 includes seniors Ladell Betts, Aaron Kampman, Kyle McCann, Roger Meyer and Matt Stockdale, juniors Dallas Clark, Siaka Massaquoi and Bruce Nelson, sophomores Sam Aiello and Jared Clauss, redshirt freshmen Sean Considine and Aaron Mickens and true freshman Abdul Hodge.

KAEDING DOES THE KICKING

Sophomore kicker Nate Kaeding connected on a 47-yard field goal in the win over Penn State after having one attempt blocked in the first quarter. Kaeding had made a school-record 11 straight field goals before that block.

Kaeding has made 19-28 career field goal attempts, including 9-12 from outside 40 yards, and 36-37 PATs. Kaeding made the first 30 PATs of his career before missing against Miami earlier this season.

Kaeding set an Iowa single game record with 15 kicking points in Iowa's win over Kent State, hitting three field goals and six PATs. Kaeding leads Iowa with 31 points in four games and was named Big Ten special teams Player of the Week for his efforts in the win over Kent State.

Kaeding, in Iowa's win over Penn State in 2000, tied the Iowa single game record with four field goals.

KAEDING ON LOU GROZA WATCH LIST

Sophomore PK Nate Kaeding is one of 30 pre-season candidates for the 10th annual Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award. The award is presented in early December. A list of 20 semi-finalists will be announced in late October and three finalists will be named in November. Kaeding is one of five sophomores on the early list.

BETTS LEADS RUSHING ATTACK

Iowa RB Ladell Betts scored his first two touchdowns of the season in the first half of Iowa's win over Penn State. Betts now had 17 career rushing touchdowns and 108 career points. He is tied for 10th in career rushing TDs and tied for 18th in career points.

Betts rushed 33 times for 95 yards and two scores in the win over Penn State and his career totals now include 679 attempts for 2,863 yards and 17 rushing TDs. Betts had 99 yards on 15 carries in a win over Kent State and his seasons totals include 70 attempts for 237 yards.

Betts, Iowa's leading rusher the last three seasons, ranks second in career rushing attempts and third in rushing yards. He gained 1,090 yards last season, a figure that ranks seventh best for a single season. Betts has rushed for over 100 yards in a game on nine occasions, including four games in 2000, three games in 1999 and two games in 1998. His single-game best of 174 yards was against Northern Illinois in 1999 and he rushed for 154 yards vs. Minnesota last season.

Betts last season became the first Hawkeye to rush for over 1,000 yards since Tavian Banks set the single-season record of 1,691 yards in 1997 and the ninth Iowa player ever to gain over 1,000 yards in a season.

Betts, who rushed for 857 yards in 1999, is the fifth Iowa running back to rush for over 800 yards in more than one season. Sedrick Shaw, Iowa's career rushing leader with 4,156 yards is the only Hawkeye player to rush for over 800 yards in three different seasons (1994, 1995, 1996). The others with two seasons of over 800 yards include Tony Stewart (1988, 1990), Ronnie Harmon (1984, 1985), and Eddie Phillips (1982, 1983). Following is a list of Iowa's career rushing leaders:

MCCANN LEADS IOWA OFFENSE

Senior QB Kyle McCann has been very efficient in leading the Iowa offense through the first four games. McCann has completed 62-91 passes for 758 yards and seven touchdowns, with three interceptions. His efficiency rating of 156.9 ranks among the national leaders. McCann had a career-high four TD passes in the win over Miami and he was 16-25 for 225 yards vs. Penn State. He has completed 68.1% of his passes this season after connecting on 21-32 attempts for 167 yards at Purdue.

In leading Iowa to late season wins over Penn State and Northwestern a year ago, McCann passed for 232 yards vs. Penn State and 250 yards vs. Northwestern. The 25 completions at Penn State are a career high for McCann, and

HILL IS ALL-PURPOSE LEADER

WR Kahlil Hill leads Iowa in all-purpose yards (138.8) and he ranks 12th in the nation in KO returns (30.3). Hill had seven catches for 43 yards and one touchdown at Purdue and 76 yards on three kickoff returns. He had 212 all-purpose yards in the win over Penn State, including a 76-yard KO return to start the game and six pass receptions for 83 yards. His four-game receiving totals include 23 catches for 276 yards and three TDs. Hill has at least one pass reception in all 27 games in his career.

Hill's 76-yard KO return to start the Penn State game is the third longest of his career and the 14th longest ever at Iowa. Hill had a 90-yard TD return vs. Michigan State in 2000 and an 88-yard TD return vs. Central Michigan in 1998.

Hill had six receptions for 94 yards in the win over Miami, including a 52-yard scoring reception, and he had a punt return for a score nullified by a holding penalty.

Hill's career receiving totals include 116 catches for 1,327 yards and 10 TDs. He is sixth in career receptions and ranks 16th in receiving yards. In 2000 he became the 25th Iowa receiver with over 600 yards in a season and is the 16th Iowa receiver with over 1,300 career receiving yards. Hill has 1,357 career kickoff return yards and 397 career punt return yards for a total of 2,957 all-purpose yards.

Hill led Iowa in all-purpose yards (121.3 average) last season and ranked among the national leaders in kickoff returns. Hill ranked seventh in the nation with his 27.2 yard average on KO returns and his 9.6 average on punt returns ranked sixth in the Big Ten and 50th nationally.

Hill has two kickoff return touchdowns and two punt return touchdowns in his career. Hill is tied for third place (with 11 others) in Big Ten history with two career KO return touchdowns. The Big Ten record of five is held by Stan Brown of Purdue (1968-70), while former Michigan State player Derrick Mason (1993-96) had three. Here are his career totals:

BARR LEADS IN TACKLES

Junior LB Fred Barr leads Iowa with 45 tackles after four games. Barr led the Hawkeyes with 15 tackles against Purdue and he led Iowa with 13 stops in the win over Penn State. Barr also has recorded five tackles for loss, one QB sack and two pass break-ups. He had 12 solo stops and three tackles for loss at Purdue. The 15 tackles are a career high for Barr, who had 12 tackles last season in consecutive games against Wisconsin and Penn State. Barr has 191 career tackles after recording 74 tackles as a true freshman in 1999 and 72 tackles last season.

KAMPMAN MOVES UP

Senior DL Aaron Kampman has recorded 27 tackles in Iowa's four games, increasing his career total to 273, a figure that ranks 13th best for career stops. Kampman recorded seven tackles in the loss at Purdue and was credited with four QB hurries. In Iowa's win over Penn State Kampman had 10 tackles. Kampman played linebacker his first two seasons at Iowa before moving to defensive end. He leads Iowa with two pass interceptions this year, he ranks fourth in tackles and second in tackles for loss and QB sacks.

CLARK IS TOP TARGET

Sophomore Dallas Clark, playing tight end for the first time this season, leads Iowa in receiving yards with 287 yards on 18 catches, despite having just two catches for 13 yards at

Purdue. Clark had seven catches for 116 yards in the win over Penn State and he had two touchdown receptions in the win over Miami, OH. Clark's biggest play in the win over Penn State may have been late in the game when he came down with Penn State's onside kick to help secure Iowa's win.

Clark, who suffered a broken finger in the season-opener, previously played linebacker before moving to tight end last spring. He is a former walk-on and a native of Livermore, IA. His older brother, Derrik, played linebacker at Iowa State during his college career.

ALLEN SCORES AGAIN

Senior FB Jeremy Allen scored the first touchdown of his career in Iowa's opening win over Kent State. He has added touchdown receptions vs. Miami and Purdue, the first of his career. Allen had a 15-yard reception vs. Miami to cap Iowa's opening drive and an eight-yard reception for Iowa's first score at Purdue. Allen had the best rushing day of his career against Kent State, rushing 12 times for 73 yards and one touchdown. Allen, who has earned multiple all-America honors in track and field, battled through injuries most of last season, rushing just 34 times for 135 yards. This season he has rushed 21 times for 88 yards.

SANDERS MAKES THE STOP

DB Bob Sanders shared Iowa's tackle lead at Purdue, recording 15 tackles, including 10 solo stops. Sanders also had three tackles for loss and a 19-yard interception return that led to Iowa's third quarter touchdown. The interception marked the first theft of his Iowa career and his return was much longer than 19 yards before being reduced by a blocking penalty. Sanders is a sophomore who played last season as a true freshman, starting the final four games of the season. Through four games he is third on the team with 29 tackles, including five tackles for loss, and he has recorded four pass break-ups.

JONES HAS BEST GAME

Junior WR C.J. Jones, in his first season at Iowa after a two-year junior college career, had his best day as a Hawkeye in Iowa's loss at Purdue. Jones, who had just four catches for 35 yards in Iowa's first three games, had six catches for 77 yards against the Boilermakers, including a 37-yard reception on Iowa's third quarter touchdown drive. Jones ranks third on the team with 10 receptions for 112 yards. He is averaging 24.8 yards on four punt returns and he had a 19-yard kickoff return at Purdue. Jones is the cousin of Iowa QB Brad Banks.

GREVING TIES NCAA RECORD

Sophomore RB Aaron Greving tied an NCAA Division I record by scoring a touchdown on three consecutive carries in Iowa's opening win over Kent State. Greving scored on runs of 14, 1 and 26 yards on the first three rushing attempts of his career. Greving saw action last season, but had no rushing attempts.

BANKS GETS ON THE BOARD

QB Brad Banks, in his first season at Iowa after a two-year junior college career, led the Hawkeyes on a scoring drive in his first action in each of Iowa's first two games. Banks led Iowa on a 66-yard scoring drive against Miami that lasted over eight minutes. Banks ended the drive with a five-yard touchdown run with just five seconds left in the half. In three games Banks has rushed 13 times for 45 yards and completed 12-21 passes for 143 yards. Banks did not see action in Iowa's win over Penn State.

PICKENS LEADS UP FRONT

Senior DL Derrick Pickens has played well in Iowa's first four games as the Hawkeyes have proven to be a muchimproved defensive team from a year ago. Pickens in four games has recorded 21 tackles. He leads Iowa with seven

tackles for loss and four QB sacks. He recovered a fumble in the loss at Purdue and also has four QB hurries, one forced fumble and one pass break-up for the season.

HAWKEYES GET FIRST POINTS

Hawkeye players who had not previously reached the endzone scored all six touchdowns in Iowa's win over Kent State. Senior Jeremy Allen scored Iowa's first touchdown and sophomore Aaron Greving followed with three scores. Junior Siaki Massaquoi and sophomore Fred Russell each added a score in the fourth quarter. In addition, QB Brad Banks, TE Dallas Clark and DB Chris Smith scored their first career touchdowns in the win over Miami.

IOWA DEPTH CHART

Iowa's depth chart includes 20 seniors, 13 juniors, 14 sophomores, and three redshirt freshmen. The Hawkeyes have used just one true freshman, linebacker Matt Roth, through the first four games of the season. Iowa used seven true freshmen during the 2000 season.

FIRST TIME STARTERS

Two Iowa players started for the first time in the opening win over Kent State and another was in the starting line-up against Miami. Tight end Dallas Clark and outside linebacker Grant Steen, both native Iowans who joined the program as walk-ons, were in the starting line-up in the opening win, while DB Derek Pagel, also a former walk-on and native Iowan, started the win over Miami.

IOWA NOTES

• Iowa has intercepted four passes and recovered four fumbles in the first four games of the season.

• Iowa's defense has not allowed a first half touchdown through the first four games of the season. Purdue kicked two field goals and Penn State had a field goal and a safety. One of the Purdue field goal drives, and the scoring drive by Penn State in the first half, gained no yards. Purdue's first half touchdown came on an interception return.

• The 33 net rushing yards by Penn State are the fewest allowed by Iowa since Central Michigan rushed for 35 yards in 1998 and the 194 yards total offense is the fewest allowed since Minnesota had 170 yards in 1997. Both totals are the best by an Iowa team under Kirk Ferentz.

• Iowa has started the game on offense in 21 consecutive games and 22 of 27 games under Kirk Ferentz. Iowa opened its first two games with a touchdown drive before having a field goal blocked on its first drive against Penn State.

• Iowa, in its first three games, closed the first half with a scoring drive. The Hawkeyes converted a field goal on the last play of the half vs. Kent State, scored a touchdown with five seconds left vs. Miami and scored a touchdown with 25 seconds remaining vs. Penn State.

• Iowa's total of 95 points in the first two games was the highest two-game total for the Hawkeyes since the 1997 season. Iowa opened that year by scoring 66, 54 and 63 points against Northern Iowa, Tulsa and Iowa State, respectively.

• Iowa averaged 61,123 fans in its six home games in 2000, a figure that ranked 24th in the nation. Through three home games this season Iowa is averaging 61,268 fans.

• For the first time in school history, Iowa in 2000 had a player rush for over 1,000 yards and a player total over 1,000 yards in receptions in the same season. WR Kevin Kasper ended the year with 1,010 receiving yards, while RB Ladell Betts rushed for 1,090 yards.

• Iowa kickers made 81 straight PAT kicks before Nate Kaeding missed one attempt in the win over Miami. That streak included 10 PATs to start this season, 21 in 2000, 19 in 1999, 18 in 1998 and the final 13 PAT kicks of 1997. Iowa kickers had not missed at PAT since 1997. Iowa was one of just three Big Ten teams that did not miss a kicking PAT in 2000.

THEY STARTED THEM ALL

Iowa returns four players who started all 12 games in 2000. That list includes OL Bruce Nelson, RB Ladell Betts, DE Aaron Kampman and DL Jerry Montgomery. In addition, DL Derrick Pickens started 11 and WR Kahlil Hill, OL Alonzo Cunningham and OL Robert Gallery started 10 games.

Betts and Kampman each started all 11 games in 1999. Betts has started 33 straight games and 35 of the last 38 games, Kampman has 30 career starts and Cunningham and Nelson have 27. Iowa had four offensive players (RB Ladell Betts, OL A.J. Blazek, OL Bruce Nelson, WR Kevin Kasper) and five players on defense (DL Aaron Kampman, DL Jerry Montgomery, DL Anthony Herron, LB LeVar Woods, DB Ryan Hansen) start all 12 games in 2000.

<u>RETURNING WITH HONORS</u>

Iowa returns five players who earned all-conference recognition a year ago. Senior RB Ladell Betts, who begins the season ranked third in career rushing yards (2,626), earned honorable mention all-Big Ten honors in 2000 after being a second team selection in 1999.

WR Kahlil Hill returns for his final season after earning honorable mention recognition. The Sporting News named him first team kick returner. Hill averaged 27.2 yards on kickoff returns and 9.6 yards on punt returns and he led the team with 121.3 all-purpose yards per game. Hill was second on the team in receiving with 58 catches for 619 yards and five TDs. Junior OL Bruce Nelson, who has started all 23 Iowa games over the past two seasons, senior DE Aaron Kampman and sophomore DB Bob Sanders were also named honorable mention all-Big Ten a year ago.

TWO EARN FRESHMAN HONORS

PK Nate Kaeding and DB Benny Sapp, were honored for their play as true freshmen during the 2000 season. Sapp was named to the Rivals.com first freshman all-America team, while Kaeding was named to The Sporting News' third freshman all-America squad.

IOWA BY THE NUMBERS

The Hawkeyes return 47 lettermen from last season, including 19 on offense, 27 on defense and one specialist. Iowa returns eight starters on both offense and defense, along with kicker Nate Kaeding.

The list of 47 lettermen includes 12 three-year lettermen, 12 two-year lettermen and 23 one-year lettermen. The roster includes 113 players, including 21 seniors, 23 juniors, 27 sophomores, 21 redshirt freshmen and 21 true freshmen.

EIGHT WERE WALK-ONS

Eight members of Iowa's two-deep joined the program as walk-ons. That list includes offensive linemen Bruce Nelson and Pete Traynor, tight end Dallas Clark, linebacker Grant Steen, defensive lineman Joe Uselman, defensive backs Derek Pagel and Sean Considine and punter Nate Campbell. Nelson, Clark, Steen and Pagel have all started games this season.

IOWA IN THE REDZONE

Iowa scored 14 points by scoring on both drives against Purdue that reached the redzone, scoring two passing touchdowns. Iowa has scored on 16 of 18 drives that have reached the redzone in four games, collecting seven rushing TDs, six passing TDs and three field goals for 100 points. Iowa failed to score twice, due to an interception and a blocked field goal.

In four games, Iowa's opponents have scored on five of seven possessions that have reached the redzone, scoring one rushing TD, one passing TD and three field goals. The two failures occurred due to an interception and a missed field goal.

ON THE AVERAGE

Iowa vs. Purdue averaged 4.3 yards on 29 first down plays, 2.9 yards on 21 second down plays and 1.1 yards on 17 third down plays. In four games Iowa is averaging 6.1 yards on 128 first down plays, 5.0 yards on 86 second down plays, 4.5 yards on 59 third down plays and 5.2 yards on five fourth down plays. Iowa has converted three of five fourth down attempts.

AVERAGE SCORING DRIVES

Iowa's two scoring drives vs. Purdue averaged 9.5 plays, 71.5 yards and 4:18 in elapsed time. Purdue's three scoring drives averaged 7.3 plays, 30.5 yards and 2:26 in elapsed time. In four games Iowa's 21 scoring drives have averaged 7.7 plays, 57.6 yards and 3:19 in elapsed time. Five scoring drives by Iowa's opponents have averaged 7.1 plays, 51.8 yards and 2:32 elapsed time

BIG PLAYS

Iowa had one pass play of over 20 yards vs. Purdue, plus two KO returns of over 20 yards and one punt over 50 yards. In four games Iowa has three running plays, 12 pass plays, four punt returns, one interception return and five kickoff returns over 20 yards, plus five field goals over 30 yards and two punts over 50 yards. Iowa's opponents have had seven passing plays, one running play, three kickoff returns and two interception returns over 20 yards, plus four field goals over 35 yards and five punts over 50 yards.

POINTS OFF TURNOVERS

Iowa scored seven points after collecting one fumble and one interception at Purdue. In four games Iowa has scored 34 points following eight opponent turnovers, including four touchdowns and two field goals.

Iowa has five turnovers in four games and has allowed 10 points following those miscues, a field goal by Penn State and a touchdown on an interception return by Purdue.

Iowa last season scored 36 points following 17 opponent turnovers, while Iowa's opponents scored 72 points following Iowa's 20 turnovers.

BROTHERLY LOVE

Iowa's team includes two sets of brothers. Pete and John Traynor are walk-ons from Milton, WI. Pete is a junior offensive lineman and John is a sophomore defensive lineman. Robert and John Gallery are from Masonville, IA. Robert is a sophomore offensive tackle, while John is a walk-on punter and a true freshman. Another Gallery brother, Nick, was a four-year punter for the Hawkeyes from 1993-96, and Julie Gallery is a member of Iowa's women's track and field squad.

THE HAWKEYES, SIZE WISE

DB Antwan Allen is the lightest Hawkeye at 160 pounds, while the shortest players, at 5-8, include DB Marqueas McLaurin, RB Fred Russell and DB Bob Sanders. OL David Porter is the heaviest Hawkeye at 312 pounds, while the tallest player is 6-8 freshman TE C.J. Barkema. The average Hawkeye player is 6-2 and weighs 234 pounds. That is one half-inch taller and two pounds lighter than the average Iowa player in 2000.

IOWA ON THE TUBE

Iowa's two non-conference games, to begin the 2001 season, were both televised by ESPN Regional. The Iowa State game (postponed till Nov. 24th) would have been televised by ABC Regional. The majority of Iowa's remaining Big Ten Conference games will likely be selected for television coverage. Ten of Iowa's 12 games in 2000 were televised.
