**TELEVISION** -- The game will be televised nationally by ESPN. Announcers will be Steve Levy, Todd Christensen and Dave Ryan.

**2001 RECORDS** -- Iowa is 3-0 after home wins over Kent State (51-0), Miami-Ohio (44-19) and Penn State (24-18). Purdue is 3-0 after wins over Cincinnati (19-14), Akron (33-14) and Minnesota (35-28, OT). The Boilermakers are ranked 18<sup>th</sup> nationally by USA Today/ESPN and 21<sup>st</sup> in the AP poll. Iowa is ranked 26<sup>th</sup> in the USA Today/ESPN poll.

**ATTENDANCE** -- A crowd of 62,000 is expected. Tickets are on sale at the Purdue Athletic Ticket Office.

**THE SERIES** -- This is the 74<sup>th</sup> game in the series and Purdue has a 42-28-3 lead. The Boilermakers won the last game between the two schools (36-14) in 1998 at W. Lafayette. The Hawkeyes last beat Purdue in 1997 (35-17). Iowa has won 12 of the last 15 meetings. Purdue has a 23-12-1 series lead in games played at Purdue.

**COACHING RECORDS** -- Kirk Ferentz is in his sixth year as a college head coach and his third year at Iowa. His career record is 19-40 and he's 7-19 at Iowa. He is 0-0 against Purdue. Joe Tiller is in his 11<sup>th</sup> as a head coach and fifth year at Purdue. He has a career record of 75-46-1 and a 36-16 record at Purdue. He is 1-1 against Iowa.

## IOWA HITS THE ROAD

Iowa (3-0, 1-0) will play its first road game of the season Saturday, when the Hawkeyes travel to Purdue (3-0, 1-0). Game time is 11:10 a.m. in Ross-Ade Stadium (67,332).

## ON THE TUBE

ESPN will televise the contest to a national cable audience. Steve Levy, Todd Christensen and Dave Ryan will call the action.

## RADIO BROADCAST

Iowa games are broadcast on the Hawkeye Radio Network. Gary Dolphin handles the play-by-play, with color commentator Ed Podolak and sideline reporter Mark Allen. The Hawkeye Radio Network includes more than 50 stations throughout the state.

## HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,018 games since beginning football in 1889. Overall Iowa's record is 505-474-39 (.516). That includes a 320-190-16 (.623) record in home games, a 185-284-23 (.399) record in games away from Iowa City, a 242-319-25 (.434) mark in Big Ten games and a 202-156-15 (.562) record in Kinnick Stadium.

## STARTING OFF RIGHT

Iowa has opened the season with three consecutive wins for the first time since 1997. The Hawkeyes began the 1997 season with four straight wins. Iowa has not opened Big Ten play with consecutive wins since winning its first three conference games in 1996.

## RESULTS TO DATE

Iowa opened the season with a 51-0 win over Kent State, defeated Miami, OH 44-19 and Penn State 24-18. Purdue is 3-0 after wins over Cincinnati (19-14), Akron (33-14) and Minnesota (35-28, OT). Iowa's contest at Iowa State, originally slated for Sept. 15, has been rescheduled for Nov. 24.

## IN THE RANKINGS

Iowa is listed among teams receiving votes in both the Associated Press ratings and the ESPN/USA Today coaches poll. Based on the votes Iowa is ranked 26th in the coaches' poll and 32nd by the Associated Press. Purdue is ranked 18th in the coaches poll and 21st in the Associated Press poll.

## ON THIS DATE

Iowa is 10-4 when playing on October 6. The Hawkeyes defeated Michigan State 12-7 in 1990, Northwestern 31-3 in 1984, Illinois 13-7 in 1979, Oregon State 14-13 in 1956, Northwestern 20-7 in 1934, Monmouth 46-0 in 1929, Knox 44-3 in 1923, Cornell 22-13 in 1917, Drake 17-0 in 1904 and Iowa Teachers College 68-0 in 1900. Iowa lost to Arizona 23-20 in 1973, to Southern Cal 7-0 in 1962, to Purdue 34-30 in 1951 and to Ohio State 42-0 in 1945.

The 1929 victory over Monmouth College marked the first football game in Iowa's Kinnick Stadium, which was originally named Iowa Stadium.

## HAWKEYE HUDDLE AT PURDUE

The National I-Club and the UI Alumni Association invite all Iowa fans to the "Hawkeye Huddle" Saturday morning prior to the Purdue game. The "Hawkeye Huddle" will be held at the Cumberland Place Exhibition Center, 1780 Cumberland Ave., in West Lafayette. The Cumberland Place Exhibition Center is adjacent to the University Inn Hotel, less than a mile and a half from the Purdue campus.

The Huddle will be held from 9-10:30 a.m. Saturday. The free reception features snacks, refreshments, Hawk Shop door prizes, Herky, and the Iowa cheerleaders.

## Coach Kirk Ferentz

Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) is in his third season as Iowa's head football coach. Ferentz and the Hawkeyes posted a 3-9 record in 2001, winning two of the final three games of the season while playing one of the strongest schedules in the nation. Ferentz, at Iowa, holds a record of 7-19 and in five seasons as a college head coach his career mark is 19-40.



Ten of Iowa's 26 games in the last two seasons have been decided by seven points or less and 12 of the 26 were played against opponents who were ranked in the top 25 at the time.

Ferentz, 46, joined the Iowa staff after serving as assistant head coach and offensive line coach of the Baltimore Ravens of the National Football League. He had been part of the Baltimore (Cleveland Browns prior to the move) staff for six years.

Ferentz was named head coach of the Maine Bears in 1990 and held that position for three years. Ferentz was a member of Hayden Fry's Iowa staff for nine years as offensive line coach (1981-89). He coordinated Iowa's running game during his coaching stint with the Hawkeyes. Iowa appeared in eight bowl games during the time Ferentz was an Iowa assistant. A pair of Rose Bowls (1982 & 1986), two Holiday Bowl appearances (1986 & 1987) and a pair of Peach Bowl visits (1982 & 1988), along with appearances in the Gator (1983) and Freedom Bowls (1984) highlighted his previous Iowa stay. Iowa's record in those nine years was 73-33-4 and included two 10-win and two nine-win seasons.

Ferentz was born in Royal Oak, MI and attended high school in Pittsburgh, PA. Kirk earned his bachelor's degree in English Education from the University of Connecticut in 1978, where he was a football captain.

Ferentz has not coached against Purdue or Boilermaker Coach Joe Tiller. Iowa was 8-1 vs. the Boilermakers when Ferentz served as Iowa's offensive line coach from 1981-89.

### PURDUE COACH JOE TILLER

Joe Tiller is in his fifth year as the Purdue head coach and his 11th season overall as a college head coach. Tiller's career record stands at 75-46-1, including a 36-16 record at Purdue and a 39-30-1 record in six seasons at Wyoming. Tiller's first Purdue team in 1997 posted a 9-3 record and Purdue was 9-4 in 1998. The Boilermakers earned a share of the 2000 Big Ten title, earning a spot in the Rose Bowl for the first time since 1967. Purdue has earned a bowl invitation in each of the last four seasons.

Tiller is 1-1 vs. Iowa and has not coached against Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz.

### THE SERIES

Purdue holds a 42-28-3 advantage in the series that began with a 16-0 Iowa win in 1910. The teams have not met since a 36-14 Boilermaker win in West Lafayette in 1998. Iowa won 35-17 in Iowa City in 1997 and the teams tied 21-21 in 1994. Purdue holds a 23-12-1 advantage in Ross-Ade Stadium, where Iowa has a loss (1998), a tie (21-21, 1994) and a win (31-21, 1991) in its last three visits. Here are the series results:

## *Iowa 24, Penn State 18*

Iowa's defense held Penn State to 33 rushing yards and 194 yards total offense as the Hawkeyes defeated the Nittany Lions 24-18 in Iowa City. The Hawkeyes drove 90 yards for a touchdown on their second possession of the day and never trailed. Ladell Betts scored on runs of one and two yards and Kahlil Hill had a seven-yard scoring reception from Kyle McCann as Iowa built a 21-5 halftime advantage.

After Penn State closed to within 21-11 in the third quarter, Iowa's Nate Kaeding added a 47-yard field goal for Iowa's final points. Penn State scored on a blocked punt to move within 24-18 with just under four minutes to play, but Iowa recovered the onside kick and kept the ball the remainder of the game. Betts ended the day with 95 rushing yards and McCann completed 16-25 passes for 225 yards. TE Dallas Clark had seven receptions for 106 yards and Hill had six catches for 83 yards and 212 all-purpose yards.

The Iowa defense was strong throughout. Other than one 90-yard scoring drive, Penn State had just one other possession that covered more than 30 yards. The Nittany Lions scored on a safety and a blocked punt and their field goal came after recovering an Iowa fumble at the 20-yardline.

LB Fred Barr led Iowa with 13 tackles, while LB Roger Meyer had 12 and DB Bob Sanders had 11. DT Aaron Kampman had 10 tackles and DB Matt Stockdale had seven tackles and four pass break-ups.

### **IOWA, PURDUE NOTES**

- Even though the teams haven't met since 1998, 15 current Iowa players saw action in that contest at Purdue, with five of those players starting that game. The Iowa starters included WR Kahlil Hill, OL Ben Sobieski, RB Ladell Betts, LB Roger Meyer and DB D.J. Johnson. Others to see action included WR Tim Dodge, WR Chris Oliver, DB Shane Hall, RB Robbie Crockett, DB Matt Stockdale, DL Cody O'Hare, FB Jeremy Allen, DL Aaron Kampman, OL Alonzo Cunningham and DL Jerry Montgomery.
- FB Jeremy Allen is the only Indiana native on the Iowa roster. The Purdue roster includes just one Iowa native, freshman QB Kyle Orton from Altoona.
- Mark Hagen, Purdue's defensive tackles coach, was an assistant coach at Northern Illinois when Iowa defeated the Huskies 24-0 in 1999. Hagen previously was on the staff at Indiana.

- Iowa Athletic Trainer Ed Crowley is a Purdue graduate who was a member of Purdue's football team that won the 1967 Rose Bowl.

### **THE LAST MEETING**

Purdue used a strong passing performance from QB Drew Brees and took advantage of five Iowa turnovers in defeating Iowa 36-14 in West Lafayette in 1998. Brees completed 31-44 passes for 362 yards and four TDs as Purdue built a 29-0 advantage before Iowa got on the scoreboard. The Boilermaker defense intercepted two Iowa passes and recovered three of Iowa's fumbles. Iowa's scores came on a 29-yard fumble return by Eric Thigpen and a 30-yard run by Robbie Crockett on the first rushing attempt of Crockett's career. RB Ladell Betts had 30 yards on 12 rushing attempts and WR Kahlil Hill had three catches for 29 yards, while Aaron Kampman, then a linebacker, had six tackles. Here are the stats from that contest:

### **PURDUE LIKED THE HAWKEYES**

For at least one week last year, Purdue was happy to see Iowa pick up a win. That was the day Iowa defeated Northwestern in Kinnick Stadium. Had the Wildcats won that game they would have won the Big Ten title outright and earned a trip to the Rose Bowl. With Iowa's win, Purdue and Northwestern tied for the league title and the Boilermakers went to the Rose Bowl on the strength of their win over Northwestern.

### **FINAL PENN STATE GAME NOTES**

- The 18 points scored by Penn State are the lowest total scored by PSU against Iowa since the Hawkeyes won 7-6 in 1976 at Penn State. Iowa has defeated Penn State in consecutive games for the first time since 1976 and 1983, with both of those wins coming at Penn State.
- The 33 net rushing yards by Penn State are the fewest allowed by Iowa since Central Michigan rushed for 35 yards in 1998 and the 194 yards total offense is the fewest allowed since Minnesota had 170 yards in 1997. Both totals are the best by an Iowa team under Kirk Ferentz.

- Nate Kaeding's streak of 11 straight field goals was stopped in the first quarter when Penn State blocked his attempt at the end of the first drive. Kaeding connected on a 47-yard field goal in the second half for Iowa's final points
- OL Eric Steinbach and DB Bob Sanders returned to the starting line-up after missing the Miami, OH game with injuries. OL Alonzo Cunningham, although he did not start, saw his first action of the season.
- OL Andy Lightfoot and DB Chris Smith, two players who started Iowa's first two games, missed the Penn State game with injuries.
- When Penn State advanced into Iowa's redzone on its first drive of the game, it marked the first time this season Iowa allowed an opponent to drive inside the Iowa 20.
- The first half field goal by Penn State marked the first points Iowa has given up in the first half this season and the points came as a result of a turnover at the Iowa 20-yardline.
- Sean Considine, a redshirt freshman from Byron, IL who joined the Iowa program as a walk-on, recovered Penn State's fumble that led to Iowa's touchdown just before halftime.

### **PURDUE WINS IN OT**

Purdue rallied in the closing minutes to force overtime and went on to a 35-28 win at Minnesota. The Boilermakers used a 48-yard field goal as time expired to force the extra period. Once in overtime, Purdue scored on a 19-yard pass from Brandon Hance to John Standeford and the Boilermaker defense secured the win with an interception. Hance completed 22-36 passes for 306 yards and three TDs, with two interceptions, and also had a touchdown on a pass reception. Montrell Lowe led the Purdue ground game with 76 yards on 23 carries. Purdue had a 488-406 advantage in total offense. Stuart Schwigert led the Purdue defense with 13 tackles. His pass interception in overtime, the third of the day for Purdue, assured the victory.

### **DEFENSE MAKING A STAND**

Iowa's defense has been much improved in the first three games of the season. The Hawkeyes recorded a shutout in the opening win over Kent State and led 44-0 vs. Miami before the RedHawks scored 19 points in the second half. Iowa held Miami to no pass completions and just 26 yards total offense in the first half. Miami gained 226 of its 338 total yards in the final 22 minutes of the game after Iowa led 44-0. Against Penn State, the defense again played better than the score might indicate. Penn State had one 90-yard scoring drive in the third quarter and one 58-yard drive in the first quarter that resulted in a missed field goal. PSU's other nine drives covered 25 yards or less and none lasted more than six plays. Penn State scored a touchdown on a blocked punt, a safety on an Iowa fumble in the endzone and a field goal after recovering an Iowa fumble at the Iowa 20-yardline.

The Iowa defense has come up with six turnovers in three games; with nine QB sacks and 23 pass break-ups.

In three games, Iowa opponents have gained less than 20 yards on 19 of 33 possessions.

### **PLAYERS OF THE WEEK**

Senior QB Kyle McCann was named co-offensive Player of the Week in the Big Ten Conference for his play in Iowa's Sept. 8 win over Miami, OH. McCann completed 13-16 passes for 201 yards and career-high four touchdowns.

Sophomore PK Nate Kaeding was named special teams Player of the Week for his play in Iowa's win over Kent State. Kaeding made all three of his field goal attempts and added 6-6 PATs, setting a school record with 15 kicking points.

### **KAEDING DOES THE KICKING**

Sophomore kicker Nate Kaeding connected on a 47-yard field goal in the win over Penn State after having one attempt blocked in the first quarter. Kaeding had made a school-record 11 straight field goals before that block.

Kaeding has made 19-28 career field goal attempts, including 9-12 from outside 40 yards, and 34-35 PATs. Kaeding made the first 30 PATs of his career before missing against Miami. Kaeding set an Iowa single game record with 15 kicking points in Iowa's win over Kent State, hitting three field goals and six PATs. Kaeding leads Iowa with 29 points in three games and was named Big Ten special teams Player of the Week for his efforts in the win over Kent State.

Kaeding, in Iowa's win over Penn State in 2000, tied the Iowa single game record with four field goals.

### **KAEDING ON LOU GROZA WATCH LIST**

Sophomore PK Nate Kaeding is one of 30 pre-season candidates for the 10th annual Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award. The award is presented in early December. A list of 20 semi-finalists will be announced in late October and three finalists will be named in November. Kaeding is one of five sophomores on the early list.

### **BETTS LEADS RUSHING ATTACK**

Iowa RB Ladell Betts scored his first two touchdowns of the season in the first half of Iowa's win over Penn State. Betts now had 17 career rushing touchdowns and 108 career points. He is tied for 10th in career rushing TDs and tied for 18th in career points.

Betts ended the game with 33 carries for 95 yards and two scores, improving his career totals to 667 attempts for 2,857 yards and 17 rushing TDs. Betts had 99 yards on 15 carries in a win over Kent State and his seasons totals include 58 attempts for 231 yards.

Betts, Iowa's leading rusher the last three seasons, ranks second in career rushing attempts and third in rushing yards. He gained 1,090 yards last season, a figure that ranks seventh best for a single season. Betts has rushed for over 100 yards in a game on nine occasions, including four games in 2000, three games in 1999 and two games in 1998. His single-game best of 174 yards was against Northern Illinois in 1999 and he rushed for 154 yards vs. Minnesota last season.

Betts last season became the first Hawkeye to rush for over 1,000 yards since Tavian Banks set the single-season record of 1,691 yards in 1997 and the ninth Iowa player ever to gain over 1,000 yards in a season.

Betts, who rushed for 857 yards in 1999, is the fifth Iowa running back to rush for over 800 yards in more than one season. Sedrick Shaw, Iowa's career rushing leader with 4,156 yards is the only Hawkeye player to rush for over 800 yards in three different seasons (1994, 1995, 1996). The others with two seasons of over 800 yards include Tony Stewart (1988, 1990), Ronnie Harmon (1984, 1985), and Eddie Phillips (1982, 1983). Following is a list of Iowa's career rushing leaders:

### **MCCANN LEADS IOWA OFFENSE**

Senior QB Kyle McCann has been very efficient in leading Iowa to three straight wins. McCann has completed 41-59 passes for 591 yards and five touchdowns, with one interception. His efficiency rating of 178.2 ranks second in the nation. McCann had a career-high four TD passes in the win over Miami and he was 16-25 for 225 yards vs. Penn State. He has completed 69.5% of his passes this season.

In leading Iowa to late season wins over Penn State and Northwestern a year ago, McCann passed for 232 yards vs. Penn State and 250 yards vs. Northwestern. The 25 completions at Penn State are a career high for McCann, and the 250 passing yards vs. Northwestern is his second highest game total (he had 274 passing yards at Arizona in 1998).

McCann's career totals stand at 231-410 (.563) for 2,912 yards and 12 TDs. He ranks seventh in career completions and eighth in passing yards and attempts. Following is a list of Iowa's career passing leaders, based on yardage:

### **HILL IS ALL-PURPOSE LEADER**

WR Kahlil Hill leads Iowa in all-purpose yards (143.7) and he ranks 10th in the nation in punt returns (16.0) and 00th in KO returns. Hill had 212 all-purpose yards in the win over Penn State, including a 76-yard KO return to start the game and six pass receptions for 83 yards. His seven-yard scoring reception gave Iowa a 21-5 halftime advantage. His three-game receiving totals include 16 catches for 233 yards and two TDs. Hill has at least one pass reception in all 26 games in his career.

The 76-yard KO return to start the Penn State game is the third longest of Hill's career and the 14th longest ever at Iowa. Hill had a 90-yard TD return vs. Michigan State in 2000 and an 88-yard TD return vs. Central Michigan in 1998. Hill had six receptions for 94 yards in the win over Miami, including a 52-yard scoring reception, and he had a punt return for a score nullified by a holding penalty.

Hill's career receiving totals include 109 catches for 1,284 yards and nine TDs. He is tied for eighth in career receptions and ranks 16th in receiving yards. In 2000 he became the 25th Iowa receiver with over 600 yards in a season and is the 19th Iowa receiver with over 1,200 career receiving yards. Hill has 1,281-career kickoff return yards and 392 career punt return yards for a total of 2,957 all-purpose yards.

Hill led Iowa in all-purpose yards (121.3 average) last season and ranked among the national leaders in kickoff returns. Hill ranked seventh in the nation with his 27.2 yard average on KO returns and his 9.6 average on punt returns ranked sixth in the Big Ten and 50th nationally.

Hill has two kickoff return touchdowns and two punt return touchdowns in his career. Hill is tied for third place (with 11 others) in Big Ten history with two career KO return touchdowns. The Big Ten record of five is held by Stan Brown of Purdue (1968-70), while former Michigan State player Derrick Mason (1993-96) had three. Here are his career totals:

### **BARR LEADS IN TACKLES**

Junior LB Fred Barr leads Iowa with 30 tackles after three games. Barr led the Hawkeyes with 13 stops in the win over Penn State. Barr also has recorded two tackles for loss, one QB sack and a pass break-up. The 13 tackles are a career high for Barr, who had 12 tackles last season in consecutive games against Wisconsin and Penn State. Barr has 176 career tackles after recording 74 tackles as a true freshman in 1999 and 72 tackles last season.

### **KAMPMAN MOVES UP**

Senior DL Aaron Kampman has recorded 20 tackles in Iowa's three wins, increasing his career total to 266, a figure that ranks 15th best for career stops. Kampman had another steady performance in the win over Penn State, recording 10 tackles. Kampman played linebacker his first two seasons at Iowa before moving to defensive end. He leads Iowa with two pass interceptions this year, he ranks third in tackles and second in tackles for loss and QB sacks.

### **CLARK IS TOP TARGET**

Sophomore Dallas Clark, playing tight end for the first time this season, leads Iowa in receiving yards with 274 yards on 16 catches. Clark had seven catches for 116 yards in the win over Penn State and he had two touchdown receptions in the win over Miami, OH. Clark's biggest play in the win over Penn State may have been late in the game when he came down with Penn State's onside kick to help secure Iowa's win.

Clark, who suffered a broken finger in the season-opener, previously played linebacker before moving to tight end last spring. He is a former walk-on and a native of Livermore, IA. His older brother, Derrik, played linebacker at Iowa State during his college career.

### **ALLEN SCORES AGAIN**

Senior FB Jeremy Allen scored the first touchdown of his career in Iowa's opening win over Kent State, and he added his first touchdown reception in Iowa's win over Miami. Allen had a 15-yard reception vs. the RedHawks to cap Iowa's opening drive. Allen had the best rushing day of his career in the opening win, rushing 12 times for 73 yards and one touchdown. Allen, who has earned multiple all-America honors in track and field, battled through injuries most of last season, rushing just 34 times for 135 yards. In two games this season he has rushed for 85 yards after rushing for 73 yards vs. Kent State.

### GREIVING TIES NCAA RECORD

Sophomore RB Aaron Greiving tied an NCAA Division I record by scoring a touchdown on three consecutive carries in Iowa's opening win over Kent State. Greiving scored on runs of 14, 1 and 26 yards on the first three rushing attempts of his career. Greiving saw action last season, but had no rushing attempts.

### BANKS GETS ON THE BOARD

QB Brad Banks, in his first season at Iowa after a two-year junior college career, led the Hawkeyes on a scoring drive in his first action in each of Iowa's first two games. Banks led Iowa on a 66-yard scoring drive against Miami that lasted over eight minutes. Banks ended the drive with a five-yard touchdown run with just five seconds left in the half. In two games Banks has rushed 10 times for 31 yards and completed 11-19 passes for 136 yards. Banks did not see action in Iowa's win over Penn State.

### HAWKEYES GET FIRST POINTS

Hawkeye players who had not previously reached the endzone scored all six touchdowns in Iowa's win over Kent State. Senior Jeremy Allen scored Iowa's first touchdown and sophomore Aaron Greiving followed with three scores. Junior Siaki Massaquoi and sophomore Fred Russell each added a score in the fourth quarter. In addition, QB Brad Banks, TE Dallas Clark and DB Chris Smith scored their first career touchdowns in the win over Miami.

### IOWA DEPTH CHART

Iowa's depth chart includes 20 seniors, 13 juniors, 14 sophomores, and three redshirt freshmen. The Hawkeyes have used just one true freshman, linebacker Matt Roth, through the first three games of the season. Iowa used seven true freshmen during the 2000 season.

### FIRST TIME STARTERS

Two Iowa players started for the first time in the opening win over Kent State and another was in the starting line-up against Miami. Tight end Dallas Clark and outside linebacker Grant Steen, both native Iowans who joined the program as walk-ons, were in the starting line-up in the opening win, while DB Derek Pagel, also a former walk-on and native Iowan, started the win over Miami.

### IOWA NOTES

- Junior WR C.J. Jones has shown big play potential in three games after joining Iowa from the junior college ranks. Jones is averaging 41 yards on two punt returns and he has four pass receptions. He is the cousin of Iowa QB Brad Banks.
- Iowa has started the game on offense in 20 consecutive games and 22 of 27 games under Kirk Ferentz. Iowa opened its first two games with a touchdown drive before having a field goal blocked on its first drive against Penn State.
- Iowa, in each of its three games, has closed the first half with a scoring drive. The Hawkeyes converted a field goal on the last play of the half vs. Kent State, scored a touchdown with five seconds left vs. Miami and scored a touchdown with 25 seconds remaining vs. Penn State.
- Iowa's total of 95 points in the first two games was the highest two-game total for the Hawkeyes since the 1997 season. Iowa opened that year by scoring 66, 54 and 63 points against Northern Iowa, Tulsa and Iowa State, respectively.
- Iowa averaged 61,123 fans in its six home games in 2000, a figure that ranked 24th in the nation. Through three home games this season Iowa is averaging 61,268 fans.

- For the first time in school history, Iowa in 2000 had a player rush for over 1,000 yards and a player total over 1,000 yards in receptions in the same season. WR Kevin Kasper ended the year with 1,010 receiving yards, while RB Ladell Betts rushed for 1,090 yards.
- Iowa kickers made 81 straight PAT kicks before Nate Kaeding missed one attempt in the win over Miami. That streak included 10 PATs to start this season, 21 in 2000, 19 in 1999, 18 in 1998 and the final 13 PAT kicks of 1997. Iowa kickers had not missed at PAT since 1997. Iowa was one of just three Big Ten teams that did not miss a kicking PAT in 2000.

### **THEY STARTED THEM ALL**

Iowa returns four players who started all 12 games in 2000. That list includes OL Bruce Nelson, RB Ladell Betts, DE Aaron Kampman and DL Jerry Montgomery. In addition, DL Derrick Pickens started 11 and WR Kahlil Hill, OL Alonzo Cunningham and OL Robert Gallery started 10 games.

Betts and Kampman each started all 11 games in 1999. Betts has started 32 straight games and 34 of the last 37 games, Kampman has 29 career starts, Cunningham 27 and Nelson 26. Iowa had four offensive players (RB Ladell Betts, OL A.J. Blazek, OL Bruce Nelson, WR Kevin Kasper) and five players on defense (DL Aaron Kampman, DL Jerry Montgomery, DL Anthony Herron, LB LeVar Woods, DB Ryan Hansen) start all 12 games in 2000.

### **RETURNING WITH HONORS**

Iowa returns five players who earned all-conference recognition a year ago. Senior RB Ladell Betts, who begins the season ranked third in career rushing yards (2,626), earned honorable mention all-Big Ten honors in 2000 after being a second team selection in 1999.

WR Kahlil Hill returns for his final season after earning honorable mention recognition. The Sporting News named him first team kick returner. Hill averaged 27.2 yards on kickoff returns and 9.6 yards on punt returns and he led the team with 121.3 all-purpose yards per game. Hill was second on the team in receiving with 58 catches for 619 yards and five TDs.

Junior OL Bruce Nelson, who has started all 23 Iowa games over the past two seasons, senior DE Aaron Kampman and sophomore DB Bob Sanders were also named honorable mention all-Big Ten a year ago.

### **TWO EARN FRESHMAN HONORS**

PK Nate Kaeding and DB Benny Sapp, were honored for their play as true freshmen during the 2000 season. Sapp was named to the Rivals.com first freshman all-America team, while Kaeding was named to The Sporting News' third freshman all-America squad.

### **IOWA BY THE NUMBERS**

The Hawkeyes return 47 lettermen from last season, including 19 on offense, 27 on defense and one specialist. Iowa returns eight starters on both offense and defense, along with kicker Nate Kaeding.

The list of 47 lettermen includes 12 three-year lettermen, 12 two-year lettermen and 23 one-year lettermen. The roster includes 113 players, including 21 seniors, 23 juniors, 27 sophomores, 21 redshirt freshmen and 21 true freshmen.

### **EIGHT WERE WALK-ONS**

Eight members of Iowa's two-deep joined the program as walk-ons. That list includes offensive linemen Bruce Nelson and Pete Traynor, tight end Dallas Clark, linebacker Grant Steen, defensive lineman Joe Uselman, defensive backs Derek Pagel and Sean Considine and punter Nate Campbell. Nelson, Clark, Steen and Pagel have all started games this season.

### **IOWA IN THE REDZONE**

Iowa scored 21 points by scoring on three of four drives against Penn State that reached the redzone, scoring two rushing touchdowns and one passing TD. Iowa has scored on 14 of 16 drives that have reached the redzone in three games, collecting seven rushing TDs, four passing TDs and three field goals for 86 points. Iowa failed to score twice, due to an interception and a blocked field goal.

In three games, Iowa's opponents have scored on two of four possessions that have reached the redzone, scoring one rushing TD and one field goal. The two failures occurred due to an interception and a missed field goal.

### **ON THE AVERAGE**

Iowa vs. Penn State averaged 6.3 yards on 32 first down plays, 3.5 yards on 22 second down plays, 4.2 yards on 14 third down plays. In three games Iowa is averaging 6.7 yards on 99 first down plays, 5.7 yards on 65 second down plays, 5.9 yards on 42 third down plays and 5.2 yards on five fourth down plays. Iowa has converted three of five fourth down attempts.

### **AVERAGE SCORING DRIVES**

Iowa's four scoring drives vs. Penn State averaged 8.0 plays, 65.8 yards and 3:10 in elapsed time. Penn State's two scoring drives averaged 11 plays, 45 yards and 4:05 in elapsed time. In three games Iowa's 19 scoring drives have averaged 7.5 plays, 56.2 yards and 3:13 in elapsed time. Five scoring drives by Iowa's opponents have averaged 7.0 plays, 68.8 yards and 2:37 elapsed time

### **BIG PLAYS**

Iowa had four pass plays of over 20 yards vs. Penn State, plus two KO returns of over 20 yards and one field goal over 40 yards. In three games Iowa has three running plays, 11 pass plays, four punt returns, one interception return and three kickoff returns over 20 yards, plus five field goals over 30 yards. Iowa's opponents have had six passing plays, one running play and three kickoff returns over 20 yards.

### **POINTS OFF TURNOVERS**

Iowa scored seven points after recovering one fumble in the win over Penn State. In three games Iowa has scored 27 points following six opponent turnovers, including three touchdowns and two field goals.

Iowa has just three turnovers in three games and has allowed just three points following those miscues, a field goal by Penn State.

Iowa last season scored 36 points following 17 opponent turnovers, while Iowa's opponents scored 72 points following Iowa's 20 turnovers.

Iowa's roster of 114 players includes 43 players from Iowa. The roster includes 17 players from Illinois, 13 from Florida, eight from Texas, six from Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin, three from California, two from Missouri and Pennsylvania and one from Alabama, Colorado, Connecticut, Indiana, Mississippi, Nevada, South Dakota and Virginia.

### **BROTHERLY LOVE**

Iowa's team includes two sets of brothers. Pete and John Traynor are walk-ons from Milton, WI. Pete is a junior offensive lineman and John is a sophomore defensive lineman.

Robert and John Gallery are from Masonville, IA. Robert is a sophomore offensive tackle, while John is a walk-on punter and a true freshman. Another Gallery brother, Nick, was a four-year punter for the Hawkeyes from 1993-96, and Julie Gallery is a member of Iowa's women's track and field squad.

### **THE HAWKEYES, SIZE WISE**

DB Antwan Allen is the lightest Hawkeye at 160 pounds, while the shortest players, at 5-8, include DB Marqueas McLaurin, RB Fred Russell and DB Bob Sanders. OL David Porter is the heaviest Hawkeye at 312 pounds, while the tallest player is 6-8 freshman TE C.J. Barkema. The average Hawkeye player is 6-2 and weighs 234 pounds. That is one half-inch taller and two pounds lighter than the average Iowa player in 2000.

### **IOWA ON THE TUBE**

Iowa's two non-conference games, to begin the 2001 season, were both televised by ESPN Regional. The Iowa State game (postponed till Nov. 24th) would have been televised by ABC Regional.
