

IOWA ATHLETICS




Since the fall of 2020, lowa's athletics programs have won 11 Big Ten championships, along with claiming the football West Division title in 2021. It is the most championships earned by the Hawkeyes in any two-year period. The Hawkeye football team posted 10 wins in 2021 and earned yet another January bowl invitation.

In 2021-22, lowa became just the second Big Ten school to have its football team and men's and women's basketball teams play in the Big Ten Championship Game since the football game was introduced in 2011-12.

Individually, Iowa was the only school in the nation in 2021-22 to have both a men's (Keegan Murray) and women's (Caitlin Clark) finalist for the Naismith and Wooden National Player of the Tear Awards.

Hawkeye student-athletes recorded an 89 percent Graduation DIRECTUR OF A Success Rate (GSR). UI student-athletes rank higher than the national average in GSR and 11 teams ranked at or above the previous year. University of lowa student-athletes had

an average GPA of 3.21 during the 2021-22 fall semester and a 3.22 GPA during the spring semester. Iowa student-athletes have had an average GPA of over 3.0 the last eight years. Over 300 student-athletes earned Dean's List and President's List honors, while 270 Iowa student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition and 66 were named Big Ten Conference Distinguished Scholars for the 2021-22 school year.

Within the Hawkeye Life Program, student-athletes gain experience in six areas which include Leadership, Community Engagement, Academic Success, Career Development, Health & Well-Being, and Diversity & Inclusion. Over 800 Hawkeye student-athletes, coaches, staff, and administrators took part in over 1,170 hours of DEI related programming during the 2021-22 academic year. Nearly 400 students attended career related events including a financial literacy series,

Polk County I-Club senior recognition, graduate, and professional school fair, and one-onone career counseling meetings.

KIRK FERENTZ IOWA HEAD COACH

Moon Family Head Football Coach Kirk Ferentz coached in game No. 300 as the University of Iowa's head coach in the final game of the 2022 season. With Iowa's win at Minnesota in late November, Ferentz tied Amos Alonzo Stagg for third place in Big Ten Conference victories with 115.

Ferentz is in his 24th year as head football coach at the University of lowa in 2022, and his 33rd season overall at the University. Ferentz most recent contract extension extended his agreement with lowa through the 2029 season.

The position of UI head football coach was endowed in 2021 by Will and Renee Moon. The Bettendorf, lowa couple are UI alumni and longtime Hawkeye supporters.

Under Ferentz' leadership the lowa football program has earned 20 bowl game invitations since 2001. That success has been achieved with strong commitments to the program, the University of Iowa, and the ideals that represent Hawkeye football – hard work, determination, player development and character, on and off the field.

lowa posted a 7-5 record in 2022, having a four-game winning streak snapped in the season finale. The Hawkeyes lost two games to teams ranked in the top five at the time, two games by three points each and the final game by a seven-point margin. lowa was the only West Division team to face both Michigan and Ohio State during the regular season.

Ferentz holds a 185-115 record in his 300 games as lowa's head coach, including a 115-83 mark in conference games. The 185 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten rank fourth all-time in league history and his 115 conference victories tie Stagg for third



KIRK FERENTZ MOON FAMILY HEAD FOOTBALL COACH


place. His 26-year record as a college head coach is 197-136.

Ferentz is the longest tenured head football coach in the nation. Ferentz and Fry are the only head coaches to lead a Division I football program for 20 years, consecutively. With a 63-0 win at Illinois in 2018, Ferentz became just the fifth coach in Big Ten Conference history to win 150 games as a Big Ten head coach. Ferentz earned his 100th career Big Ten win at Penn State (Nov. 21, 2020).

Off the field, family is the top priority for Ferentz. Ferentz and his wife, Mary, have been married for 43 years. They have five children: Brian, Kelly, Joanne, James, and Steven. They also have four granddaughters (Presley, Blakely, Connolly, and Jolie), and six grandsons (John, Forest, Nixon, Lincoln, Beckett, and Marshall). All five of their children graduated from City High School in lowa City and earned degrees from the University of lowa; and each of the boys had the incredible experience of playing football at the University of lowa with their father as head coach.

Ferentz was born August 1, 1955, in Royal Oak, Michigan. He attended Upper St. Clair High School in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and graduated from the University of Connecticut in 1978 with a bachelor's degree in English Education. He was a football captain and an academic all-Yankee Conference linebacker at Connecticut.

Ferentz received the Distinguished Alumnus Award from the Neag School of Education at the University of Connecticut in May, 2009. He was inducted into the Upper St. Clair High School Hall of Fame in September, 2002, and the Western Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame in May, 2003.

THE HAWKEYE NICKNAME

 $\label{thm:continuous} The \ University \ of \ lowa \ borrowed \ its \ athletic \ nickname \ from \ the \ state \ of \ lowa \ many \ years \ ago.$

The name Hawkeye was originally applied to a hero in a fictional novel, The Last of the Mohicans, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Author Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them.

In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of lowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison.

Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawk Eye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

HERKY THE HAWKEYE

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawk, was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of iournalism.

The impish hawk was an immediate hit and he acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth over 70 years ago, Herky has symbolized lowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid 1950s Herky came to life at a football game as the lowa mascot. Since then Herky has been a familiar figure at lowa athletic events.



SCHOOL COLORS

For 40 years lowa was without school colors, but in 1887 a group of 50 seniors met on the steps of the Old Capitol to decide, what are now, the official school colors. They chose Old Gold, the color of lowa's vast corn fields and Black, the color of the rich soil.

SCHOOL FIGHT SONG

The lowa Fight Song was written in 1950 by Mason City, lowa, native Meredith Willson. Best known as the creator of Broadway's "The Music Man," Willson was awarded a 1963 University of lowa Alumni Association Distinguished Service Award for "setting the spirit of lowa to music." The lively cheer is sung hundreds of times during lowa athletic events during the year.

THE TIGERHAWK EMBLEM

When Hayden Fry was named University of lowa Head Football Coach in 1979, he wanted to change the Hawkeyes' image from a team that posted 17-straight losing seasons to that of a winner. One part of that makeover was creating and introducing a new logo. Fry and the athletics marketing department held a campus-wide contest asking fans to submit their logo ideas. The winner - the tigerhawk designed by Cedar Rapids native Bill Colbert - has become synonymous with University of lowa Athletics.

THE SWARM

Coach Fry wanted to create a sense of unity and togetherness on game days amongst his new team in 1979. Before each game, he instructed his team to take and leave the field as a tight group with everyone holding hands and moving at a slow trot. Fry coined the entrance "The Swarm".

"I wasn't sure what we'd look like as a team after the first snap," explained Fry, "so I wanted to make sure that we looked like winners coming on and off the field. I told my first team that the Swarm was to get the attention of the other team," he laughed. "But it was just as much for us to relax and not be scared."

THE WAVE

The University of Iowa football program was chosen to receive the prestigious 2017 Disney Sports Spirit Award after launching a heart-warming tradition at its home games that touched the lives of scores of young patients at the university's Stead Family Children's Hospital.

In a tradition that started at the 2017 season opener, fans inside Kinnick Stadium and patients and families inside the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital exchanged waves at the end of the first quarter of each home game.

The UI Stead Family Children's Hospital opened in 2017. It is connected to the south end of the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics and overlooks Kinnick Stadium from the southeast grandstands. During Iowa football home games, patients and their families can watch the game from the top floor (Level 12), one of the highest vantage points in Iowa City





KENTUCKY ATHLETICS



The University of Kentucky Athletic Department fields 23 sports and has experienced a great deal of success across the fields and courts of play.

Under the direction of Director of Athletics Mitch Barnhart, the UK program has seen improvements in a number of areas, including in the classroom, facilities and competition.

UK student-athletes continue to thrive in the classroom. The spring 2022 semester marked the 20th consecutive term in which UK studentathletes have surpassed their goal of a 3.0 grade point average.

The department has also updated and added to its athletic facilities, including renovations to Kroger Field, the addition of the Joe Craft Football Training Facility and the new, state-of-the-art Kentucky Proud Park, home to the UK Baseball program.

On the fields of play, UK Athletics continues to win and win often. From basketball to football, volleyball to rifle and soccer to softball, the Cats have won conference and national championships and are always a factor in postseason play.

In the community, Wildcat student-athletes continue to enhance the Lexington area, donating their time and talents to better Lexington and the surrounding communities.

During the 2021-22 season, UK Athletics had many occasions on which to celebrate the accomplishments of its teams and student-athletes. The UK Rifle team won its fourth NCAA championship, while the UK men's tennis team finished as national runners-up. The women's track team placed third in the country in both indoor and outdoor track and field, while the Kentucky football team made its sixth straight bowl appearance. The UK volleyball team won its fifth consecutive Southeastern Conference championship and the new Kentucky STUNT program completed its first season with an appearance in the national tournament. 

MARK STOOPS KENTUCKY HEAD COACH

The 2022 season has marked yet another year of achievement for Coach Mark Stoops and the Kentucky football program.

When the Wildcats take the field today, it will extend a school-record streak of seven-consecutive bowl games, all under Stoops. Kentucky reached the postseason by posting a 7-5 record, the sixth-consecutive season (not including the Covid-shortened 2020 season) that UK has won at least seven games.

Stoops has personal milestones as well as he completes his 10th year at Kentucky, longest term of any coach in school history. The Wildcats' victory at Florida in September was Stoops' 61st win, breaking the school record of 60 held by Paul "Bear" Bryant.

Called "the best program builder in all of college football" a year ago by ESPN analyst Tom Luginbill, Stoops' success hasn't come easily.

Inheriting a program that was 2-10 the year before he arrived, Stoops' rebuilding efforts took time. Two games into the 2016 season his record was 12-26, but the program took off from there and the coach has engineered a 54-32 (.628) mark since.

In addition to this season's achievements, a partial accounting of Stoops' exploits features:

- Four straight bowl wins the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2022, the 2020 Gator Bowl, the 2019 Belk Bowl and the Citrus Bowl on Jan. 1, 2019 – first time in school history that UK won four straight bowls
- A school-record 20-game win streak against non-conference competition, currently the longest active streak in the nation (2018-present)
- First win at Tennessee since 1984 (2019)
- First New Year's Day Bowl win since 1951 (2018 season)
- First 10-win season since 1977 (2018)
- First SEC Coach of the Year since 1983 (2018)
- First final poll ranking since 1984 (2018)
- First bowl win since 2008 (2018)
- First win vs. Florida since 1986 (2018)
- First bowl appearance since 2010 (2016)

In addition to the team accomplishments, several of Stoops' players have won All-America accolades, along with honors such as the Bronko Nagurski Award, Chuck Bednarik Award, Paul Hornung Award, Ronnie Lott Trophy, Ray Guy Award, Danny Wuerffel Trophy, Pop Warner Award, Academic All-America and National Good Works Team.

Off the field, Stoops has been active in fundraising and events for the UK Children's Hospital and he was named Honorary Coach of the 2022 National Good Works Team.

Stoops came to Kentucky from Florida State, where he was defensive coordinator from 2010-12, inheriting a unit ranked 108th in the nation and turning it into one of the nation's best. Previous collegiate coaching stops include Arizona; Miami (Fla.), where he helped win a national championship; Houston, Wyoming, South Florida, and his alma mater, lowa, where he began as a graduate assistant under Hall of Fame Coach Hayden Fry.

Stoops is the youngest of the acclaimed Stoops coaching brothers, including Bob, a Hall of Fame Coach who won a national championship at Oklahoma; Mike, inside linebackers coach at Kentucky; and Ron, Sr., who is now retired after coaching at Youngstown State.

KENTUCKY SPIRIT SQUADS

The University of Kentucky spirit squads are an important part of the game day experience for the Big Blue Nation. Both the UK cheerleading and dance programs play a key role in helping to preserve and continue the traditions and pageantry that come with any Kentucky game day.

Kentucky's cheerleading squad is, quite simply, the gold standard in the sport. With a record 24 Universal Cheer Association national championships, UK has an unparalleled tradition in the world of college cheerleading. Kentucky has won 11 of the last 14 national championships and, since 2000, has won the title 16 out of 22 times.

Kentucky is the only school to ever win more than two championships in a row, and UK has done so on multiple occasions. Kentucky won a record eight straight championships from 1995-2002, won three straight from 2004-06, won three more in a row from 2008-10, then won four in a row from 2016-19.

The UK Dance Team has developed into one of the premier programs in the nation as well. At last year's Universal Dance Association competition in Orlando, UK placed second in both the gameday and hip-hop portions of the competitions. Those finishes were the best in UK history.

The dance squad energizes the crowd at UK games and keeps the fans engaged from beginning to end. Their high-energy routines have become a regular part of the game day tradition at Kentucky.

Both programs receive significant national exposure each year during their national competitions, for UCA and UDA, which air on ESPN.

The UK cheerleaders are considered some of the best athletes on the entire UK campus, while the dance team's athleticism is on display during all of their game day routines.

In addition to bringing their talent to game days, cheerleaders and dancers represent the universities at numerous functions throughout each school year.

Kentucky's mascots, Wildcat and Scratch, are also fan favorites in the Bluegrass. Both mascots appear at UK games year 'round, bringing joy to UK fans young and old.

1998 VIRGINIA TECH 38 VS. ALABAMA 7

MVP COREY MOORE, VIRGINIA TECH


The Hokies took matters into their own hands in the inaugural Bowl game and used stellar defense and special teams, stalwarts of Coach Frank Beamer's regime, to stifle Alabama 38-7. The victory ended a two-game bowl losing streak for Virginia Tech, one of only 10 teams to go to a bowl game in each of the previous six years. The Hokies also picked up their first-ever victory over a Southeastern Conference school. Virginia Tech led 10-7 at halftime and then put the game away with 28 unanswered points. Future NFL MYP Shaun Alexander led Alabama with 55 yards rushing and 8 receptions for 87 yards.



2000 WEST VIRGINIA 49 VS. OLE MISS 38

MVP BRAD LEWIS, WEST VIRGINIA

The Mountaineers carved up the Rebels defense for three quarters, built a 49-9 lead and held on for a 49-38 victory. West Virginia's victory kept the Big East's record perfect against the Southeastern Conference in the first three years of the Bowl game. Bowl fans were treated to the breakout performance of Eli Manning, a redshirt freshman and future NFL No. 1 draft pick, who threw three touchdown passes in the fourth quarter in the first collegiate game of his career.



1999 SYRACUSE 20 VS. KENTUCKY 13

MVP JAMES MUNGRO, SYRACUSE

In the nick of time, Syracuse remembered how to win. The win was their first victory that season since November 6. Syracuse ended the regular season by losing its last two games and four of its last five. "All in all, we just persevered, and we just needed a win," Syracuse defensive star Keith Bulluck said after recording a team-high 15 tackles in the game. "The thrill of victory – we haven't had it in such a long time." Bulluck played his final collegiate game on the same field in which he would eventually shine for the Tennessee Titans.



2001 BOSTON COLLEGE 20 VS. GEORGIA 16

MVP WILLIAM GREEN, BOSTON COLLEGE

William Green carried 35 times for 149 yards and scored the go-ahead touchdown in the fourth quarter to give Boston College, who was appearing in the third bowl game in school history, a 20-16 victory over No. 16 Georgia.



2002 MINNESOTA 29 VS. ARKANSAS 14

MVP DAN NYSTROM, MINNESOTA

The Razorbacks, the SEC West Champions of 2002, started strong, putting together a 74-yard scoring drive on their first possession. The SEC's top rushing team of 2002 went to the air as Matt Jones started with a 29-yard pass to Richard Smith and capped the drive with a two-yard touchdown pass to George Wilson. That turned out to be their best possession of the game, however, as they rushed for only 80 yards. Minnesota kicker Dan Nystrom kicked an NCAA record-tying five field goals in the Gophers 29-14 upset of No. 25 Arkansas. The win marked the Gophers first bowl victory since 1985.



2004 MINNESOTA 20 VS. ALABAMA 16

MVP MARION BARBER III, MINNESOTA

Alabama fans, rapid for a return to the postseason for the first time since 2001, were out in full force at the highest attended Bowl since the game began in 1998. A then Bowl record crowd of 66,089 saw future Dallas Cowboy Marion Barber III of Minnesota run for 187 yards and a touchdown, and Golden Gopher teammate Laurence Maroney, a future NFL first round draft pick of the New England Patriots, added 105 yards on the ground to lead Minnesota to a 20-16 win.



2003 AUBURN 28 VS. WISCONSIN 14

MVP JASON CAMPBELL, AUBURN

The Auburn Tigers finished the 2003 season the way they had hoped to open it. Future NFL first round draft picks Carnell "Cadillac" Williams and Ronnie Brown scored in the last four minutes, and each finished with two rushing touchdowns, leading Auburn to a 28-14 victory over Wisconsin and future pro star Lee Evans. The Tigers also had six sacks and forced two turnovers and won their second straight game and second consecutive bowl game under Coach Tommy Tuberville.



2005 VIRGINIA 34 VS. MINNESOTA 31

MVP MARQUES HAGANS, VIRGINIA

December of 2005 was a distracting one for Virginia with four coaches departing for new jobs. However, MYP Marques Hagans and his fellow Cavaliers got their focus back in the Bowl game. Conner Hughes kicked a 39-yard field goal with 1:08 remaining, and Hagans threw for a career-high 358 yards in helping Virginia overcome a 14-point deficit to beat Minnesota, 34-31.





BOWL HISTORY

2006 KENTUCKY 28 VS. CLEMSON 20

MVP ANDRE' WOODSON, KENTUCKY

Kentucky defeated Clemson, 28-20, to capture the ninth annual Bowl in front of a record sellout crowd of 68,024. Kentucky's win was its first bowl victory in 22 years. Bowl MVP Andre' Woodson threw for 299 yards, just missing his third 300-yard game of the season and the



fourth of his career.

2007 KENTUCKY 35 VS. FLORIDA STATE 28


MVP gave the Wildcats the lead for good midway through the third quarter, passing off a two-yard slant to Rafael Little who ran for a season-high 152 yards on 28 carries. Florida State quarterback Drew Weatherford brought his team to within one score by throwing a touchdown pass with just more than two minutes remaining, but a last second attempt to tie the game fell incomplete in the end zone.



2008 VANDERBILT 16 VS. BOSTON COLLEGE 14

MVP BRETT UPSON, VANDERBILT

Boston College had won eight straight bowl games, the nation's longest active streak, entering the 2008 Bowl. Despite giving up only 200 yards and allowing Vanderbilt to convert only one of its 15 third downs, the Eagles could not fly past the Commodores. Vanderbilt's Bryant Hahnfeldt kicked a 45-yard field goal with 3:26 remaining for a 16-14 win over Boston College. Vanderbilt won a bowl game for the first time in 53 years. The victory gave the Commodores their first winning season since 1982, the last time they played in a bowl – the SEC's longest drought.




2009 CLEMSON 21 VS. KENTUCKY 13

Spiller racked up 172 all-purpose yards, as well as a rushing touchdown, and was named the Bowl's MVP. Kentucky jumped out to an early lead in this contest as quarterback Morgan Newton hit Chris Matthews for a 17-yard touchdown strike. However, Clemson's defense would not allow another touchdown in this game and held Kentucky to thirteen points. Clemson grabbed the lead late in the second quarter on a one-yard touchdown run by Jamie Harper and led for the rest of the game. Clemson was able to avenge their 2006 loss to Kentucky in the Bowl.

2010 NORTH CAROLINA 30 VS. TENNESSEE 27

MVP SHAUN DRAUGHN, NORTH CAROLINA

This first time match-up between the Tennessee Volunteers and the North Carolina Tar Heels turned into an unforgettable double overtime win for North Carolina. The Tar Heels outscored the Vols 30-27 in front of a sold out crowd of 69,143. Tennessee quarterback Tyler Bray threw an 8-yard TD pass to put the Vols ahead 20-17 with 5:16 remaining. At the end of the 4th



quarter North Carolina received a flag for too many men on the field. This allowed the Tar Heels one second back on the clock to kick a field goal to force overtime. UNC linebacker, Quan Sturdivant, intercepted Bray on second-and-9 setting up Casey Barth to kick a game-winning 23-yard field goal.

2012 VANDERBILT 38 VS. NORTH CAROLINA STATE 24

MVP ZAC STACY, VANDERBILT

Riding an opportunistic defense, Vanderbilt defeated North Carolina State 38-24 to win the 2012 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl. Vanderbilt took control of the game early when receiver Chris Boyd made a one-handed catch in the end zone on a 5-yard pass from Jordan Rodgers. In the second quarter Zac Stacy scored on a six yard run to make it 14-0 Commodores. North Carolina State would twice cut the lead to seven points in the first half.

However, with just 41 seconds remaining in the first half Rodgers connected with Jordan Matthews on an 18-yard touchdown to put the Commodores ahead, 28-14. In the second half the Wolfpack would get no closer as Vanderbilt rode the game's MVP Stacy to victory. The win capped the Commodores best season in generations, finishing 9-4.



2011 MISSISSIPPI STATE 23 VS. WAKE FOREST 17

MVP VICK BALLARD, MISSISSIPPI STATE

With the two longest touchdown runs in Mississippi State's bowl history, senior Vick Ballard lead the Bulldogs to a 23-17 victory over Wake Forest. The game's MVP, Ballard ran for a career-high 180 yards. The Demon Deacons tallied first after converting on a first quarter fumble by Ballard, however, the Bulldogs rebutted with 16 unanswered points. Wake Forest sophomore quarterback Tanner Price and the Demon Deacon offense were unable to rally and overcome the deficit, despite possessing the ball for over 35 minutes. The victory was Mississippi State's fifth straight bowl victory and second consecutive under Coach Dan Mullen.





BOWL HISTORY

2013 OLE MISS 25 VS. GEORGIA TECH 17

MVP BO WALLACE, OLE MISS

Bo Wallace ran for two touchdowns and threw for another score, and Ole Miss beat Georgia Tech 25-17 in the Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl. Wallace helped Ole Miss lead 13-7 at halftime as he capped the opening possession for Ole Miss with a 17-yard run for a touchdown, and he connected with Moncrief on a 28-yard TD catch. Ole Miss had a 23-7 lead when the Yellow Jackets scored 10 straight points. Harrison Butker capped a 64-yard drive with a 38-yard field goal in the opening seconds of the fourth quarter, then D.J. White intercepted a Wallace pass intended for Donte Moncrief. On the next play, Lee found Darren Waller for a 72-yard catch-and-run for a TD with 13:25 left. Yellow Jackets lineman Adam Gotsis knocked down a 32-yard field goal attempt by Andrew Ritter giving Georgia Tech the ball at their own 20 with



4:36 left trailing 23-17. But Georgia Tech fumbled and right tackle Ray Beno covered up the ball in the end zone for the safety. Georgia Tech got the ball back for one last try with 37 seconds left, but Senquez Golson intercepted Lee to seal the victory for the Rebels.

2014 NOTRE DAME 31 VS. LSU 28

MVP MALIK ZAIRE, NOTRE DAME

LSU, led by one of the NCAA's elite running backs, Leonard Fournette, entered the 2014 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl boasting the title of best defense in the SEC. Notre Dame had been ranked as high as fifth in the nation during the 2014 season, before closing out their year by losing five of their last six games. With Notre Dame up by seven and the clock winding down to half time, LSU attempted a fake field goal. LSU's Brad Kragthorpe took hold of the ball and ran towards the end zone, before being stopped short of the goal line. Later in the game,

with the score tied 28-28, LSU's field goal attempt was blocked by Notre Dame to keep the game tied early in the fourth quarter. Notre Dame was able to take possession of the ball with 5:41 left in the game. In the end, Malik Zaire and Everett Golson ran 14 plays for 71 yards in a physical drive down the field, ultimately setting up kicker Kyle Brindza with a 32-yard field goal attempt. Brindza managed to drill the ball through the uprights as time expired, giving Notre Dame the win.



2015 LOUISVILLE 27 VS. TEXAS A&M 21

MVP LAMAR JACKSON, LOUISVILLE

The 2015 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl between the University of Louisville and Texas A&M University game got off to a fast start. Louisville and Lamar Jackson sprinted out to grab a 13-0 lead, due in part to a couple of big plays by the offense and punt return units. However, Texas A&M stopped the bleeding as they answered with a 70-yard touchdown drive, which put them on the scoreboard. It took Louisville three plays to respond to this play by Texas A&M; Lamar Jackson danced his way to a 61-yard run to the endzone, putting the game at 20-7. A&M's defense came to play in the fourth quarter and really shut down the Louisville attack.



A&M got the ball back and went 83 yards on the shoulders of Hubenak to score a touchdown that made the game a one possession game with 4:54 left. A&M then forced a three-and-out to get the ball back. Hubenak lead A&M down to the Louisville 24-yard line before Louisville's defense stepped up and forced a stop to give their offense the ball with 1:39 left in the game. Louisville ran the clock out to win the 18th annual Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl with a final score of 27-21.

2016 TENNESSEE 38 VS. NEBRASKA 24

MVP JOSHUA DOBBS, TENNESSEE

The 2016 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl featured the Tennessee Volunteers and the Nebraska Cornhuskers. After a scoreless first quarter, the Volunteer's John Kelley had a 28-yard run into the end zone for an early lead in the second. On Tennessee's next drive, quarterback Josh Dobbs was able to take advantage of his explosive offensive line, taking the ball right into the end zone on his own on after a 10 yard rush in the red zone. With nearly one minute left in the half, Nebraska's Brandon Reilly made a 38-yard touchdown reception to cut the Volunteers lead in half. Tennessee quickly ran the ball for 9 plays and 73 yards, lining up Dobbs for his second rushing touchdown of the day. Tennessee's Aaron Medley kicked a 46-yard field goal to complete the first scoring play of the second half. Nebraska's Ryker Fyfe found Brandon Reilly again for their second touchdown of the day with 3:26 left in the third, making the score now 24-14. Dobbs began

the fourth quarter with another short run into the end zone for his third touchdown. With a field goal and a rushing touchdown from Fyfe on Nebraska's next two drives, it was just a one-score game with 10 minutes left to play. Tennessee was able to pull away however with one more big touchdown reception from Dobbs to Josh Malone for 59 yards. Tennessee ran the clock out to win 38-24.

2017 NORTHWESTERN 24 VS. KENTUCKY 23

MVP JUSTIN JACKSON, NORTHWESTERN The 2017 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl featured the University of Kentucky and Northwestern University. To start the first half, Kentucky star Bennie Snell Jr.'s rushing touchdown gave the Kentucky Wildcats a 7-0 lead. Northwestern's starting quarterback Clayton Thorson was carted off the field due to a serious right knee injury. Following Thorson's injury, Snell Jr. was ejected for contact with an official. After a Northwestern field goal. Northwestern running back Justin Jackson scored two straight touchdowns to give them a 17-7 lead. Kentucky quarterback Stephen Johnson was taken to the locker room after what appeared to be a late hit out of bounds on the Kentucky sideline. Johnson started the second half for Kentucky and halfway through the third quarter, Johnson ran the ball for a touchdown bringing the score to 17-14. Northwestern linebacker Kyle Queiro intercepted the ball for a touchdown, putting Northwestern up 10. A few minutes later Kentucky kicker Austin McGinnis made a 48-yard field goal bringing the score to 24-17. Johnson ran for another touchdown, bringing Kentucky within one point, 24-23. Kentucky went for two with 27 seconds left on the clock. The pass was not completed in the end zone. Northwestern won the 20th Annual Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl with the final score of 24-23.



2018 AUBURN 63 VS. PURDUE 14

MVP JARRET STIDHAM, AUBURN

The 2018 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl featured the Auburn Tigers and the Purdue Boilermakers. Early in the first quarter, Jarrett Stidham threw a 66-yard pass to JaTarvious Whitlow for a touchdown to take a 7-0 lead over the Boilermakers. On Auburn's next drive, they drove down the field to set up a 2-yard rushing touchdown by JaTarvious Whitlow to take the 14-0 lead over the Boilermakers. After another Auburn touchdown. Purdue's offense struck back with a 12-play 78-yard drive that resulted in a 7-yard rushing touchdown by Rondale Moore to cut the deficit to 14. Going into the second quarter Auburn's offense remained hot and Jarrett Stidham came back on the next drive to throw a 52-yard touchdown pass to Darius Slayton. Auburn's Big Kat Bryant forces the second turnover of the game with a pick-6 to the house to help Auburn go up 35 on the Boilermakers. Right before the half, Stidham connected a 34-yard strike to Darius Slayton that put Auburn up 56-7. In the third quarter, Auburn's offense started where they left off with Jarrett Stidham throwing a 5-yard touchdown pass to Ryan Davis to go up 63-7. Purdue fought back and David Blough rushed for 22 yards to score their second touchdown of the game, Jarrett Stidham was named the Most Valuable Player with an amazing stat line of 15-21, 375 passing yards and five touchdowns.



2019 LOUISVILLE 38 VS. MISSISSIPPI STATE 28

MVP MALIK CUNNINGHAM, LOUISVILLE
The 2019 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl
helped celebrate the 150th anniversary of college football by
featuring a thrilling showdown between the Mississippi State
Bulldogs and Louisville Cardinals.

In front of a raucous crowd of nearly 47,000 fans, both teams exchanged leads in the first half. After a few halftime adjustments, first-year Cardinals coach Scott Satterfield helped guide Louisville to a dominant second half and the program's first bowl win in four years.

The bowl festivities were capped-off with a postgame concert inside the bowl's Fan Zone on Broadway featuring Gary LeVox of Rascal Flatts.

In all, tens of thousands of fans packed into downtown during one of the city's top weekends leading to \$16.7 million in direct economic impact.










MVP. BROC THOMPSON, PURDUE



Following the unfortunate cancellation of the 2020 TransPerfect Music City Bowl, Nashville's holiday tradition returned with a bang.

The 2021 matchup between Tennessee and Purdue saw record-breaking numbers and acclaim across the board. A crowd of 69,489 fans packed Nissan Stadium, breaking the 2010 record of 69,143 and making it the third-most attended game during Bowl Season only trailing the Rose Bowl and Cotton Bowl (CFP Playoff). The game was the top attended non-NY6 game.

Viewership was also among the best during Bowl Season with the game drawing 5.6 million viewers on ESPN making it the second-most viewed non-NY6 game. The bowl also surpassed

100 million all-time viewers following this year's broadcast. The thrilling final 15 minutes, which saw Purdue win on 48-45 in overtime, drew a staggering 8.9 million viewers, according to ESPN

The game itself saw multiple records broken including total yardage (1,293), combined points (93) team total yards (Tennessee, 666) and first downs (31). Individually, Purdue quarterback Aiden O'Connell broke the record for most passing yards (534) and his receiver, Broc Thompson, broke the record for receiving yards with 217 during his MVP performance. Tennessee linebacker Jeremy Banks broke the record for most tackles with 20.

A graduate of Old Dominion University, where he attended on a golf scholarship, Scott Ramsey has over 30 years of experience in the sports marketing industry. Scott is currently responsible for the day-to-day activities for both the Nashville Sports Council and the TransPerfect Music City Bowl.

As a result of his leadership, Ramsey was named Nashvillian of the Year in 1998 by the Kiwanis Club of Nashville. He served as national Chairman of the Football Bowl Association for 2007 & 2008 and served on its Executive Committee for 16 years. In 2003, the Nashville Sports Council was named the National Sports Commission of the Year by the membership of the National Association of Sports Commissions. During Ramsey's tenure with the Nashville Sports Council and TransPerfect

Music City Bowl, the organizations have combined to deliver over \$850 million in economic impact, hundreds of hours of national television coverage and recruited and staged nearly 200 sporting events in Middle Tennessee.

Recently under Ramsey's leadership the Nashville Sports Council announced that Nashville will serve as host city for the SEC Men's Basketball Tournaments through 2035, with one exception in 2022 when Nashville will host the SEC Women's Basketball Tournament. The Nashville Sports Council co-hosted, along with the Ohio Valley Conference, the incredibly successful 2014 NCAA Women's Final Four for the first time in Music City. And in 2016, the NSC partnered with the Nashville Predators to host what was arguably the best NHL All-Star Weekend in the NHL's history of that event. The NSC was also a supporting organization for Nashville's inaugural hosting of the NFL Draft in April of 2019. coinciding on the same weekend with the 20th anniversary of the St.

Jude Rock 'n' Roll Marathon and Half-Marathon. Nashville also hosted the 2021 SEC Football Media Days for the first time in Music City.

Nashville was named the Best Sports City in 2019 by the Sports Business Journal. Events like the 2019 NFL Draft, 2019 Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl, SEC Men's Basketball Tournament, the St. Jude Rock 'N' Roll Nashville Marathon & 1/2 Marathon are just a few examples of how the Music City showed the world what being a sports fan is all about. With upcoming events like the 2023 SEC Media Days and a lineup of SEC basketball at Bridgestone Arena through 2035, the Nashville Sports Council looks forward to helping keep Nashville the best sports city in the country."

Ramsey moved to Nashville in 1995 when he accepted the executive director position for the 1997 U.S. Figure Skating Championships. The Championships were the first sporting event in the new Nashville Arena and national organizers called the event the best-managed national championships ever.

Prior to his move to Nashville, Ramsey spent eight years with USA Gymnastics, the national governing body for gymnastics within the United States Olympic Committee family. Ramsey began his sports marketing career in the golf business working at River Wilderness CC in Bradenton, Fla., and as an account executive position with the Washington Bullets (now Wizards) of the NBA.

Ramsey and his wife, Amy, are natives of the Indianapolis area and now live in Hendersonville, Tenn. They have four children, Payton Elrod, (Clayton), Carly, Jessica, and Ray, and two grandchildren, Briar Ann Elrod and Hayes Elrod.
