## News Media Information

**KINNICK STADIUM** is located on the west campus in the heart of the University's athletic complex. It is a few minutes' drive from Interstate 80 and the Iowa City airport, about 30 minutes from the Cedar Rapids airport.

**PRESSBOX** at the stadium is on the west side and accessible by elevator. One of the nation's finest, it was completed in 1958 at a cost of \$490,000 (cost to build Iowa Stadium was \$500,000 in 1929). The first deck has 89 seats for working press. The second deck contains 10 booths for radio and television. The third deck is for photographers and has additional radio booths. The fourth deck, not enclosed, is used in various ways. A pregame lunch is served on the first and second decks. The pressbox is 100 feet high and extends between the 25-yard lines.

**PRESS TICKET** requests should be directed to George Wine, sports information director. Requests should be filed early enough in advance to allow time for processing.

**ATHLETIC OFFICES** are located on the east side of the Iowa Field House. The Field House is also on the west campus, near the stadium.

**MOTELS** in the immediate Iowa City area include the Carousel (351-6324), Highlander Inn (354-2000), Ironmen Inn (351-6600), Holiday Inn (338-9771), Howard Johnson Lodge (338-7841), Old Capital Inn (338-7901), Ramada Inn (645-2940).

## The Athletic Director

CHALMERS (BUMP) ELLIOTT is in his sixth term as Iowa's top athletic administrator. He was appointed to the position June 11, 1970, and oversees a staff of more than 35 men, 11 intercollegiate sports and a large physical plant. Bump's rise through the Big Ten ranks has been punctuated with success at every stop. Highlights of his tenure at Iowa include six Big Ten championships in three sports plus an NCAA wrestling title.



Elliott has been personally involved in four Big Ten football titles and four Rose Bowl appearances. He was an assistant coach at Iowa for five years and helped build the Hawkeyes into the power of the Big Ten that began with league and bowl championships in 1956.

Iowa won two more Big Ten crowns in the next four years, but Bump was tapped by his alma mater, Michigan, to join the staff there in 1957. He became head coach two years later, and his term as Wolverine boss was highlighted by conference and Rose Bowl wins in 1964. Elliott's 10-year record was 51-42-2 when he quit coaching after the 1968 season to accept administrative duties. After 18 months as Michigan's associate AD, he became athletic director at Iowa.

Elliott played three sports at Michigan in 1946-47-48. A brilliant halfback, he topped the Big Ten in scoring in 1947 with 54 points and spurred the Wolverines to Big Ten and Rose Bowl championships. He led his team in pass receiving and averaged more than five yards a carry. He earned All-America honors, as did his brother Pete, a Michigan quarterback. Bump also played parts of two seasons (1943-44) as a Marine trainee at Purdue. He was selected the Big Ten's MVP in 1947.

Elliott's first coaching job was as an assistant at Oregon State (1948-51). Then he served on the staffs at Iowa (1952-56) and Michigan (1957-58) before becoming head coach there.

Bump is a native of Bloomington, Ill. His father, Dr. J. Norman Elliott, was a physician there and also coached at Illinois Wesleyan and Northwestern. Bump was discharged from the Marines in 1946 and received his degree at Michigan in 1948. He and his wife Barbara have three children: Bill, Bob (a member of the Iowa football team) and Betsy. Bump was born in Detroit January 30, 1925.

## The Head Coach

BOB COMMINGS earned a great deal of respect in his first year as Iowa's head football coach. He stepped from the high school ranks to the Big Ten, took a program that had failed to win a game the previous season and got it



headed in the right direction. Under Commings, Iowa was a well-organized, disciplined team that played interesting, competitive football. The season was only a week old when the Hawkeyes zonked nationally rated UCLA 21-10. The Hawkeyes, picked for last in a pre-season poll, won two Big Ten games and Commings was runnerup in the league's coach of the year balloting.

Success at Iowa is nothing new to Commings, who enjoyed plenty as a player. The smallest lineman in the Big Ten at 173 pounds, Bob was a junior guard on Iowa's Big Ten and Rose Bowl

championship team of 1956. The following season he won all-conference honors and was named his team's most valuable player. The Hawkeyes had a record of 16-2-1 in Bob's last two years at Iowa. He topped his collegiate career by playing in the North-South Game at Miami.

Bob finished his undergraduate work at Iowa and stayed on to serve as an assistant freshman coach two seasons. He left coaching for a brief time, then took over at Struthers, Ohio, in 1962 and in the next seven years compiled a record of 50-16-4. That was good enough to earn him a shot at the top job in the state: Washington High School in Massillon. In five seasons at the tradition-rich high school, Commings produced a record of 44-5-1 and had the state championship team in 1970, when he earned coach of the year honors. His total high school record is 94-21-5.

Bob is a native of Youngstown, Ohio, where he was an all-state football guard and a baseball shortstop. He enrolled at Iowa in 1952, won a letter the next season, then spent two years in the Army in Europe. He is married to the former Sharon McGinnis of Iowa City. The couple has two sons, Bob Jr. and Don.

An entertaining public speaker, Bob has appeared before literally thousands of persons since taking the Iowa job December 14, 1973. One of several former Massillon coaches now in major college or professional football, Bob is big on physical conditioning and regularly plays paddleball and tennis. He is the fifth former Hawkeye to coach at his alma mater. Commings was born December 24, 1932, in Youngstown, Ohio.

## Dave Beckman Offensive Line

A native of Bellevue, Ohio, where he was an all-state lineman, Beckman went on to Baldwin-Wallace College and starred in football and track. He coached in Ohio high schools at Youngstown, Warren and Akron after a year on the staff at Baldwin-Wallace. He came to Iowa Dec. 21, 1973, after coaching at the college level at Adrian and Evansville. He and his wife Pat have two sons, Tim and Ted. Born 6/8/38.

## Tom Cecchini Linebackers

Cecchini (pronounced Cha-kee-nee) was a linebacker at Michigan for Bump Elliott. He was team captain, all-Big Ten, twice named national lineman of the week, and played in the North-South game. A Detroit native, he was the freshman coach at Michigan before joining the Xavier staff. He was head coach there two years before moving to Iowa Jan. 25, 1974. Tom and his wife Lynn have two sons, David and Jason. Born 9/12/46.

## Larry Coyer Defensive Coordinator

An outstanding defensive back and wrestler at Marshall, Coyer was named that school's athlete of the year as a senior. He served on the staff of his alma mater, then took high school jobs at Martins Ferry and Massillon in Ohio. He was on Bob Commings' staff at Massillon. Coyer was at Bowling Green a year before joining the Iowa staff Dec. 20, 1973. He is a native of West Virginia. Born 4/19/43.

## Dennis Green Receivers

A former Hawkeye who ranks tenth on Iowa's career scoring list, Green was a graduate assistant at his alma mater before serving on the Dayton staff. He was a tailback-wingback at Iowa and as a sophomore ran for 175 yards against TCU, a one-game performance that ranks fifth in the Hawkeye record book. A native of Harrisburg, Pa., he joined the Iowa staff Jan. 2, 1974. He and his wife Margie have two children, Patti and Jeremy. Born 2/17/49.

**Dan McDonald**  
Defensive Line

A defensive end for three consecutive first-division teams at Iowa, McDonald captained the Hawkeyes his senior year. He was head coach at Regina of Iowa City before serving on the Iowa staff as a graduate assistant. He became a full-time assistant Mar. 1, 1974. A native of Saginaw, Mich., and an all-state football player there, he and his wife Patti are expecting their first child. Born 7/15/49.

Captain of Northern Iowa's 1964 conference championship team, Stephenson coached at Wayne State, North Dakota, Oklahoma State and SMU before joining the Iowa staff Dec. 21, 1973. Oklahoma State ranked eighth in the nation in rushing, SMU ninth, when he coached at those schools. A native of Anita, Ia., he and his wife Shirley have two children, Heide and Kyle. Born 2/4/42.

**Howard Vernon**  
Offensive Coordinator

Vernon started the most successful high school football program in Iowa at East Waterloo, where he had three straight perfect seasons. He then became the school's principal before moving back into coaching at Iowa Jan. 9, 1973. His high school coaching record is 72-28-2. A two-sports star at Upper Iowa, he is a member of the Iowa Coaches Hall of Fame and was named coach of the year in 1967. He and his wife Alma have two children, Howie and Vicki. Born 4/16/35.

**Bernie Wyatt**  
Defensive Ends

An MVP for Iowa as a junior in 1960, Wyatt was a defensive back who intercepted seven career passes and played in the Blue-Gray game following his senior season. He coached at Regina of Iowa City and Lindenhurst, N.Y., before returning Jan. 15, 1974, to coach at his alma mater. An All-American prep at Amityville, N.Y., he and his wife Barbara have two sons, Brad and Barry. Born 8/21/38.

### Bill Whisler—Varsity Reserve Coach

As an offensive end for the Hawkeyes, Whisler caught 30 passes for 444 yards and four touchdowns. He played in the North-South game following his senior season. He played 10 years in the Canadian League as a defensive end—at Winnipeg, Vancouver and Montreal—and made all-league four times. He played in the first Canadian all-star game. Bill was on the coaching staff at Yankton College before coming to Iowa Feb. 27, 1974. Bill's wife's name is Earlyn. Born 11/15/40.

## The Outlook

There is every reason to believe that Iowa's 1975 football team will continue to show improvement in Coach Bob Commings' second season. Bob took over a program that had gone winless in 1973 and directed the Hawkeyes to three victories in their first seven games last fall. Then injuries piled up and Iowa—not blessed with defensive depth—got outmuscled in its last four games.

In the final game at Michigan State, for instance, the Hawkeyes had a 21-17 lead late in the first half, then lost 60-21. Iowa was tied 7-7 with Wisconsin at half-time before losing 28-15. It was close (14-10) against Ohio State at intermission, then the Buckeyes prevailed 35-10.

Commings and his coaching staff worked hard during spring practice trying to construct a defense that will prevent second-half collapses in 1975.

"As long as you stay close you have a chance," Bob preaches to his Hawkeyes. They stayed close enough to Illinois last fall so that a last-minute touchdown earned them a 14-12 victory.

If Iowa can hold an opponent to two touchdowns this season it will have an excellent chance to win, because the Hawkeye offense should be very good. It's a veteran unit with adequate depth. The line is big and so are the backs. The offense should score a lot of points.

The offense has eight returning starters, the defense seven and 44 lettermen are on the roster. Recruiting was geared to give relief to the defense and some quality players are in the freshman class. The schedule—although not as murderous as last year—is still difficult, with four opponents listed in the top 15 in most pre-season polls.

**THE OFFENSE:** This is a senior-dominated unit that has depth and size. The line is led by two huge veterans—guard

Joe Devlin and tackle Rod Walters. They are tough and durable and line up side by side. When Iowa is third and one they will likely be the point of attack. Center Ed Myers is a third returning interior starter.

All backs carry the ball in Iowa's deceptive wing-T attack and five veterans are Jim Jensen, Rod Wellington, Bob Holmes, Mark Fetter and Ed Donovan. They had a combined total of more than 2,000 yards last year and all except Donovan weigh well over 200 pounds. Jensen has gained 1,168 yards in two seasons and ranks ninth among career rushers at Iowa. Add to this group transfer Dave Schick, who was very impressive during spring practice.

The quarterback position has not come into focus following the graduation of Rob Fick. It's a race between three lettermen and Commings is in no hurry to pick a starter. Battling for the spot are Tom McLaughlin, Butch Caldwell and Doug Reichardt and only Caldwell has much experience. He was a frequent starter in 1973, showing ability to score

touchdowns from long range, then was redshirted last year following an appendectomy. McLaughlin lettered with the specialty teams as a freshman and Reichardt played some before injuring a knee at midseason.

Split end Bill Schultz (25 catches, 423 yards) and tight end Co-Captain Brandt Yocom (18-248) were the leading pass receivers last year. Fetter and Wellington ranked 3-4. Two wide receivers, both medical redshirts, who will challenge for starting roles are Jim McNulty and Steve Paulson.

Quoting Commings: "Quarterback is a very healthy situation and we expect it to remain that way. We have a lot of talented and experienced running backs and I expect us to hit the home run more this year. Our line, with Devlin and Walters leading the way, is strong. I'm confident we'll have a good passing game."

**THE DEFENSE:** Although not as bright as the offense, the outlook here is not bleak. Commings insists the Hawkeyes can stop people if he can put his best players on the field at the same time. He couldn't do that during spring practice because of injury to some key players.

Among them were tackles Lester Washington and Steve Wojan, recovering from surgery. They are both seasoned veterans—Washington is an all-star candidate—and they'll have to return 100 percent effective for Iowa to be strong defensively because the Hawkeyes have depth problems at tackle and linebacker.

They don't have problems in the secondary, however, which includes seven quality players and is missing only Earl Douthitt from the unit that led the nation in pass defense last year. Veteran cornerbacks are Jim Caldwell, Bob Elliott, Bob Salter and Roger Stech. Top

safeties are lettermen Shanty Burks and Rick Penney and second-semester freshman Charles Danzy.

Linebackers Andre Jackson and John Campbell are two of five defenders who have won three letters each. Jackson is a solid all-star candidate. Veteran Dennis Armington is the No. 1 backup at linebacker, a position where some enterprising freshmen have an opportunity to make their mark.

At nose guard, Dave Bryant will be in the middle of things. Mark Phillips and Dave Wagner will probably line up at ends, which would give Commings an all-veteran starting unit. The depth problem at tackle should be helped with the return of Warren Peiffer and Rick Marsh, both in the 6-5, 250-pound range. Peiffer was an offensive tackle before redshirting last season, and Marsh, who has played several positions, dropped from school for a year. John Bowlsby, an outstanding heavyweight wrestler, came on strong in spring practice (his first experience with college football) and could be a big plus at middle guard.

Quoting Commings: "It was hard to make valid observations in the spring with so many defensive players sidelined. We'll be alright if we stay together and get some reserve strength from our freshmen. We have a pleasant situation in the secondary. I wish we were as well off everywhere as we are there."

**KICKING GAME:** Nick Quartaro returns to handle kickoffs and placements. He never missed on conversions and made one-third of his field goal tries last year. "Nick had a strong spring," says Commings. "I hope we can put him in a position to be a factor in several games." The punting job is wide open following the graduation of Joe Heppner. Quarterback Tom McLaughlin, who averaged more than 38 yards on three boots last year, may wind up with the job.

## Historical Highlights

- 1889—Played first intercollegiate football game.
- 1899—First undefeated season (8-0-1) was recorded under Coach Alden Knipe. Admitted to the Western Conference (Big Ten) Dec. 1.
- 1900—A share of the conference championship highlighted another unbeaten season.
- 1901—Loss to Minnesota ended string of 23 games without defeat.
- 1921—First unbeaten and untied team (7-0) was coached by Howard Jones and won clear Big Ten title.
- 1922—Another perfect season (7-0) included share of conference crown with Michigan.
- 1923—Loss to Illinois ended string of 20 straight victories.
- 1929—Suspended from Big Ten for one year.
- 1939—Dr. Eddie Anderson coached the Iron Men, led by halfback Nile Kinnick, recipient of the Heisman Trophy, the Maxwell Award, and the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1952—Forest Evashevski named head coach.
- 1955—Guard Cal Jones received the Outland Award.
- 1956—Won the Big Ten and appeared in Rose Bowl for the first time. Finished 9-1 in all games and beat Oregon State at Pasadena.
- 1957—Tackle Alex Karras received the Outland Award.
- 1958—Big Ten champions again and made California a victim in the Rose Bowl. Honors included No. 1 ranking by the Football Writers and Grantland Rice trophy by Look Magazine. Led the nation in total offense. Quarterback Randy Duncan was named the Helms Foundation Player of the Year and received the Walter Camp Trophy.
- 1960—Shared the Big Ten title with Minnesota. Evashevski quit coaching to devote full time to the athletic directorship after the completion of 8-1 season.
- 1961—Shutout by Purdue ended string of 78 games in which one or more touchdowns were scored.
- 1963—Notre Dame game was canceled following the assassination of President Kennedy.
- 1964—Some 28 Iowa and Big Ten records were broken despite 3-6 season.
- 1968—Big Ten scoring and total-offense marks set by Hawkeyes.
- 1969—Black boycott disrupted spring practice.
- 1972—Iowa Stadium was renamed Kinnick Stadium in honor of Iowa's Heisman Trophy winner of 1939. AstroTurf was installed.
- 1973—Bob Commings was named head coach Dec. 15.

## Herky and the Hawkeyes

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawk-eye was originally applied to a hero in a fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Author Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived and hunted with them.



In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James G. Edwards of Ft. Madison. Edwards, editor of the Ft. Madison *Patriot*, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the *Burlington Hawk-Eye*. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name and were rewarded when territorial officials gave it their formal approval.

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawk, was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism. The impish hawk was an immediate hit and he acquired a name

through a state-wide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky.

Since his birth more than 25 years ago, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron.

During the mid-1950s Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot with a black leather head and gold felt feathers. Since then Herky has become a familiar figure at Hawk-eye athletic events.

### Floyd of Rosedale

A bet in 1935 between Minnesota Governor Floyd B. Olson and Iowa Governor Clyde Herring gave birth to Floyd of Rosedale. Tensions between the two state universities had been running high and a wager was made in an effort to relieve the situation. After Iowa lost the game, Herring presented Olson with Floyd of Rosedale, a full-blooded champion pig and a brother of Blue Boy of Will Rogers' movie, "State Fair." Olson presented the pig to the University of Minnesota and commissioned St. Paul sculptor Charles Brioscho to capture Floyd's image. The result is a bronze pig 21 inches long and 15 inches high. Floyd is currently in residence in Minneapolis, but the Hawkeyes hope to regain possession of the pig this fall.
