**2001 RECORDS** - - Iowa is 2-0 after wins over Kent State (51-0) and Miami-Ohio (44-19) in Iowa City. Penn State is 0-2 after losses to Miami (FL) (33-7) and Wisconsin (18-6). Both games were play at University Park.

**ATTENDANCE** - - A crowd of 68,000 is expected. Tickets are on sale at the Iowa Athletic Ticket Office.

**HOMECOMING** is being observed this weekend. This is Iowa's 90<sup>th</sup> homecoming game with a 45-39-5 record. It's only the second time that Penn State has served as Iowa's homecoming opponent. The other time came back in 1930 with Iowa winning by a 19-0 margin.

**THE SERIES** - - This is the 16<sup>th</sup> game in the series and Penn State has a 10-5 series lead. The Hawkeyes have won two of the last three, including a 26-23 win in double-overtime last year. The Nittany Lions last beat Iowa in 1999 (31-7 in Iowa City). Iowa is 1-7 against Penn State in Iowa City.

**COACHING RECORDS** - - Kirk Ferentz is in his sixth year as a college head coach and his third year at Iowa. His career record is 18-40 and he's 6-19 at Iowa. He is 1-1 against Penn State. Joe Paterno is in his 36<sup>th</sup> year as Penn State's head coach. He has a 322-92-3 record. He is 10-4 against Iowa and 1-1 against Kirk Ferentz. He is the second winningest coach in NCAA history.

## IOWA BACK IN ACTION

Iowa (2-0, 0-0) opens Big Ten Conference action Saturday by hosting Penn State (0-2, 0-1). Game time is 11:10 a.m. in Kinnick Stadium (70,397).

## ON THE TUBE

ESPN will televise the contest to a national cable audience. Steve Levy, Todd Christensen and Dave Ryan will call the action.

## RADIO BROADCAST

Iowa games are broadcast on the Hawkeye Radio Network. Gary Dolphin handles the play-by-play, with color commentator Ed Podolak and sideline reporter Mark Allen. The Hawkeye Radio Network includes more than 50 stations throughout the state.

## HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,017 games since beginning football in 1889. Overall Iowa's record is 504-474-39 (.515). That includes a 319-190-16 (.623) record in home games, a 185-284-23 (.399) record in games away from Iowa City, a 241-319-25 (.433) mark in Big Ten games and a 201-156-15 (.560) record in Kinnick Stadium.

## STARTING OFF RIGHT

Iowa has opened the season with consecutive wins for the first time since 1997. The Hawkeyes began the 1997 season with four straight wins. Iowa has not won its opening Big Ten game since a 37-14 win at Illinois in 1998.

## RESULTS TO DATE

Iowa has not played since a 44-19 win over Miami, OH Sept. 8. The Hawkeyes opened the season with a 51-0 win over Kent State. Penn State opened conference play last weekend with an 18-6 loss to Wisconsin. The Nittany Lions lost their season opener, 33-7 to Miami, FL. Both games were played at University Park.

## COLLECTING VOTES

Iowa is listed among teams receiving votes in both the Associated Press ratings and the ESPN/USA Today coaches poll.

## HAWKEYE HOMECOMING

Iowa holds a 45-39-5 record in homecoming games. Iowa, last year, defeated Michigan State (21-16) to stop a four-game homecoming losing streak. Penn State has been the opponent just once for Iowa's homecoming, with the Hawkeyes winning (19-0) in 1930.

## ON THIS DATE

Iowa is 11-2 when playing on September 29. The Hawkeyes defeated Illinois 21-16 in 1984, Iowa State 30-14 in 1979, Oregon State 28-8 in 1962, Indiana 27-0 in 1956, Kansas State 16-0 in 1951, Southern Cal 20-14 in 1950, Berg AAF 14-13 in 1945, South Dakota 34-0 in 1934, Oklahoma A&M 20-0 in 1923 and Coe College 16-0 in 1903. Iowa lost to Miami, FL 48-21 in 1990 and Penn State 27-8 in 1973.

## MCCANN EARNS BIG TEN HONOR

Senior QB Kyle McCann was named co-offensive Player of the Week in the Big Ten Conference for his play in Iowa's Sept. 8 win over Miami, OH. McCann completed 13-16 passes for 201 yards and career-high four touchdowns. His scoring strikes covered 15, 52, 18 and 32 yards. Iowa's Nate Kaeding was named special teams Player of the Week for his play in Iowa's win over Kent State.

## PATERNO NEAR MILESTONE

Joe Paterno, with 322 career wins, ranks second in all-time Division I coaching victories, just one win behind Bear Bryant. Paterno is one of seven coaches in NCAA history to record 300 wins (five in I-A), reaching the milestone faster than anyone (380 games). He is the only Division I-A coach with 300 wins at one school.

## Coach Kirk Ferentz

Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) is in his third season as Iowa's head football coach. Ferentz and the Hawkeyes posted a 3-9 record in 2001, winning two of the final three games of the season while playing one of the strongest schedules in the nation. Ferentz, at Iowa, holds a record of 6-19 and in five seasons as a college head coach his career mark is 18-40.



Nine of Iowa's 25 games in the last two seasons have been decided by seven points or less and 12 of the 25 were played against opponents who were ranked in the top 25 at the time.

Ferentz, 46, joined the Iowa staff after serving as assistant head coach and offensive line coach of the Baltimore Ravens of the National Football League. He had been part of the Baltimore (Cleveland Browns prior to the move) staff for six years.

Ferentz was named head coach of the Maine Bears in 1990 and held that position for three years. Ferentz was a member of Hayden Fry's Iowa staff for nine years as offensive line coach (1981-89). He coordinated Iowa's running game during his coaching stint with the Hawkeyes. Iowa appeared in eight bowl games during the time Ferentz was an Iowa assistant. A pair of Rose Bowls (1982 & 1986), two Holiday Bowl appearances (1986 & 1987) and a pair of Peach Bowl visits (1982 & 1988), along with appearances in the Gator (1983) and Freedom Bowls (1984) highlighted his previous Iowa stay. Iowa's record in those nine years was 73-33-4 and included two 10-win and two nine-win seasons.

Ferentz was born in Royal Oak, MI and attended high school in Pittsburgh, PA. Kirk earned his bachelor's degree in English Education from the University of Connecticut in 1978, where he was a football captain.

Ferentz is 1-1 vs. Penn State and Nittany Lion Coach Joe Paterno.

### THE SERIES

Penn State holds a 10-5 advantage in the series that began with a 19-0 Iowa win in 1930. Penn State had won four straight over Iowa through 1995, but the Hawkeyes have since won two of the last three meetings. Iowa is just 1-7 vs. Penn State in games played in Iowa City, as the Nittany Lions have won on their last seven visits. Conversely, Iowa has won on its last two visits to Penn State. Penn State has won four of the six meetings since the Nittany Lions joined the Big Ten. Here are the series results:

### IOWA, PSU NOTES

- Iowa's roster includes two players from Pennsylvania, Bob Sanders and Ed Hinkel, both from Erie. Sanders is a sophomore defensive back and Hinkel a true freshman wide receiver. Sanders is expected to return to action after missing the Miami game with an injury, while Hinkel has not played in Iowa's two games and is a redshirt candidate.
- Including the win at Penn State last season, Iowa has won four of its last five games. That also includes a win over Northwestern last season and wins this year over Kent State and Miami, OH. The loss was a narrow 27-24 setback at Minnesota.
- PSU assistant Ron Vanderlinden was the defensive coordinator at Northwestern in 1995 and 1996 when the Wildcats won consecutive Big Ten titles.

### IOWA EARNS OT WIN

Iowa scored 10 points in the two overtime periods to take a 26-23 win at Penn State, giving the Hawkeyes a victory in their first-ever overtime game. Iowa dominated play in the opening two quarters, building a 13-3 halftime advantage. Penn State rallied in the second half, pulling even at 13 and again at 16 late in the final period.

Iowa's overtime touchdown came on an 11-yard run by Ladell Betts after Penn State had opened the extra session with a touchdown. Nate Kaeding connected on a 26-yard field goal in the second overtime to give Iowa the advantage and the game ended when Iowa DB Ryan Hansen intercepted a pass on Penn State's first play of the second overtime.

Kaeding tied a school record with four field goals in the game, tying a mark held by three other Iowa kickers. He also tied an Iowa single-game record with 14 kicking points, a record he broke earlier this year against Kent State. Kaeding had field goals of 48, 49 and 46 yards before his game-winning 26-yard kick in the second overtime.

Betts rushed 25 times for 101 yards, while QB Kyle McCann completed 25-37 passes for 232 yards and one TD. WR Kahlil Hill had nine catches for 60 yards and WR Kevin Kasper had 96 yards on six receptions. LB Fred Barr led the Iowa defense with 12 tackles, while DB Benny Sapp had 10 tackles and four pass break-ups. Iowa punter Jason Baker averaged 50.2 yards on five punts as Penn State was faced with poor field position throughout the day.

## ***Iowa 44, Miami, OH 19***

Iowa jumped to a 24-0 halftime advantage on the way to a 44-19 win over Miami of Ohio Saturday in Iowa City. The Hawkeyes held the RedHawks to just 26 yards total offense in the first half and built the scoring advantage to 44-0 before Miami scored three times late in the game. Iowa held the ball for over 20 minutes in the first half while totaling 276 yards in the opening two quarters.

QB Kyle McCann led the Iowa offense, completing 13-16 passes for 201 yards and four scores. TE Dallas Clark had scoring receptions of 18 and 32 yards, Kahlil had a 52-yard scoring catch and Jeremy Allen scored on a 15-yard pass. Hill led Iowa receivers with six catches for 94 yards and Clark had 74 yards on four receptions.

The Iowa defense came up with two interceptions and a fumble recovery while recording five QB sacks. Chris Smith returned an interception 33 yards for a score and Aaron Kampman had his second interception of the season. Derrick Pickens recorded seven tackles, including four tackles for loss and two sacks, and Kampman recorded two sacks.

### ***IOWA'S FIRST OVERTIME***

Iowa's win at Penn State last season marked the first overtime ever for Iowa football. The Hawkeyes won the coin toss to start the first overtime and elected to play defense first. After allowing a Penn State touchdown, Iowa forced the second extra period when Ladell Betts scored on an 11-yard run.

Iowa had the ball first in the second overtime and was forced to settle for a 26-yard field goal from Nate Kaeding. The contest then ended when Iowa defensive back Ryan Hansen came up with an interception on Penn State's first offensive play of the second overtime period.

### ***FINAL GAME NOTES***

- QB Kyle McCann had a career high four TD passes. His previous high for TD passes was two in the win over Northwestern last season, the only other time he has thrown more than one scoring pass in a contest.

- Two Hawkeyes who started vs. Kent State did not play against Miami. OL Eric Steinbach and DB Bob Sanders did not play. DB Derek Pagel earned his first career start in place of Sanders, while David Porter started at right tackle and Sam Aiello moved from tackle to guard. OL Alonzo Cunningham missed his second straight game.
- DB Chris Smith had his first career interception, returning the theft 33 yards for a touchdown. That marks Iowa's first interception return for a score since Joe Slattery had a 47-yard return in a win at Illinois in 1998.
- Iowa had eight different players with at least one rushing attempt vs. Miami, 10 Hawkeyes had at least one pass reception, four players had a punt return, 29 players had defensive statistics and seven players had at least one tackle for loss.

### ***WISCONSIN STOPS PENN STATE***

Wisconsin used a solid rushing attack and a strong defense in registering an 18-6 win at Penn State. While the Badgers rushed for 320 yards, the Wisconsin defense held Penn State to 23 rushing yards and 131 yards total offense. Badger RB Anthony Davis did most of the damage, rushing 37 times for 200 yards. The Badgers held the ball for over 41 minutes in the contest, keeping the Penn State offense off the field. Penn State's touchdown came on a 50-yard pass from Matt Senneca to Larry Johnson in the third quarter.

### ***IOWA DEFENSE MAKES A STAND***

Iowa's defense has been much improved in the first two games of the season. The Hawkeyes recorded a shutout in the opening win over Kent State and led 44-0 last week against Miami before the RedHawks scored 19 points in the second half. Iowa held Miami to no pass completions and just 26 yards total offense in the first half. Miami gained 226 of its 338 total yards in the final 22 minutes of the game after Iowa led 44-0.

While Miami did score on some big plays, the RedHawk offense was never able to drive inside the Iowa 30-yardline. The Miami scores came on plays that covered 80, 56 and 40 yards. Iowa's defense against Kent State kept the Golden Flashes out of the end zone, and out of the red zone. The only time Kent State was inside the Iowa 30-yardline was after the Golden Flashes recovered an Iowa fumble. The Iowa defense has come up with five turnovers in two games; with six QB sacks and 14 pass break-ups.

In two games, Iowa opponents have gained less than 20 yards on 13 of 24 possessions.

### **KAEDING SETS SECOND RECORD**

Sophomore kicker Nate Kaeding has established an Iowa kicking record with 11 consecutive field goals. Kaeding made his final seven attempts over the final three games last season and he has made four straight this season. Kaeding broke the record with a 36-yard effort in Iowa's win over Miami. Kaeding has made 18-26 career field goal attempts, including 8-11 from outside 40 yards, and 31-32 PATs. Kaeding made the first 30 PATs of his career before missing against Miami. Rob Houghtlin set the previous record of 10 straight field goals in 1985.

Kaeding set an Iowa single game record with 15 kicking points in the win over Kent State, hitting three field goals and six PATs. Kaeding leads Iowa with 23 points in two games. Kaeding was named Big Ten special teams Player of the Week for his efforts in the win over Kent State.

Kaeding, in Iowa's win over Penn State last season, tied the Iowa single game record with four field goals.

### **KAEDING ON LOU GROZA WATCH LIST**

Sophomore PK Nate Kaeding is one of 30 pre-season candidates for the 10th annual Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award. The award is presented in early December. A list of 20 semi-finalists will be announced in late October and three finalists will be named in November. Kaeding is one of five sophomores on the early list.

### **HAWKEYES GET FIRST POINTS**

Hawkeye players who had not previously reached the endzone scored all Iowa's six touchdowns in the win over Kent State. Senior Jeremy Allen scored Iowa's first touchdown and sophomore Aaron Greving followed with three scores. Junior Siaki Massaquoi and sophomore Fred Russell each added a score in the fourth quarter. In addition, QB Brad Banks, TE Dallas Clark and DB Chris Smith scored their first career touchdowns in the win over Miami.

### **FIRST TIME STARTERS**

Two Iowa players started for the first time in the opening win over Kent State and another was in the starting line-up against Miami. Tight end Dallas Clark and outside linebacker Grant Steen, both native Iowans who joined the program as walk-ons, were in the starting line-up in the opening win, while DB Derek Pagel, also a former walk-on and native Iowan, started the win over Miami.

### **BETTS LEADS RUSHING ATTACK**

RB Ladell Betts led Iowa's rushing attack with 99 yards on 15 carries in the win over Kent State, and he added a 35-yard pass reception. In two games Betts has 25 carries for 136 yards. Betts, Iowa's leading rusher the last three seasons, ranks second in career rushing attempts and third in rushing yards. Betts' career totals include 634 rushing attempts for 2,762 yards and 15 TDs. He gained 1,090 yards last season, a figure that ranks seventh best for a single season. Betts has rushed for over 100 yards in a game on nine occasions, including four games in 2000, three games in 1999 and two games in 1998. His single-game best of 174 yards was against Northern Illinois in 1999 and he rushed for 154 yards vs. Minnesota last season. He has scored 96 career points and is tied for 11th in rushing touchdowns.

Betts last season became the first Hawkeye to rush for over 1,000 yards since Tavian Banks set the single-season record of 1,691 yards in 1997 and the ninth Iowa player ever to gain over 1,000 yards in a season.

Betts, who rushed for 857 yards in 1999, is the fifth Iowa running back to rush for over 800 yards in more than one season. Sedrick Shaw, Iowa's career rushing leader with 4,156 yards is the only Hawkeye player to rush for over 800 yards in three different seasons (1994, 1995, 1996). The others with two seasons of over 800 yards include Tony Stewart

(1988, 1990), Ronnie Harmon (1984, 1985), and Eddie Phillips (1982, 1983). Following is a list of Iowa's career rushing leaders:

### MCCANN LEADS IOWA OFFENSE

Senior QB Kyle McCann has been very efficient in leading Iowa to two opening wins. McCann has completed 25-34 passes for 366 yards and four touchdowns, with one interception. His efficiency rating of 196.9 ranks second in the nation. McCann had a career-high four TD passes in the win over Miami as he led Iowa to its fourth victory in its last five games, including wins over Penn State and Northwestern last season.

McCann, at Penn State, completed 25-37 passes for 232 yards and one touchdown. In the win over Northwestern he completed 17-27 passes for 250 yards and two TDs. McCann had just two interceptions in his last three games and he had four touchdown passes. The 25 completions at Penn State are a career high for McCann, and the 250 passing yards vs. Northwestern is his second highest game total (he had 274 passing yards at Arizona in 1998).

McCann's career totals stand at 215-385 (.558) for 2,687 yards and 11 TDs. He ranks eighth in career passing yards and completions and 10th in attempts. Following is a list of Iowa's career passing leaders, based on yardage:

### HILL IS ALL-PURPOSE LEADER

WR Kahlil Hill leads Iowa in all-purpose yards (109.5) after two games and he ranks 10th in the nation in punt returns (16.0). Hill had six receptions for 94 yards in the win over Miami, including a 52-yard scoring reception, and he had a punt return for a score nullified by a holding penalty. In two games Hill has 10 catches for 150 yards, three punt returns

for 48 yards and a 21-yard kickoff return. Hill has at least one pass reception in all 25 games in his career.

Hill's career receiving totals include 103 catches for 1,201 yards and eight TDs. He ranks 12th in career receptions and 19th in receiving yards. In 2000 he became the 25th Iowa receiver with over 600 yards in a season and is the 19th Iowa receiver with over 1,200 career receiving yards. Hill has 1,166-career kickoff return yards and 378 career punt return yards for a total of 2,745 all-purpose yards.

Hill led Iowa in all-purpose yards (121.3 average) last season and ranked among the national leaders in kickoff returns. Hill ranked seventh in the nation with his 27.2 yard average on KO returns and his 9.6 average on punt returns ranked sixth in the Big Ten and 50th nationally.

Hill has two kickoff return touchdowns and two punt return touchdowns in his career. His 90-yard KO return vs. Michigan State last season ranks as the ninth longest ever at Iowa. Hill had an 88-yard KO return vs. Central Michigan in 1998, his first college game. Hill is tied for third place (with 11 others) in Big Ten history with two career KO return touchdowns. The Big Ten record of five is held by Stan Brown of Purdue (1968-70), while former Michigan State player Derrick Mason (1993-96) had three. Here are his career totals:

### CLARK GETS TWO SCORES

Sophomore Dallas Clark, playing tight end for the first time this season, had scoring receptions of 18 and 32 yards vs. Miami. In two games Clark has nine catches for 158 yards. Clark, who suffered a broken finger in the season-opener, previously played linebacker before moving to tight end in the spring. He is a former walk-on and a native of Livermore, IA. His older brother, Derrik, played linebacker at Iowa State during his college career.

### ALLEN SCORES AGAIN

Senior FB Jeremy Allen scored the first touchdown of his career in Iowa's opening win over Kent State, and he added his first touchdown reception in the win over Miami. Allen had a 15-yard reception vs. the RedHawks to cap Iowa's opening drive. Allen had the best rushing day of his career in the opening win, rushing 12 times for 73 yards and one touchdown. Allen, who has earned multiple all-America honors in track and field, battled through injuries most of last season, rushing just 34 times for 135 yards. In two games this season he has rushed for 85 yards after rushing for 73 yards vs. Kent State.

### GREIVING TIES NCAA RECORD

Sophomore RB Aaron Greiving tied an NCAA Division I record by scoring a touchdown on three consecutive carries in Iowa's opening win over Kent State. Greiving scored on runs of 14, 1 and 26 yards on the first three rushing attempts in his career. Greiving saw action last season, but had no rushing attempts.

### IT'S HAPPENED BEFORE

Aaron Greiving tied a national record with his performance against Kent State, but he isn't the first Iowa player to be so productive. In a 70-14 win over Utah State in 1957, Geno Sessi touched the ball just three times and scored three touchdowns. His three touches resulted in 131 yards, one of those being an 80-yard pass reception for a score.

### BANKS GETS ON THE BOARD

QB Brad Banks, in his first season at Iowa after a two-year junior college career, has led the Hawkeyes on a scoring drive in his first action each week. Banks led Iowa on a 66-yard scoring drive against Miami that lasted over eight minutes. Banks ended the drive with a five-yard touchdown run with just five seconds left in the half. In two games Banks has rushed 10 times for 31 yards and completed 11-19 passes for 136 yards.

### NO LONGER PERFECT ON PATS

Iowa kickers made 81 straight PAT kicks before Nate Kaeding missed one attempt in the win over Miami. That streak included 10 PATs to start this season, 21 in 2000, 19 in 1999, 18 in 1998 and the final 13 PAT kicks of 1997. Iowa kickers had not missed at PAT since 1997. Iowa was one of just three Big Ten teams that did not miss a kicking PAT in 2000.

### IOWA NOTES

• In Iowa's defensive secondary, "S" is for Sanders, Sapp, Smith and Stockdale, the four players who started against Kent State. Sanders missed the Miami game but is expected to return to action vs. Iowa State. Smith could miss this week's game with a knee injury.

- Junior WR C.J. Jones has shown big play potential in two games after joining Iowa from the junior college ranks. Jones is averaging 41 yards on two punt returns and he has three pass receptions in two games. He is the cousin of Iowa QB Brad Banks.
- Iowa has started the game on offense in 19 consecutive games and 21 of 26 games under Kirk Ferentz. Iowa has opened each game this season with a touchdown drive.
- Iowa's total of 95 points is the highest two-game total for the Hawkeyes since the 1997 season. Iowa opened that year by scoring 66, 54 and 63 points against Northern Iowa, Tulsa and Iowa State, respectively.
- Iowa is averaging 21 yards on eight punt returns in two games, while Hawkeye opponents have just one punt return for two yards.
- Iowa averaged 61,123 fans in its six home games in 2000, a figure that ranked 24th in the nation.
- For the first time in school history, Iowa in 2000 had a player rush for over 1,000 yards and a player total over 1,000 yards in receptions in the same season. WR Kevin Kasper ended the year with 1,010 receiving yards, while RB Ladell Betts rushed for 1,090 yards.

### THEY STARTED THEM ALL

Iowa returns four players who started all 12 games in 2000. That list includes OL Bruce Nelson, RB Ladell Betts, DE Aaron Kampman and DL Jerry Montgomery. In addition, DL Derrick Pickens started 11 and WR Kahlil Hill, OL Alonzo Cunningham and OL Robert Gallery started 10 games.

Betts and Kampman each started all 11 games in 1999. Betts has started 31 straight games and 33 of the last 36 games, Kampman has 28 career starts, Cunningham 27 and Nelson 25. Iowa had four offensive players (RB Ladell Betts, OL A.J. Blazek, OL Bruce Nelson, WR Kevin Kasper) and five players on defense (DL Aaron Kampman, DL Jerry Montgomery, DL Anthony Herron, LB LeVar Woods, DB Ryan Hansen) start all 12 games in 2000.

### TRUE FRESHMEN IN 2001

Iowa has used just one true freshman in the first two games of the year. Linebacker Matt Roth played in his first college game against Kent State and responded with eight tackles and he had five stops vs. Miami. Iowa used seven true freshmen during the 2000 season.

### RETURNING WITH HONORS

Iowa returns five players who earned all-conference recognition a year ago. Senior RB Ladell Betts, who begins the season ranked third in career rushing yards (2,626), earned honorable mention all-Big Ten honors in 2000 after being a second team selection in 1999.

WR Kahlil Hill returns for his final season after earning honorable mention recognition. The Sporting News named him first team kick returner. Hill averaged 27.2 yards on kickoff returns and 9.6 yards on punt returns and he led the team with 121.3 all-purpose yards per game. Hill was second on the team in receiving with 58 catches for 619 yards and five TDs.

Junior OL Bruce Nelson, who has started all 23 Iowa games over the past two seasons, senior DE Aaron Kampman and sophomore DB Bob Sanders were also named honorable mention all-Big Ten a year ago.

### TWO EARN FRESHMAN HONORS

PK Nate Kaeding and DB Benny Sapp, were honored for their play as true freshmen during the 2000 season. Sapp was named to the Rivals.com first freshman all-America team, while Kaeding was named to The Sporting News' third freshman all-America squad.

### IOWA BY THE NUMBERS

The Hawkeyes return 47 lettermen from last season, including 19 on offense, 27 on defense and one specialist. Iowa returns eight starters on both offense and defense, along with kicker Nate Kaeding.

The list of 47 lettermen includes 12 three-year lettermen, 12 two-year lettermen and 23 one-year lettermen. The roster includes 113 players, including 21 seniors, 23 juniors, 27 sophomores, 21 redshirt freshmen and 21 true freshmen.

### SEVEN WERE WALK-ONS

Seven members of Iowa's two-deep joined the program as walk-ons. That list includes offensive linemen Bruce Nelson and Pete Traynor, tight end Dallas Clark, linebacker Grant Steen, defensive lineman Joe Uselman, defensive back Derek Pagel and punter Nate Campbell. Nelson, Clark, Steen and Pagel have all started games this season.

### IOWA IN THE REDZONE

Iowa scored 24 points by scoring on four of five drives against Miami that reached the redzone, scoring two passing touchdowns, one rushing TD and one field goal. Iowa has scored on 11 of 12 drives that have reached the redzone in two games, collecting six rushing TDs, two passing TDs and three field goals for 65 points.

In two games, Iowa's opponents have reached the redzone on just one occasion, that occurring when Kent State recovered a fumble. That scoring threat was stopped when DL Aaron Kampman came up with his second career interception. Miami's three touchdowns all came from outside the redzone.

### ON THE AVERAGE

Iowa vs. Miami averaged 6.0 yards on 29 first down plays., 4.7 yards on 21 second down plays, 7.4 yards on 18 third down plays and 2.3 yards on three fourth down plays. In two games Iowa is averaging 6.9 yards on 67 first down plays, 6.8 yards on 43 second down plays, 6.7 yards on 28 third down plays and 8.3 yards on four fourth down plays. Iowa has converted three of four fourth down attempts.

### AVERAGE SCORING DRIVES

Iowa's six scoring drives vs. Miami averaged 7.2 plays, 49 yards and 3:06 in elapsed time. Miami's three scoring drives averaged 4.3 plays, 84.7 yards and 1:38 in elapsed time. In two games Iowa's 15 scoring drives have averaged 7.3 plays, 53.6 yards and 3:14 in elapsed time.

### BIG PLAYS

Iowa had two pass plays and one running play of over 20 yards vs. Miami, plus two punt returns and one interception return over 20 yards and one field goal over 30 yards and one punt over 50 yards. In two games Iowa has three running plays, seven pass plays, four punt returns, one interception return and one kickoff return over 20 yards, plus four field goals over 30 yards. Iowa's opponents have had five passing plays, one running play and one kickoff return over 20 yards.

### POINTS OFF TURNOVERS

Iowa scored 14 points after obtaining three turnovers in the win over Miami. In two games Iowa has scored 20 points following five opponent turnovers, including two touchdowns and two field goals.

Iowa has just two turnovers in two games and has not allowed any points following those miscues.

Iowa last season scored 36 points following 17 opponent turnovers, while Iowa's opponents scored 72 points following Iowa's 20 turnovers.

### HOME GROWN HAWKEYES

Iowa's roster of 114 players includes 43 players from Iowa. The roster includes 17 players from Illinois, 13 from Florida, eight from Texas, six from Michigan, Minnesota and Wisconsin, three from California, two from Missouri and Pennsylvania and one from Alabama, Colorado, Connecticut, Indiana, Mississippi, Nevada, South Dakota and Virginia.

### BROTHERLY LOVE

Iowa's team includes two sets of brothers. Pete and John Traynor are walk-ons from Milton, WI. Pete is a junior offensive lineman and John is a sophomore defensive lineman.

Robert and John Gallery are from Masonville, IA. Robert is a sophomore offensive tackle, while John is a walk-on punter and a true freshman. Another Gallery brother, Nick, was a four-year punter for the Hawkeyes from 1993-96, and Julie Gallery is a member of Iowa's women's track and field squad.

### THE HAWKEYES, SIZE WISE

DB Antwan Allen is the lightest Hawkeye at 160 pounds, while the shortest players, at 5-8, include DB Marqueas McLaurin, RB Fred Russell and DB Bob Sanders. OL David Porter is the heaviest Hawkeye at 312 pounds, while the tallest player is 6-8 freshman TE C.J. Barkema. The average Hawkeye player is 6-2 and weighs 234 pounds. That is one half-inch taller and two pounds lighter than the average Iowa player in 2000.

### IOWA ON THE TUBE

Iowa's two non-conference games, to begin the 2001 season, were both televised by ESPN Regional. The Iowa State game (postponed till Nov. 24<sup>th</sup>) would have been televised by ABC Regional.
