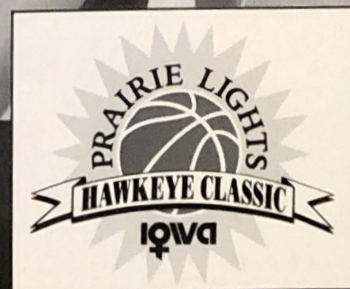
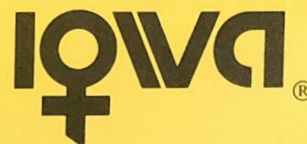

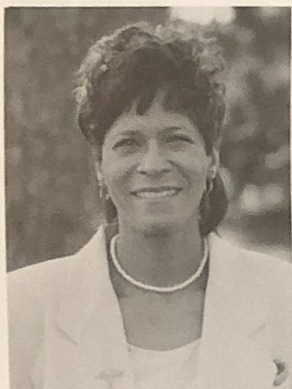

The Coaching Staff

Head Coach C. Vivian Stringer



This mother, coach and role model enters her 12th season as head coach of The University of Iowa women's basketball program as the winningest coach in school history and the only coach to lead the Hawkeyes to 10 consecutive 20-victory seasons, nine straight tournament berths and an appearance in the NCAA Women's Final Four.

For 10 seasons, the Hawkeyes have consistently been ranked among the nation's top 25 basketball powers. During the 1992-93 season, the top-ranked Hawkeye squad recorded its third undefeated home season, won its first Mideast Regional and advanced to the first-ever NCAA Women's Final Four in school history.

Stringer has received numerous awards, but none more prestigious than the 1993, 1988 and 1982 National Coach of the Year honors. She was also named the 1993, 1988 and 1985 NCAA District V Coach of the Year. Stringer was honored by her coaching peers in 1993 and 1991 as the Big Ten Coach of the Year.

In January 1994 Stringer became the third active coach to receive a 500th career victory with the 78-56 win over Michigan. Stringer was named the Giants Steps Female Coach of the Year. In honor of her 500th career win, the Women's Athletics Department created the C. Vivian Stringer Endowed Scholarship. It is the first-ever endowed scholarship named for an active coach in school history and will be awarded annually to a women's basketball player.

A native of Edenborn, Pa., Stringer is a member of the Alumni Hall of Fame at her alma mater, Slippery Rock State College. She and the late William D. Stringer have three children, 15-year-old David, Janine, age 14, and 10-year-old Justin.

Assistant Coaches Angie Lee



Sixth-year assistant coach Angie Lee is no stranger to the Iowa program—she was a senior captain during Stringer's debut season. From 1985 to 1987, she served as the graduate assistant coach of the Hawkeyes. Lee served as the assistant basketball coach at Western Illinois from 1987-89.

At Iowa Lee is in charge of team scheduling, scouting, and recruiting. She consistently works to bring the nation's top competition to Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

Tim Eatman



Tim Eatman begins his second year as a member of the Hawkeye staff. After spending the 1992-93 season at the University of Houston, Eatman brings strong recruiting skills with him to Iowa. His responsibilities also include scheduling, scouting, on-court practice and conditioning. Eatman graduated from Talledega (Ala.) College.

Linda Myers



Linda Myers begins her sixth season as an assistant coach at Iowa after successful stints at Slippery Rock, Eastern Kentucky, and Florida International. Myers administers the Hawkeyes' travel arrangements, assists with the recruiting, and coordinates the summer camp programs. She is a graduate of Slippery Rock.

Game Notes

Prairie Lights Hawkeye Classic

ON JAMES MADISON— The Dukes, under the direction of 12th-year head coach Sheila Moorman, concluded their 1993-94 season at 16-12 overall. JMU, which has not participated in postseason play since 1990-91, returns all five starters from a year ago. The Dukes will look to seniors Kara Ratliff (F, 13.9 ppg, 6.5 rpg) and Christina Lee (G, 7.7 ppg, 2.4 rpg) for guidance. Sophomore guard Sarah Schreib (10.2 ppg, 6.3 rpg) was named the 1994 Colonial Athletic Conference Rookie of the Year. In series action, Iowa leads 1-0. The Hawkeyes picked up a 72-44 win in Harrisonburg, Va., last December.

ON MARQUETTE— The Golden Eagles, under the guidance of fifth-year veteran head coach Jim Jabir, finished last season with their first-ever NCAA appearance. Marquette lost in the first round to Colorado, 77-74, and finished with a 22-7 overall record. Coming off their best season in the 29-year history of the program, the Eagles lost just one starter— leading scorer Kristen Maskala— from a year ago. The veteran team will look to seniors Lori Goerlitz (G, 11.1 ppg, 6.3 apg, 35.6 FG%), Kerri Reaves (F, 11.4 ppg, 5.1 rpg, 44.5 FG%) and Christine Kennedy (F/C, 13.3 ppg, 9.9 rpg, 44.1 FG%) for leadership. Marquette opens the season at Southwest Missouri before traveling to Iowa City. Iowa and Marquette have never met in women's basketball.

ON SOUTHERN CAL— The Women of Troy, under the helm of second-year head coach Cheryl Miller, finished the 1993-94 campaign with a third consecutive NCAA tournament appearance. USC, which finished 26-4 last season, advanced to the NCAA Mideast Regional where it fell to eventual national runner-up Louisiana Tech, 75-66. The Women of Troy lost three starters, including 1994 Naismith Award winner and all-American forward Lisa Leslie. USC will depend on sophomore forward Tina Thompson (14.2 ppg, 10.5 rpg), the Pac-10 Freshman of the Year and a *Basketball Times* all-American. In series action, Iowa leads 2-1. Last season the No. 2 Hawkeyes pulled out a 50-49 nail-biter over No. 9 USC in the championship game of the USC Christmas Tournament with a last second 3-point basket by all-American Necole Tunsil.

IOWA RECAP— The No. 13 Hawkeyes, seeded third in the Midwest Region, ended their season at 21-7 following an NCAA second round loss to sixth-seeded Alabama, 84-78. The Hawkeyes, who ranked eighth nationally in scoring defense, limited opponents to 57.8 ppg. The Hawkeyes finished third in the Big Ten Conference at 13-5. In the final statistics, senior all-American Necole Tunsil led all scorers with 17.0 ppg and 5.8 rpg. Senior Cathy Marx followed, averaging 12.2 ppg and 5.5 rpg. As a team, Iowa outscored its opponents by 6.1 ppg and out-rebounded foes by 4.3 rpg.

IOWA HEAD COACH— C. Vivian Stringer begins her 23rd season as a head coach and her 12th at Iowa. She stands 509-118 (.812) overall, ranking third nationally for wins by an active coach and third in the nation for career win percentage. The winningest coach in both Iowa men's and women's basketball history, Stringer owns a 258-67 (.794) mark with the Hawkeyes. She stands 163-35 (.823) in Big Ten play, ranking first on the conference's all-time list for most league wins and win percentage. Stringer has led Iowa to 10 consecutive 20-win seasons, nine straight NCAA tournaments, six Big Ten titles and the NCAA Final Four. Her efforts have not gone unnoticed as Stringer was named the 1993 National Coach of the Year and the 1993 Big Ten Conference Coach of the Year.

IN THE POLLS— Preseason polls have the Hawkeyes ranked as high as No. 10 and no lower than No. 18. *Street & Smith's Basketball* list Iowa at No. 14, while *College Sports Magazine* has Iowa at No. 10. Women's Basketball News Service ranks the Hawkeyes at No. 18. The *Associated Press* and *USA Today* preseason polls will be released in November. Iowa finished the 1993-94 season ranked No. 13 by *The Associated Press* and *USA Today*.

EARLY SIGNEES— Iowa's own Stacy Frese (Cedar Rapids) and Amy Herrig (Dubuque) have signed National Letters of Intent to play for the Hawkeyes next season. Frese, a 5-8 guard from C.R. Washington H.S., was a first team all-state selection. She averaged 18.5 ppg and 5.5 apg while leading the Warriors to a 22-1 record and a No. 18 national ranking by *USA Today*. The third team *Parade* all-American was a unanimous all-Metro and Mississippi Valley Conference pick. Herrig, a 6-4 center from Dubuque Senior H.S., averaged 22 points and 12 rebounds while earning first team all-state honors. She was a second team *Street & Smith's* all-American and a third team *Parade* magazine all-American. The three-sport athlete who maintained a perfect 4.00 grade-point-average plans to study sports psychology.

NO PLACE LIKE HOME— The Hawkeyes closed the 1993-94 regular season at Carver-Hawkeye Arena with a 10-2 mark. Iowa has won 142 of 162 overall games played in Carver-Hawkeye Arena since its opening in January 1983. Iowa has lost just 14 Big Ten games in the building, and only seven of those league losses came under the tutelage of C. Vivian Stringer.

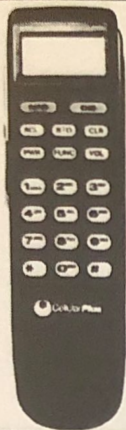

Spotlight on the Freshmen

"One of the best classes of all time... Every player is tremendously athletic and tremendously talented," says Joe Smith of the Women's Basketball News Service in New York.

Calling any group of basketball players one of the all-time best is a bold statement to say the least, and is one that the Iowa women's basketball freshman class of 1994-95 has heard dozens of times since its arrival in Iowa City this fall. The high expectations don't seem to bother them though. "There is some added pressure, but we don't think about it much anymore," says Malikah Willis, a 6-2 center from Cleveland, Ohio.

Her classmates tend to agree with her. "Everyone has high expectations for us as a team. We've got some goals we would like to reach, but right now we are still getting to know each other. We just need to get out there and play some games," comments 6-1 forward Shannon Perry, who hails from Carson, Calif.

Tangela Smith, a 6-4 center out of Chicago, also agrees, but adds, "The upperclassmen have been great. They have really encouraged us and are helping us a lot."

The learning process for the seven freshmen must be accelerated, however, because of injuries to key components of this year's squad. Simone Edwards, a 6-4 senior center who was expected to play a major role for the Hawkeyes this season, went down with a torn anterior cruciate ligament (ACL)—the same injury suffered last year by all-American guard Tia Jackson. Jackson is also on the disabled list due to complications from her knee injury. She may have additional surgery and

should miss the first six to eight weeks of the season.

"It kind of put a damper on things at first because they are good role models for us along with being great players," says Perry. "Everyone knows that they have to step up their level of play."

"It was sad at first," says Smith, "but it has made everyone work harder in order to make this team better."

Despite the injuries, the Hawkeyes are loaded with talent. All seven freshmen were crowned with post-season honors upon the conclusion of last year's high school season. Tiffany Gooden, a six-foot forward from Fort Wayne, Ind., was named the 1994 National Player of the Year by Naismith and *Parade* magazine while also claiming Miss Indiana Basketball honors. She has also had knee problems similar to Jackson, and is expected to make a full recovery and regain her all-American form.

Point guard Nadine Domond out of Bridgeport, Conn., was also named a *Parade* magazine first-team all-American. "Nadine is a premier guard," says head coach C. Vivian Stringer. "She's an unselfish player who is quick with the ball and penetrates well."

Also in the backcourt for the Hawkeyes is Timicha Kirby, an intense competitor who, according to Stringer, "has tremendous three-point shooting range." She was named third-team all-America by *USA Today*, and during her high school career Lynwood, Calif., High School compiled a 91-5 record.

In this freshman class there is a fantastic blend of perimeter and post

players, with some of them able to play both inside and outside. Athletes such as Gooden and six-foot guard Angela Hamblin from Gary, Ind., provide versatility for Coach Stringer's Hawkeyes. "Angela has tremendous strength and quickness inside and is one of the hardest workers you'll find," explains Stringer. Hamblin, another *Parade* magazine first-team all-American, will sit out the 1994-95 season but will retain three years of eligibility.

Even forwards such as Perry, for example, and Smith, who is a center, are extremely versatile players who have demonstrated the ability to run the floor well and shoot the basketball from three-point range.

With the talent that has arrived at Iowa this season, you can expect the Hawkeyes to reach great heights over the next few years. The freshmen, however, don't want to wait that long to achieve anything—they want to taste success right now and have grand visions of a Big Ten title and ultimately a national championship.

Says Perry, "Our goal is a national championship. We are taking things one day at a time right now, and as soon as we mold as a team great things will start to happen."

This sentiment is echoed by Willis. "With the talent we have on this team as a whole, it should happen soon."

Obviously, Big Ten titles and Final Four appearances will not be quite good enough for these Hawkeyes—the only thing that will satisfy their hunger is that NCAA title. Considering the talent found in this freshman class, a national championship is definitely within reach.

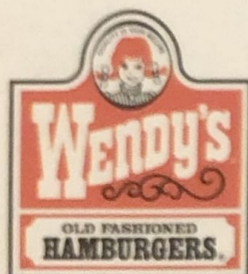
