






The Road to Los Angeles

The 1991-92 University of Iowa women's basketball team is playing for its seventh consecutive invitation to the NCAA women's basketball championship. The 1992 NCAA regionals will be played March 26 and 28 at the following sites: EAST - University of Virginia, Charlottesville, VA; MIDEAST - Purdue University, West Lafayette, IN; MIDWEST -University of Colorado, Boulder, CO; WEST -University of Washington, Seattle, WA. The NCAA Women's Final Four will be played April 4 and 5 at the Los Angeles Sports Arena in Los Angeles, CA. The University of California, Los Angeles, the University of Southern California, and the Los Angeles Sports Council will serve as hosts.

No. 5 Iowa vs. Illinois Friday, Jan. 31, 1992 Carver-Hawkeye Arena

ON IOWA – Fifth-ranked Iowa, 14-1 overall and 5-0 in Big Ten play, is paced by a pair of players averaging double-figure scoring. Juniors Toni Foster and Laurie Aaron average 14.3 and 11.3 points per contest respectively. Foster also grabs 8.4 rebounds per game. The Iowa bench is also strong, contributing 29.4 points and 14.4 rebounds to boost the 45.7 points and 21.1 rebounds provided by the starters. Among Iowa's wins are a 58-39 victory over No. 13 Washington and a 61-53 win over No. 8 Penn State. Iowa's only loss came at the hands of No. 11 Vanderbilt, 95-65.

ON ILLINOIS – The Illini stand 5-10 overall and are tied for sixth in Big Ten play with a 2-4 record. Illinois suffered two losses to No. 8 Penn State, but registered its first win over a ranked team with a 70-58 win over Northwestern last weekend. The Illini are paced by sophomore Mandy Cunningham, who averages 14.7 points and 3.3 rebounds per game.

IOWA VS. ILLINOIS – Iowa leads its series with Illinois 17-10, and has won the last 10 straight. Last season, Iowa won 63-47 in Iowa City, and 63-43 in Champaign, Ill.

BICENTENNIAL CELEBRATION – C. Vivian Stringer is just one win shy of her 200th victory at lowa. Stringer claimed her 100th lowa win when her No. 1-ranked Hawkeyes defeated Indiana 72-48 Jan. 29, 1988 in Iowa City. She reached the 400-victory milestone for her career when the Hawkeyes defeated North Carolina 106-81 in the consolation game of the Hilton Head Super Shootout Dec. 30, 1989. Stringer claimed her 450th career win with a 73-61 win over Michigan Jan. 26. She is just three wins away from her 125th victory in Big Ten play.

TERRIFIC TUNSIL – Sophomore Necole Tunsil shined in Iowa's weekend wins at Michigan and Michigan State. She poured in a career-best 20 points on 10-11 shooting from the field against the Wolverines, and went a perfect 6-6 from the free throw line against the Spartans. Tunsil committed only two turnovers in the two games, while dishing off five assists, two steals and one block.

HOME STREAK – Iowa has won 13 straight games in Carver-Hawkeye Arena, including seven this season. Iowa's last home loss came at the hands of Michigan State, 64-54, on Feb. 1, 1991.

FANFARE – A season-high 6,746 fans saw lowa defeat Ohio State Jan. 19, moving lowa's season total to 24,971. The Hawkeyes are averaging 3,567 fans per game overall, and 4,567 for Big Ten contests. Last season, lowa drew 56,098 total fans for an average of 4,007 per game.

BIG TEN RACE – lowa remains the only unbeaten after three weeks of Big Ten play, sporting a 5-0 record. Purdue nailed down sole possession of second place after lowa defeated Michigan State (71-64) and the Boilermakers beat Wisconsin (82-56). Iowa will try to make its conference lead two games with wins over Illinois and Purdue at home this weekend.



C. Vivian Stringer



How does one describe C. Vivian Stringer? Perhaps you tell how in eight years she has raised Iowa from the bottom of the Big Ten standings to the top of the nation's polls. Or, you mention that since her arrival in the Hawkeye state attendance at Iowa

games has increased 2,750 times over.

Do you tell of the endless hours she spends in front of a video machine dissecting an opponent's game plan, or of the many charitable organizations to which she donates her time? Should you point out her husband and three children, or direct your attention to the 14 young women whom she has brought together in the Hawkeye family?

It's simplest to use the words dreams, belief, warmth, excitement, commitment, and success to describe Stringer and the accomplishments she brings to the Iowa program. Perhaps her coaching peers said it all in one gesture-when they chose Stringer as the 1988 Converse National Coach of the Year.


The Hawkeye's dynamic head coach finished the 1990-91 season with a remarkable career record of 436-103 (.809), a mark that includes an eight year record at lowa of 185-52 (.781) and a 118-26 (.819) ledger against Big Ten Conference opponents. Stringer's 436 wins is the sixth-highest total in the profession today and her .809 win percentage is the nation's second-best for coaches with better than 250 victories. She is the only coach ever to lead two schools to a number two or better ranking on the Associated Press poll.

Among the most respected women's basketball coaches in the nation, Stringer has received numerous awards but none more prestigious than the 1988 Converse National Coach of the Year honor and the 1982 NCAA Division I Coach of the Year award. She was also named the 1988 and 1985 NCAA District V Coach of the Year. Stringer was named Big Ten Coach of the Year following the 1990-91 season. Stringer coached the United States women's basketball team in the 1991 Pan-American Games competition. In the summer of 1989, she coached the United States entry to the World Championship Zone Qualification Tournament in Sao Paulo, Brazil. In 1985, she coached the United States' entry to the World University Games in Kobe, Japan. In 1979, she coached in Mexico and in 1981 she toured China as head coach of the United States Select Team. She also coached in the 1982 National Sports Festival in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Also an active administrator, Stringer was instrumental in the development of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association. She currently is a voting board member of the Amateur Basketball Association of the United States of America and the Nike Shoe Company Coaches Advisory Board. In 1987, Stringer began a three-year appointment as the Big Ten Conference's representative to the NCAA Division I Mideast Basketball Committee.

A native of Edenborn, Pennsylvania, and a member of the Alumni Hall of Fame at her alma mater, Slippery Rock State College, Stringer is married to William D. Stringer. The couple have three children, 12 year-old David, Janine, age 11, and seven- year-old Justin.

Marianna Freeman



Continuing a long and prosperous association with C. Vivian Stringer is Marianna Freeman, who is in her ninth year as a Hawkeye assistant coach. Freeman was coached by Stringer and captained the 1979 Cheyney State team that was unbeaten in 25 games. Freeman has played

a vital role in the Hawkeyes' rise to national prominence. Not only does she assist in recruiting the nation's finest players to lowa, but she also aids those players in the adjustment to campus life as athletes and as students.

Freeman was head coach at Delaware State College from 1981-83, before joining the Hawkeyes. Under her direction, the DSC program moved from the cellar of the Mid-Eastern Atlantic Conference to the league's upper division.

Linda Myers



Linda Myers is in her third season as an assistant coach at The University of Iowa after successful stints at Slippery Rock, Eastern Kentucky, and Florida International.

A native of Jackson Center, Pennsylvania, Myers began her coaching career

as the assistant at Florida International in 1981. The following season, she returned to her alma mater Slippery Rock as the graduate assistant coach and a master's degree student. Myers served for four years, 1983-87, as the assistant coach at Eastern Kentucky, before returning to Slippery Rock as the assistant coach in 1987.

Ten years of collegiate coaching experience make Myers a valuable administrator on the Iowa coaching staff. In addition to on-court coaching, Myers administrates the Hawkeyes' travel arrangements and assists with the recruitment of the nation's finest student-athletes.

Angie Lee



Third year assistant Angie Lee is no stranger to the Iowa program-she was a senior captain of C. Vivian Stringer's first Hawkeye squad.

Lee is also no stranger to Stringer's coaching technique. From 1985-87, Lee served as the graduate assistant coach of the

Iowa team that advanced to two NCAA post season tournaments and consecutively set school records for wins in a season. Lee served as the assistant basketball coach at Western Illinois from 1987-89 before returning to Iowa.

As a Hawkeye assistant, Lee is in charge of team scheduling, scouting, and recruiting. She coordinates the school's scouting efforts, in addition to the recruitment of some of lowa's outstanding prep athletes.

Jenny Lin Benson



Jenny Lin Benson, a standout guard at the University of Alaska-Fairbanks begins her second season as a graduate assistant coach.

Benson was a fourtime Continental Divide Conference all-academic selection, as well as a

CoSIDA academic all-American. She holds 11 individual Alaska-Fairbanks records, including all of the three-point categories, assists, and steals. Benson graduated from UAF in 1988. An NCAA post-graduate scholar, she is pursuing a master's degree in athletic administration at lowa.



HAWKEYE SPOTLIGHT Virgie Dillingham

"Virgie is one of those rare athletes that doesn't have a big ego to go along with her big stats.... She likes to share the glory and fame with others."

When Virgie Dillingham appeared at the University of Iowa in the fall of 1990 from Richmond, Ky., her coach at Madison High, Velmar Miller, used these words to describe her. Two years later they still hold true.

"My satisfaction comes from helping others and seeing that they do well," Dillingham says. Her play reflects this unselfishness. "If I get an offensive rebound close to the basket, a lot of times I pass it back out instead of going up with it. Coach Stringer is always telling me to look to be more of a scorer."

Dillingham partly relies on others for motivation. "Coach always tells us to be leaders rather than followers. But I get more motivated when I see others and my teammates get motivated."


The humble attitude that has allowed Dillingham success and respect on the court was nurtured at home. "Being from a large family has helped. There is always a lot of support, and I always know I can go home."

However, Dillingham's family was shaken last October, when her father suddenly died.

"My father always said, 'If you're going to do something, do it right.' (His death) has inspired me to play better."

Dillingham also lost a 14 year-old nephew in August. Losing two special people in such a short time is devastating, especially in a family as close as her's. Adding to the difficulty of adjusting to the tragedy was the lack of time Virgie was able to spend with her family. She would only be home for a week in October, with school work and missed practices piling up. Christmas vacation added only four more days.

However, Dillingham has dealt with the situation in the most positive manner. She used the memories for inspiration, realizing how precious every day is and that nothing can be taken for granted. Dillingham found a new perspective.

"I look at things now and realize how fortunate I am. I'm getting the chance to do things other people never get the chance to do."


Even with life's unpredictable twists and turns, there is always something that needs immediate attention. Now it's basketball.

"I want to win the Big Ten Conference. And not only make the Final Four, but win it," Dillingham said. Fitting her personality, Dillingham's goal is team orientated. Her role in reaching this goal is even out of spotlight, but is definitely an important part within the team concept.

"My role is to rebound, set good screens, keep the ball moving, and play good defense. Part of everyone's role is to play good defense. And I have been working on my shot a lot.

"This year everyone knows her specific role. My role is kind of continuing from last year. Last year was just a whole lot of teaching, this year there is still some teaching but we are expected to know a lot more."

Malcom Forbes once said, "Contrary to the cliche, genuinely nice people most often finish first or very near it." If true, Dillingham will finish high in her basketball and life endeavors in the years to come.



The Iowa women's basketball program has moved into the national spotlight and into the national headlines. Over the years, the Hawkeyes have been featured in such national publications as Sports Illustrated, USA Today, the New York Times, the Los Angeles Times and the Chicago Tribune. The national television networks CBS, NBC, CNN and ESPN have each produced features on the nationally ranked Hawkeyes.

WHO Radio and the Palmer Network of Des Moines, Iowa, has been an annual broadcaster of the Hawkeye home and away contests and will continue the live play-by-play coverage in 1991-92. Several of Iowa's games will also be broadcast by KRUI Radio of Iowa City.

lowa has played on national, regional, and statewide television in each of the past seven years, and will do so again in 1991-92.

Carver-Hawkeye Arena


Carver-Hawkeye Arena is home to The University of Iowa women's basketball. Located on the edge of the campus, the \$18-million structure provides a 15,500-seat competition site for basketball, volleyball, wrestling and other selected events. The Arena has offices for the athletic department's coaches and administrators, locker rooms, weight training and medical care rooms, a wrestling workout room, several team, press, study and meeting rooms, and the Iowa City location of the Hawk Shop.

Did you know ...

- In 1985 the Hawkeyes shattered the NCAA and Big Ten Conference attendance records when 22,157 fans shoehorned into the 15,500 seat Carver-Hawkeye Arena.
- Carver-Hawkeye Arena has been the site of 16 of the Big Ten's 30 highest-attended women's games.
- The past five years, the Hawkeyes ranked among the top three programs in the nation for average attendance.



- Carver-Hawkeye Arena was the site of the 1986 and 1990 NCAA Mideast Regionals and will host again in 1993.
- Iowa has won 98 of 109 games played in the Arena.
- Iowa has lost only six Big Ten games in Carver-Hawkeye Arena since C. Vivian Stringer took over in 1983.



lowa Plus is an exclusive program created to recognize the special group of fans, alumni, and friends who support lowa Women's Athletics with the purchase of a Goal Card plus an annual contribution to the Hawkeye Fund, Iowa's fund-raising campaign for men's and women's athletics.
