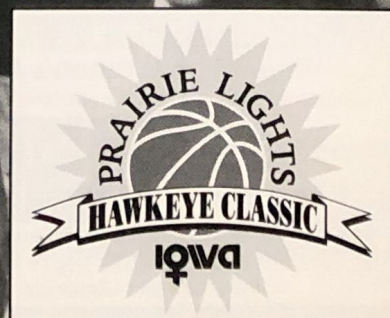
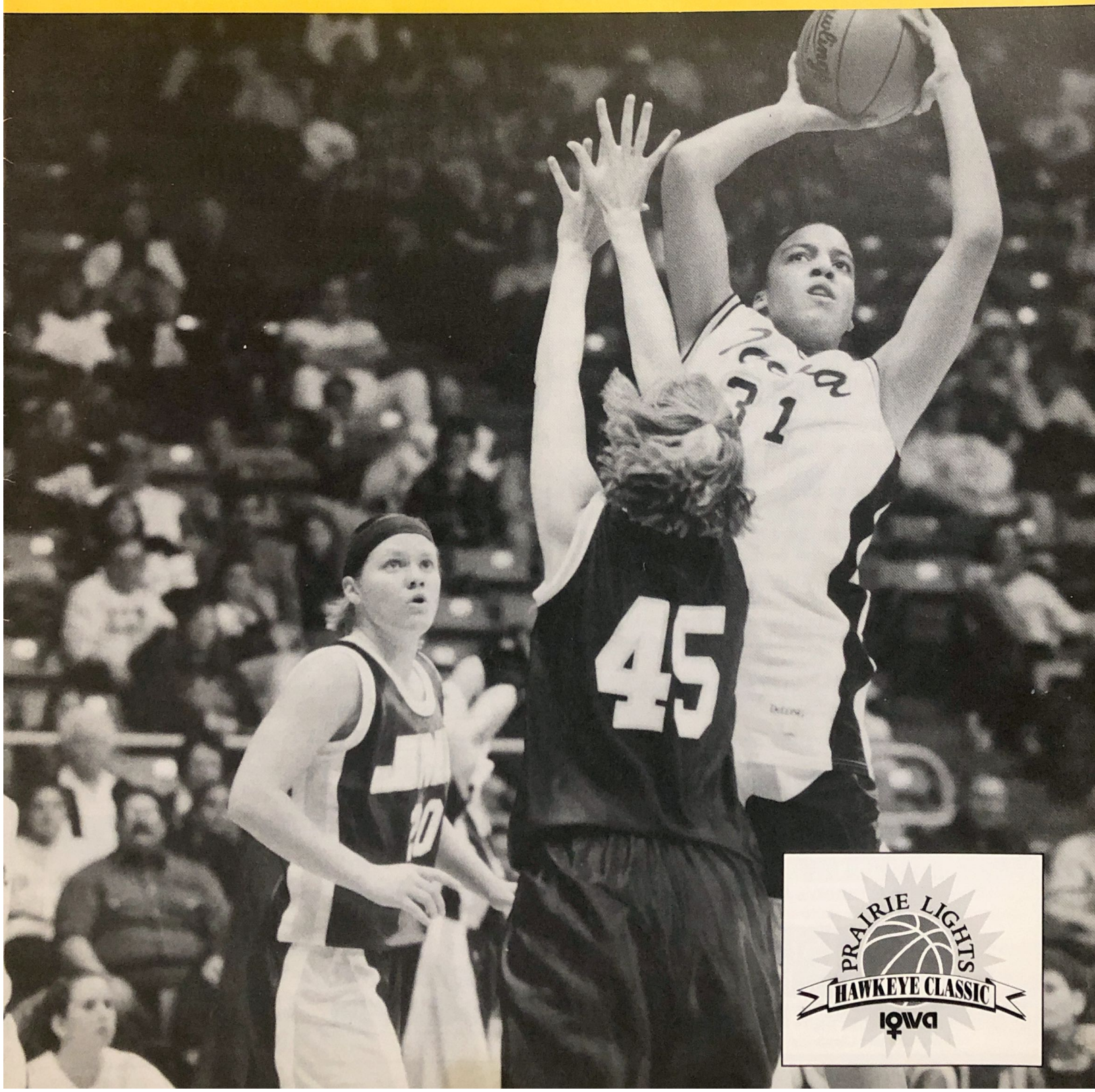
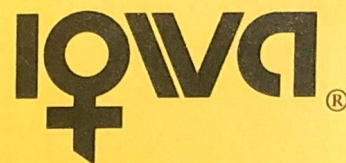

Head Coach Angie Lee



After helping to build The University of Iowa women's basketball team into a national power both as a player and as an assistant coach, Angie Lee now begins her first season as head coach of the Hawkeyes. She succeeds long-time Iowa Head Coach C. Vivian Stringer.

As an assistant coach since 1989, Lee was in charge of team scheduling, scouting and recruiting. During that time, each

Iowa recruiting class has ranked in the Top 10 nationally, with the classes of 1990 and 1994 being judged as the nation's best. Lee's coaching helped turn the promise of those recruits into reality on the playing floor, too. The Hawkeyes were Big Ten champs for four years running (1989-1992) and have played in the NCAA tournament five of the last six years.

From 1985 to 1987, she served as the graduate assistant coach of the Iowa team that advanced to two NCAA post-season tournaments and consecutively set school records for wins in a season. Lee served as the assistant basketball coach at Western Illinois from 1987 to the spring of 1989, when she returned to Iowa.

Since then, in addition to recruiting some of the top talent in Iowa and the nation, she has worked to improve Iowa's schedule. She consistently brought the nation's top competition to Carver-Hawkeye Arena, as well as arranging contests at some of the country's most prominent basketball schools, including Southern California, Stephen F. Austin, Louisiana Tech, Connecticut and Vanderbilt.

Lee received both her bachelor of science degree in 1984 and her master's degree in athletic administration in 1987 from Iowa. For the 1993-94 academic year she was elected to represent the District IV assistant coaches at the Women's Basketball Coaches Association.

Assistant Coaches Bonnie Henrickson



A Wilmar, Minn. native, Bonnie Henrickson joins the Iowa staff after a seven-year stint at Virginia Tech. For five seasons, Henrickson was an assistant coach and for the past two years, she served as the associate head coach for the Hokies. Henrickson graduated from St. Cloud State University in 1986. She earned a master's degree in physical education from Western Illinois University in 1988. She also has minors in coaching and athletic training.

Rose Peeples



After one year at Illinois State University, Rose Peeples joins the Hawkeyes. From 1987 to 1990, she was the head women's basketball coach at Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa. Peeples also played basketball for one year for the Chicago Spirit, a Women's Professional League team. She has a bachelor's degree and a master's degree in physical education from Southern Illinois University.

Linda Myers



Linda Myers begins her seventh season as an assistant coach at Iowa after successful stints at Slippery Rock, Eastern Kentucky and Florida International. Myers administers the Hawkeyes' travel arrangements, assists in recruiting and coordinates the summer camp programs. She is a graduate of Slippery Rock.

GAME . NOTES

The University of Iowa versus Indiana University Sunday, February 4, 1996

THE SERIES -- The University of Iowa leads the series with Indiana, 20-9. The Hoosiers won the series opener, 86-58 during the 1974-75 campaign. Actually, Indiana won five of the first seven contests, and they have won three of the last five. Iowa did however, win the first meeting this season, 64-56 in Bloomington, Ind., on Jan. 19.

THE LAST MEETING -- Indiana and Iowa have met once already this season. The Hawkeyes won that contest played on Jan. 19, in Bloomington, Ind., 64-56. During that contest the Hoosiers held a 26-24 halftime advantage. However, the Hawkeyes held the Hoosiers scoreless for the first 5:50 of the second half and raced to a 40-26 lead. Iowa led by as much as 15 before Indiana cut the lead to eight at the buzzer. Sophomore Tangela Smith led Iowa with 19 points and had a game-high 14 rebounds. Angela Hamblin, a native of Gary, Ind., tallied 14 points while Karen Clayton scored a season-high 11 points for the Hawkeyes. Indiana also had three players score in double figures led by Jenny Dittfach who had 16. Lisa Furlin and Quacy Barnes each had 11 for the Hoosiers.

INDIANA HEAD COACH -- Indiana head coach Jim Izard is in his eighth season at the helm of the Hoosier women's program. His record at IU stands at 123-91. During his tenure at Indiana, Izard has led his teams to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances in 1993-94 and 1994-95. In 1990-91, Indiana finished as the runner-up at the NWIT and were 18-13 on the year. Prior to accepting the Indiana position, Izard was the head coach at DePaul from 1984-88. His 1986-87 and 1987-88 squads participated in the NWIT, with '87-88 team capturing the title. Izard was also the head coach at Southwestern Louisiana in 1982-83 and Livingston from 1980-82. His career record stands at 286-139 (15 seasons).

ABOUT INDIANA -- Indiana is currently 12-7 on the year and 3-6 in Big Ten Conference action. The Hoosiers played at Penn State Friday night. Lisa Furlin, a 5-11 senior forward, leads the Hoosiers with a 16.6 scoring average. Jenny Dittfach, a 6-1 senior center, leads her team with a 7.7 rebounding average and ranks second with a 13.7 points per game average. Quacy Barnes and Tatjana Vesel round out the double figure scorers for Indiana at 12.7 and 11.7 respectively.

BIG WIN -- The Hawkeyes scored a season-best 94 points during the Minnesota victory. That total marked the first time since the 1992-93 campaign that Iowa had scored over 90 points (beat Northern Illinois, 92-59). The team's 43-point margin of victory (94-51) was the largest since beating Bucknell, 97-39 (+58) during the 1992-93 season. And finally, the 40 first half points and the 54 second half points Iowa scored against Minnesota, were both season-highs.

LONG RANGE RECORD -- Iowa is not known as a long range shooting team. However, during the Northwestern and Minnesota games, The Univer-

sity of Iowa hit a season-high seven three-pointers. That total is the most ever scored by Iowa against a Big Ten Conference opponent. The previous record was six tallied against Michigan State (Jan. 14, 1996), Ohio State (Feb. 3, 1995), Michigan State (Jan. 15, 1995) and Purdue (Jan. 14, 1990).

FRESE TIES SCHOOL RECORD -- Freshman Stacy Frese tied the school record for the most three-pointers made against a Big Ten Conference opponent. During the Minnesota victory, Frese nailed five three-pointers which was also a season-high for the 5-7 guard. On Jan. 21, 1996, against Northwestern, sophomore Tiffany Gooden also tied the record. Actually, it was Gooden who set the record during the Michigan State contest on Jan. 15, 1995.

FRESE TIES CARVER-HAWKEYE RECORD -- The five three-pointers freshman Stacy Frese hit against Minnesota also tied the Carver-Hawkeye Arena record which is held by four other Hawkeyes:

Armeda Yarbrough vs. Alabama (March 20, 1994)
Armeda Yarbrough vs. Mount St. Mary's (March 16, 1994)
Fanthia Price vs. Howard (Nov. 25, 1989)
Fanthia Price vs. Drake (Feb. 16, 1988)

CRASHING THE BOARDS -- The Hawkeyes have really been crashing the boards this season. During the Minnesota victory, the Iowa players grabbed 50 rebounds. With that total, they have now tallied 50 or more rebounds six times this season. Iowa has grabbed a season-best 55 rebounds against three opponents this season (Creighton, Kansas and Northwestern).

IN THE POLLS -- Moving up! In this week's Top 25 polls, Iowa is ranked sixth by the *Associated Press* and seventh by *USA TODAY* (CNN-WBCA). The Hawkeyes are the highest ranked team in the Big Ten Conference.

Speaking of the polls, five Big Ten Conference squads rank among the nation's best. Below is a look at those teams:

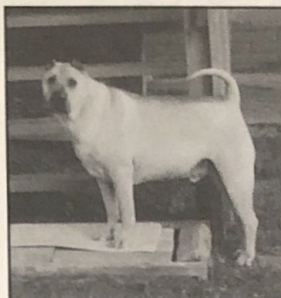

Malikah Willis- It's Never Too Late

Malikah Willis loves to win. Throughout her entire high school career her teams only lost three games, so last year's 11-17 season was difficult to swallow. "Last year was hard for me, as it was for the entire team, but now we're winning," Willis commented.

Not only was Willis' freshman season at Iowa a losing one, but in a game against Michigan she tore the anterior cruciate ligament in her knee. "My knee is doing better, but I still have a way to go, which is why I have to wear a brace," said Willis.

Willis chose to attend Iowa because she knew they would have a good team and a good chance to win. She also chose Iowa over other schools because of C. Vivian Stringer. Although she liked Stringer as a coach, she says that Angie Lee is an excellent coach too. "(Coach Lee) is very supportive and that's what we need after the season we had last year. She is an energetic and explosive coach which keeps us going," Willis said.

Willis' goal for the season is to contribute in any way she possibly can to help the team win. According to Willis, "the big difference in the team from last year is that we have all matured a great deal. Even though we are ranked in the top ten, we still have a lot to prove."

Willis didn't start playing basketball until the summer before ninth grade. At the half-time of an Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) basketball game Willis was watching, the coach approached her and suggested she try out for the team. Willis had never even dribbled a ball. She didn't think she could be good enough to play basketball. "I didn't go to the tryouts at first, because I didn't think it was worth my time. I learned that it was much more serious when the coach contacted me through a friend," Willis said. Even after she made the third team, she still didn't think she could become a good player because she saw the older players - who were number one in the country - and she didn't think she could ever be as good as them.

Her mom, Debra Willis, wanted to keep Willis off the streets, so she let her start playing basketball. While Willis didn't believe she was a very good, her mom always believed in her and helped her gain confidence. "My mom is my world," Willis said. She shows her devotion to her mom by wearing a tattoo in the shape of the world with "mom" written in the middle.

The coach for the AAU team, Vincent Cannizarro, was also the head coach at her high school in New York City. So, it was a natural transition for Willis to play basketball in high school.

Even before the end of her freshman year at Christ The King High School, Willis was named to the All-City team. By the time she left New York City, at the end of her junior year, she was named to the All-City, All-Borough and the All-State teams. In these three years, her team lost only one game as Willis' intense play led her team to the New York state title all three years.

Her mother is the reason Willis made the difficult decision to move to Cleveland for her senior year. Her mother had moved to Cleveland when Willis was a sophomore, but Willis wanted to finish high school in New York. She missed her mom, and decided to spend her last year of high school with her. After moving to Cleveland, Willis helped lead her Trinity High School team to a state title. During this season her team lost just two games. At Trinity she also helped set a national record by being one of two post players from the same school to be tabbed a Parade magazine All-American. Her teammate at the time was Na'sheema Hillmon who is currently playing at Vanderbilt.

During her senior year, Willis and her mom grew very close. They remain close today. Her mom travels to see her play when Iowa takes on teams close to Cleveland, such as Ohio State and Michigan. ●

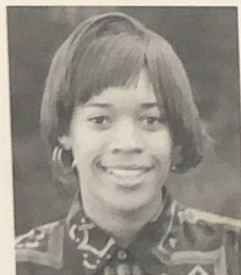

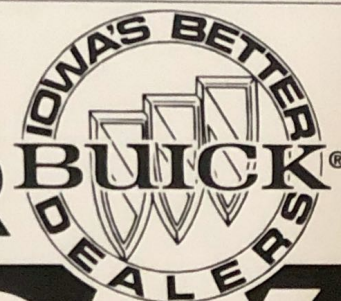
