

HAWKEYE HEAD COACH - LISA BLUDER



Lisa Bluder, the all-time winningest coach in program history, is in her 20th year as head women's basketball coach at the University of Iowa and her 35th year overall. Under her direction, the Hawkeyes have advanced to 18 postseason appearances (14 NCAA and four WNIT) in 19 seasons, including NCAA Tournament berths in 10 of the last 12 seasons. Iowa has advanced to the postseason in 12 consecutive seasons (10 NCAA and two WNIT).

- Has served on the WBCA Kodak All-American selection committee for four terms and the Midwest Regional Advisory Committee for the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Championships
- 2012 Quad City Times Hall of Fame inductee
- 2016 Des Moines Register Hall of Fame inductee

STUDENT-ATHLETE AWARDS

- Mentored 22 players to 54 All-Big Ten honors, including 17 first team picks, 17 second, 11 third, and nine honorable mention selections
- Has had one Big Ten Player of the Year (Megan Gustafson, 2018, 2019), two Big Ten Freshman of the Year award winners, two Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year recipients, 10 members of the Big Ten All-Freshman team, and three players named to the Big Ten All-Defensive team, with Kachine Alexander earning the honor twice.
- Guided six players to a total of nine WBCA All-Region Team accolades
- Led seven players to a total of 10 All-America honors (including honorable mention honors)

BIG TEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

- Bluder coached the 2018-19 team to its first Big Ten Tournament title since her first season (2001) with wins over Indiana, Rutgers, and No. 8 Maryland. The Hawkeyes finished second in the Big Ten regular season.
- In 2008, Iowa won a share of the Big Ten regular season championship, it's ninth in school history. The Hawkeyes won a Big Ten-season-best, eight-straight games during league play
- In Bluder's first year at Iowa, the 2000-01 Hawkeyes finished second in the Big Ten. The Hawkeyes knocked off Indiana, Illinois, and Purdue to win the first Big Ten Tournament crown under Bluder

IN THE CLASSROOM

- At Iowa, student-athletes have been named Academic All-Big Ten 99 times, including a program-best eight honorees in 2011 and 2012
- Ally Disterhoft (2013-17) was named the CoSIDA Academic All-American of the Year in consecutive seasons (2016 and 2017)
- Disterhoft was the fifth scholar-athlete to win the prestigious award in back-to-back years since its inception in 1987-88 and the second Big Ten athlete to accomplish the feat
- Disterhoft became Iowa's first three-time Academic All-American (2015-3rd team, 2016-1st team, 2017-1st team)
- Lindsey Meder was the first two-time Academic All-American (2001 and 2002)
- Samantha Logic earned Academic All-American distinction in 2015
- In 2015, Iowa was the only DI women's basketball team to have two student-athletes honored (Disterhoft, Logic)

ELITE EIGHT

- Iowa clinched its fourth appearance to the Elite Eight and its first since 1993 during the 2018-19 season; its first Elite Eight appearance in the Lisa Bluder Era.
- Iowa defeated 15th-seeded Mercer (66-61) in the first round of the NCAA Tournament before defeating 7th-seeded Missouri (68-52) in the second round to secure the second Sweet Sixteen berth for Bluder and her staff.
- The Hawkeyes advanced to the Elite Eight with a 79-61 win over NC State, before being knocked out by 2019 NCAA Champions, Baylor.

PERSONAL

- Graduate of Linn-Mar High School in Marion, Iowa
- Prior to Iowa, Bluder coached at Drake (1991-2000) and St. Ambrose (1984-1990)
- Inducted into the Linn-Mar Athletic Hall of Fame in 2008
- Bluder was a three-year starter at Northern Iowa
- Inducted into the Northern Iowa Hall of Fame in 2000
- Graduated from UNI in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in marketing
- Bluder and her husband, David, have two daughters, Hannah and Emma, and one son, David



JAN JENSEN, ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

Jan Jensen is in her 20th season with the Iowa women's basketball team and her 17th as associate head coach. A nationally known presence on the recruiting scene, Jensen serves as the recruiting coordinator and also works with the post players. Jensen is in her 31st season in women's college basketball (player and coach).

THE JENSEN FILE

- Helped guide Iowa to 18-postseason appearances, including 13 NCAA Tournament berths
- Guided Iowa to a postseason appearance in each of the last 12 seasons (10 NCAA, 2 WNIT)
- Helped Iowa to Big Ten Tournament Championship in 2001 and 2019 and a 2008 Big Ten Regular Season Title
- Guided Iowa to 13 upper division finishes
- Took Iowa to its first Sweet Sixteen since 1996 in 2015 and its first Elite Eight since 1993 in 2019.

RECRUITING

Integral part of developing and maintaining top-level recruiting classes at Iowa

- Helped Iowa land:
 - 8th best recruiting class in 2001 (Blue Star Index)
 - 11th best recruiting class in the country in 2011 (HoopGurls)
 - 17th best class in 2015 (ESPN HoopGurlz)
 - 18th best class in 2016 (Blue Star Basketball)
 - 28th best class in 2014 (Blue Star Basketball)
 - 33rd best class in 2008 (ESPN HoopGurlz)
- Jensen has recruited three McDonald's All-Americans to Iowa (Samantha Logic, Lindsay Richards and Johanna Solverson)

IN THE POST

Under Jensen's tutelage, Hawkeye post players have received numerous honors

- Guided Megan Gustafson to consensus National Player of the Year, the first in Big Ten history
- Coached eight players to 18 All-Big Ten honors, including five first team selections
- Guided Megan Skouby to 2006 Big Ten Freshman of the Year and 2008 Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year honor
- Helped Jennie Lillis to a 2003 Kodak All-District selection
- Two players – Skouby and Krista VandeVenter – were invited to the USA Team Trials
- Guided Bethany Doolittle to back-to-back second team All-Big Ten honors and Big Ten All-Tournament Team accolades in 2014 and 2015. She ended her career second all-time in blocks (278) and is the single-season blocks leader (106). In the Big Ten, Doolittle is eighth in career blocks
- Jensen coached Morgan Johnson to numerous accolades, including two second team All-Big Ten honors. Under Jensen's guidance, Johnson became Iowa's career blocks leader and finished inside the top 10 in career scoring and rebounds at Iowa
- In 2009-10, Iowa's post players broke school records for rebounding and blocked shots. Morgan Johnson broke the school mark for single-season blocks, while the team broke the school record for single-season rebounding.

PERSONAL

- Native of Kimballton, Iowa
- Jensen graduated from Drake in 1991 with a degree in Public Relations. She earned her Master's in Higher Education five years later.
- In February 2007, Jensen received the Drake Double D Award. The award is presented annually to Drake letterwinners for achievements in their chosen field or endeavor and/or community service since leaving Drake. The Double D Award is the highest honor Drake bestows on its student-athletes.
- Jensen and her spouse Julie Fitzpatrick, have a son, Jack, and a daughter, Janie.



RAINA HARMON, ASSISTANT COACH

Raina Harmon is in her third season as an assistant coach with the University of Iowa women's basketball team. Harmon works primarily with perimeter players.

THE HARMON FILE

- Harmon helped Iowa to a 29-7 overall record in 2018-19.
- The Hawkeyes finished second in the Big Ten with an 14-4 conference mark
- Helped Iowa to Big Ten Tournament Championship in 2001 and 2019 and a 2008 Big Ten Regular Season Title
- With Harmon on the sidelines, the Hawkeyes returned to the NCAA Tournament for the second time since 2015-16
- Kathleen Doyle led the Big Ten in assists during the 2019 season with 114 overall and 6.3 per game. She ranked second in the conference in steals with 42, tallying 2.3 per game.
- Guided Kathleen Doyle (2019) to first team All-Big Ten honors.

AT CENTRAL MICHIGAN

- Harmon spent the five seasons (2012-2017) as an assistant coach at Central Michigan
- Her primary responsibilities included perimeter player development, academics, and scouting
- In Harmon's five years at CMU, the Chippewas registered a combined 99-61 overall record
- The Detroit native helped guide CMU to a 2017 Mid-American Conference (MAC) Regular Season Championship, 2013 MAC Championship, three MAC West titles (2014, 2016, 2017), an NCAA Tournament berth (2013), and three WNIT appearances

PRIOR TO CENTRAL MICHIGAN

- Harmon served as the Director of Women's Basketball Operations at Michigan from 2010-12, where she assisted the coaching staff with all administrative aspects of the program
- Before Michigan, Harmon spent a season as an assistant varsity girls basketball coach at Martin Luther King Jr. Senior High School in Detroit

AS A STUDENT-ATHLETE

- Harmon played for Central Michigan from 2001-04
- In 2003, she received the Dee Pommerenk Sportsmanship Award
- Harmon also served as the president of the student-athlete advisory committee in 2003-04.

PERSONAL

- Harmon earned a bachelor's degree in sports studies from CMU in 2004.
- She earned her master's degree in sports administration from Wayne State in 2009.



ABBY (EMMERT) STAMP, ASSISTANT COACH

Abby (Emmert) Stamp is in her 11th year with the Iowa women's basketball program. After spending eight seasons as Iowa's director of operations, and two seasons as director of player development, Stamp was promoted to assistant coach in 2019. Stamp is responsible for off-campus recruiting and coaches the perimeter players for the Hawkeyes. She is also responsible for film breakdown and scouting.

THE STAMP FILE

- Worked closely with Iowa student-athletes, helping them develop into strong leaders and role models in the Iowa City community
- Assisted the basketball staff in the day-to-day activities of the program
- Iowa's chief scheduler, helping to build one of the most exciting and demanding schedules in the country

AS A STUDENT-ATHLETE

- Stamp was a member of the Iowa women's basketball team from 2005-08
- Named team co-captain in 2008
- Helped lead the Hawkeyes to a 2008 Big Ten regular season championship
- Received the Dr. Christine Grant Leadership Award for women's basketball in 2008
- Stamp played in 123 career games as a Hawkeye, including 22 starts
- Her 123 games played are tied for the fourth-most of any player in Iowa women's basketball history
- Scored 299 career points, collected 144 rebounds and dished out 177 assists
- She scored a career-high 17 points against Iowa State as a junior in 2006

PERSONAL

- A native of Winterset, Iowa
- Graduated with a communications studies degree from Iowa in 2008
- Worked for the United Way of East Central Iowa before taking over as director of basketball operations
- Stamp married her husband, Quinn, in the summer of 2015. They have a daughter, Mavis.

HAWKEYE COACHING STAFF



JENNI FITZGERALD,
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE HEAD COACH

Jenni Fitzgerald enters her 20th year with the University of Iowa women's basketball team and her second year as associate head coach in 2019. Fitzgerald is in her 33rd season in women's college basketball as a player and coach. Fitzgerald took on a new role this season, working as the Special Assistant to the Head Coach. She is responsible for behind the scenes research, advising, and scouting.

THE FITZGERALD FILE

- Helped guide Iowa to 18-postseason appearances, including 13 NCAA Tournament berths
- Guided Iowa to a postseason appearance in each of the last 12 seasons (10 NCAA, 2 WNIT)
- Helped Iowa to Big Ten Tournament Championship in 2001 and 2019 and a 2008 Big Ten Regular Season Title
- Guided Iowa to 13 upper division finishes
- Took Iowa to its first Sweet Sixteen since 1996 in 2015 and its first Elite Eight since 1993 in 2019.

AROUND THE PERIMETER

Under Fitzgerald's tutelage, Iowa's perimeter players have garnered numerous awards.

- Has coached 15 players to a total of 32 All-Big Ten honors, including 11 first team selections
- Guided Jaime Printy to 2010 Big Ten Player of the Year honors
- Helped Melissa Dixon to the Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year award in 2013
- Mentored six players that received all-district honors and four honorable mention All-Americans (Cara Consuegra, Kachine Alexander, Printy, and Samantha Logic)
- Guided Tania Davis (2016) and Kathleen Doyle (2017) to Big Ten All-Freshman Team honors

SCHOOL RECORDS

The Hawkeyes have broken numerous school records during Fitzgerald's time at Iowa.

- In 2009-10, Iowa shattered the single season and Big Ten record for three-pointers made and attempted and tied single season marks for assists, three-pointers made in a single game, and free throw percentage
- In 2012-13, Iowa set the school record for team assists (534), before shattering the record in 2013-14 (644)
- The Hawkeyes also set the school record for scoring offense in 2013-14 (78.2), leading the league in scoring while scoring the second-most points in a season in Big Ten history (2,814)
- The Hawkeyes broke the scoring offense school record averaging 79.5 points per game in 2014-15
- Melissa Dixon was crowned the NCAA statistical champion in 2014-15 after leading all Division I players in 3-point field goals per game (3.65). She is the Iowa record holder in career 3-pointers made (334), 3-pointers made in a season (124), and 3-pointers made in a game (10). Dixon also set or tied arena records for most 3-pointers in a game in at least five venues this season (Drake, Rutgers, Illinois, Northwestern, Iowa).

PERSONAL

- Graduated from Drake in 1990 with a bachelor's degree in business administration with a management major
- Completed her Master of Science degree in Physical Education, with an emphasis in Sport Management, from Southern Illinois University in 1992
- While at Southern Illinois, Fitzgerald was a graduate assistant with the SaLukis.
- Fitzgerald is very familiar with both Lisa Bluder and fellow assistant Jan Jensen, both of whom she coached with for eight years at Drake University prior to coming to Iowa. Fitzgerald was Iowa's 1986 Female Athlete of the Year
- Named Miss Basketball and first team all-state in basketball, volleyball and softball in 1986
- In 1995, she was inducted into the Iowa Girl's Basketball Hall of Fame
- Fitzgerald is the daughter of Bob and Jan Fitzgerald. She has an older sister, Robin, and younger brother, Randy



KATHRYN REYNOLDS,
DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Kathryn Reynolds is in her third year with the Iowa women's basketball program. After two seasons as Iowa's director of operations, Reynolds was promoted to director of player development in 2019.

- Works closely with Iowa student-athletes, helping them develop into strong leaders and role models in the Iowa City community
- Assists the basketball staff in the day-to-day activities of the program

UGO NWAIGWE
DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS

Ugo Nwaigwe is in her first season with the Iowa women's basketball program. Nwaigwe was hired as the director of operations in July of 2019.

THE NWAIGWE FILE

- Works closely with the Hawkeye basketball staff, helping coordinate and carry out day-to-day activities of the program
- Responsible for arranging team travel and activities, supervising public service opportunities for the team, and coordinating summer camps and training tables

PRIOR TO IOWA

- Nwaigwe joined the Hawkeyes after spending 2018-19 as an assistant women's basketball coach at Graceland University.
- Helped the Jackets to a 13-17 overall record, marking the most wins for the program since the 2011-12 season.
- The Jackets opened the season with a 9-1 record – the best start to a season in program history.
- While at Graceland, Nwaigwe assisted in all aspects of the women's basketball program, including recruiting, skill development, scouting, student-athlete development, and travel coordination.

PLAYING PROFESSIONALLY

- Nwaigwe played professionally overseas in Nigeria, Spain, Angola, Portugal, and Argentina.
- Nigerian National team member in 2016 and 2017.
- She was a 2018 AfroCup Bronze Medalist with the First Bank Club of Nigeria, a 2017 African National Champion with the Nigerian Women's Senior National Team, and a member of the 2016 Nigerian Women's Senior National Team.





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

HERKY THE HAWKEYE

The University of Iowa borrowed its athletic nickname from the state of Iowa many years ago. The name Hawkeye from the hero in the fictional novel, *The Last of the Mohicans*, written by James Fenimore Cooper. Cooper had the Delaware Indians bestow the name on a white scout who lived with them. In 1838, 12 years after the book was published, people in the territory of Iowa acquired the nickname, chiefly through the efforts of Judge David Rorer of Burlington and James Edwards of Fort Madison. Edwards, editor of the Fort Madison Patriot, moved his paper to Burlington in 1843 and renamed it the Burlington Hawkeye. The two men continued their campaign to popularize the name, and territorial officials eventually gave it their formal approval.

The Hawkeye nickname gained a tangible symbol in 1948 when a cartoon character, later to be named Herky the Hawkeye was hatched. The creator was Richard Spencer III, instructor of journalism at Iowa. The impish Hawk was an immediate hit and acquired a name through a statewide contest staged by the athletic department. John Franklin, a Belle Plaine alumnus, was the man who suggested Herky. Since his birth, Herky has symbolized Iowa athletics and epitomized University life. He even donned a military uniform during the Korean War and became the insignia of the 124th Fighter Squadron. During the mid-1950s, Herky came to life at a football game as the Iowa mascot. Since that time, Herky has been a familiar figure at Iowa athletics events.
