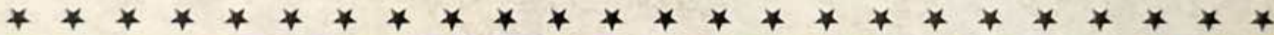

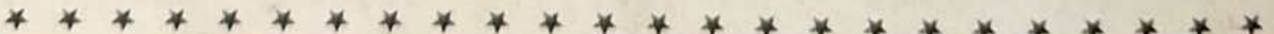

HAWKEYE HEAD COACH - LISA BLUDER



Lisa Bluder is in her 12th season as head women's basketball coach at the University of Iowa and her 28th year overall. Under her direction, the Hawkeyes have advanced to 10 postseason appearances (eight NCAA and two WNIT), including NCAA Tournament berths in each of the last four seasons. The dean of Big Ten coaches, Bluder has posted a 211-132 (.615) record at Iowa and her 27-year record stands at 567-274 (.674). Her 211 wins at Iowa are the second-most of any Hawkeye women's basketball coach, behind Hall of Famer C. Vivian Stringer (269 wins).

Bluder is a three-time Big Ten Coach of the Year (2001, 2008 and 2010) and two-time WBCA Regional Coach of the Year (2001 and 2008). She has guided Iowa to a winning record in 10 of her 11 years at Iowa, including eight upper-division finishes in the challenging Big Ten Conference. Bluder has led Iowa to six 20-win seasons in her 11 years, including the last four years in a row.

Bluder has coached numerous players to different awards in her 11 years in Iowa City. She has mentored 14 players to 31 all-Big Ten honors, including 10 first team picks, eight second, eight third and five honorable mention selections. She has also had two Big Ten Freshman of the Year award winners, a Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year recipient, four members of the Big Ten all-Freshman team and two players named to the Big Ten all-Defensive team, with Kachine Alexander earning the honor twice.

Four players during Bluder's tenure have earned a total of five Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) all-region team accolades and five players have earned a total of nine honorable mention All-America honors.

With Bluder on the Iowa sidelines, student-athletes have been named Academic all-Big Ten 48 times, including a program-best eight honorees in 2010-11. Additionally, Lindsey Meder was a two-time Academic all-American (2001 and 2002).

Bluder had one of her most successful seasons in 2010-11, leading Iowa to a 22-9 overall record and a third place finish in the Big Ten at 10-6. Iowa's overall win/loss record in 2010-11 was the best for an Iowa team since the 1995-96 campaign. The Hawkeyes were nationally ranked for 14 weeks during the season, reaching No. 14 in the Associated Press Poll and No. 13 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll. Iowa received an at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament for the fourth-straight season.

In 2009-10, Bluder led one of the youngest teams in the country to a third place finish in the Big Ten and a berth in the championship game of the Big Ten Tournament. The Hawkeyes received an at-large berth into the NCAA Tournament, where they knocked off Rutgers in the first round before falling to eventual national runner-up and No. 2 ranked Stanford. Iowa finished the 2009-10 season with a 20-14 record, including a 10-8 mark in Big Ten play.

Bluder guided the Hawkeyes to back-to-back 21-11 overall records during the 2007-08 and 2008-09 seasons. Iowa won a share of the Big Ten regular season championship in 2008 and finished in a three-way tie for second in 2009. The Hawkeyes boasted a 26-5 home record, advanced to the Big Ten Tournament semifinals and appeared in the NCAA Tournament twice during the two-year stretch.

In 2005-06, Bluder guided a young and mostly inexperienced group of Hawkeyes to a 17-12 overall record and a fifth place finish in the Big Ten. Even with a season plagued by knee injuries, the Hawkeyes persevered with strong senior leadership talented play from its freshman class. Iowa received an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament.

Bluder mentored Iowa to a 23-10 overall record and advanced to the WNIT Final Four in 2004-05. The 23 victories are the most by a Bluder coached Iowa team and the most victories since the 1995-96 season. Iowa started the 2004-05 campaign 13-0 and were the last Division I undefeated team standing. Bluder navigated the Hawkeyes through a difficult schedule and ultimately finished the season ranked 38th in the RPI.

In 2003-04, Bluder and the Hawkeyes finished with a 16-13 record while playing the 14th most difficult schedule in the nation and tied for fourth in the league

with a 10-6 mark. In addition, eight of its 16 victories came on the road, making the most road wins by a Hawkeye team since the 1993-94 season.

Bluder helped her third Iowa team to another exciting run in the Big Ten Tournament and WNIT in 2002-03. The seventh-seeded Hawkeyes opened the league tournament with a win over Northwestern. In the quarterfinals, Iowa treated its fans to a thrilling upset over 13th-ranked and second-seeded Minnesota. The Hawkeyes opened postseason play with wins over Saint Louis and Marquette before falling to the Missouri Valley Conference co-champions Creighton Bluejays in the WNIT.

In 2001-02, Bluder coached the Hawkeyes to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive year and a fourth place finish in the Big Ten. Iowa finished with an 18-11 overall record and a 10-6 mark in league play.

In her first season with the Black and Gold, Bluder transformed a struggling program into a 21-game winner. Iowa received the Big Ten's automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament with a victory over Purdue to capture the 2001 Big Ten Tournament. Furthermore, the Hawkeyes advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament after receiving a No. 4 seed and finished the season ranked No. 16 in the final Associated Press poll. Competing in one of the most demanding conference in the country, Bluder directed the Hawkeyes to a 21-10 overall record, a second-place finish in the conference regular season and captured Iowa's second-ever Big Ten Tournament title. Iowa played the 16th toughest schedule in the country and finished the season ranked 18th in the RPI.

Eight former Hawkeyes under Bluder continued their playing careers professionally after graduation. Cara Consuegra, Lindsey Meder, Crystal Smith and Kachine Alexander all had stints in the WNBA. Smith, Alexander, Johanna Solverson, Kristi Smith and Megan Skouby and JoAnn Hamlin also played professionally in Europe.

Bluder compiled a 187-106 (.638) record at Drake in 10 seasons and a 169-36 (.824) record in six seasons at NAIA St. Ambrose University.

While on the Iowa sidelines, student-athletes have been named Academic all-Big Ten 48 times by a total of 25 different players. In 2004 and 2008, a team record eight student-athletes were named Academic all-Big Ten. Additionally, Lindsey Meder was a two-time Academic all-American (2001, 2002). Student-athletes who have played under Coach Bluder and completed their eligibility have a 100 percent job placement following their career, and all of them have earned their degrees.

A graduate of Linn-Mar High School in Marion, IA, Bluder was a three-year starter at Northern Iowa. She graduated from UNI in 1983 with a bachelor's degree in marketing. On Sept. 4, 2008, Bluder was inducted to the Linn-Mar Athletic Hall of Fame. She has also been inducted to the Northern Iowa and St. Ambrose Hall of Fame.

Bluder and her husband David have two daughters, Hannah (13) and Emma (10) and one son, David (8).

**JAN JENSEN, ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH**

Jan Jensen is in her 12th season with the Iowa Hawkeyes, her ninth as associate head coach. A nationally known presence on the recruiting scene, Jensen serves as the recruiting coordinator and also works with the post players. Jensen is in her 23rd season in women's college basketball as a player and coach.

The native of Kimbalton, IA, has helped guide Iowa to 10 postseason appearances, including eight NCAA Tournament berths. During her time at Iowa, the Hawkeyes won the 2001 Big Ten Tournament championship and the 2008 Big Ten regular season title. She has also helped

lead Iowa to eight first-division finishes in the Big Ten, including the last four seasons.

Jensen is integral in developing and maintaining top-level recruiting classes at Iowa. Jensen helped Iowa land the 11th best recruiting class in the country in 2011, according to ESPN HoopGurlz. In 2001, Jensen spearheaded Iowa's efforts in landing the eighth-best recruiting class in the nation according to the Blue Star Index. In 2008, Jensen and the Hawkeyes garnered the 33rd best recruiting class, according to ESPN HoopGurlz.

Jensen has recruited three McDonald's All-Americans to Iowa (Samantha Logic, Lindsay Richards and Johanna Solverson).

Under Jensen's tutelage, Hawkeye post players have received numerous honors. She has coached five players to a total of 10 all-Big Ten honors, including two first team selections. Megan Skouby was named the 2006 Big Ten Freshman of the Year and the 2008 Big Ten Sixth Player of the Year, while Jennie Lillis was a 2003 Kodak all-District selection. Skouby, along with Krista Vandeventer, were also invited to the U.S.A. Team Trials during their time at Iowa.

In 2009-10, Iowa's post players broke school records for rebounding and blocked shots. Morgan Johnson broke the school mark for single-season blocks, while the team broke the school record for single-season rebounding.

Before becoming a Hawkeye, Jensen also served as Coach Bluder's first assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Drake University. Her recruiting efforts were enough to land the Bulldogs two top 13 and two top 40 classes.

As a player, Jensen was one of the best Bluder ever coached at Drake. Her senior year, she led the nation in scoring with 29.6 ppg and was the Gateway Conference Most Valuable Player. That year, she was a Kodak Honorable Mention All-American, a member of the all-Gateway team and the GTE Academic All-American Player of the Year. Jensen was also Sports Illustrated's National Player of the Week. Jensen graduated from Drake in 1991 with a degree in Public Relations. She earned her Master's in Higher Education five years later.

**SHANNON GAGE, ASSISTANT COACH**

Shannon Gage is in her seventh year as an assistant coach, her fifth with the Iowa Hawkeyes.

Gage, who served as Director of Basketball Operations for the University of Iowa women's basketball program from 2003-05, rejoined the Hawkeye staff as an assistant coach in the summer of 2007 after serving as an assistant coach at the University of Michigan for two seasons (2005-07).

Gage provides a wide range of duties for the Iowa staff while playing a heavy role in the Hawkeyes' recruiting efforts. She assists with all aspects of conditioning and individual workouts. She also performs a number of scouting duties.

During her time at Iowa, Gage has helped coach six perimeter players to 13 all-Big Ten honors, including four first team selections and the 2010 Big Ten Freshman of the Year in Jaime Printy. She has also mentored two players that received all-district honors and two honorable mention All-Americans in Kachine Alexander and Jaime Printy.

The Hawkeyes have broken numerous school records during Gage's time at Iowa. In 2009-10, Iowa shattered both the single season and Big Ten record for three-pointers made and attempted and tied single season marks for assists, three-pointers made in a single game and free throw percentage. Individually, Kachine Alexander set new school records in free throws made and attempted in a single season, Kamille Wahlin tied the school record for three-pointers made and set a new mark for three-pointers attempted. Alexander also became the first player in school history, and just the fifth in Big Ten history, to collect 1,000 career points, 800 career rebounds and 300 career assists.

The native of Tulsa, OK, has performed a myriad of coaching duties at the collegiate level, including the coordination of summer camps, overseeing budgets, monitoring academics and providing support in recruiting.

Prior to appointment as Iowa Director of Basketball Operations in 2003, Gage enjoyed a successful stint professionally in fashion merchandise. The former Southwest Missouri State captain, however, returned to athletics with a desire to coach, having spent much of her life around basketball. Gage's father, Roy Gage, Sr. has been in coaching for more than 30 years, including 17 years of involvement in summer AAU programs for both boys and girls designed to increase collegiate exposure.

**JENNI FITZGERALD, ASSISTANT COACH**

Jenni Fitzgerald is in her 12th season as an assistant basketball coach at the University of Iowa. Fitzgerald is in her 25th season in women's college basketball as a player and coach.

The native of Long Grove, IA, has helped guide Iowa to 10 postseason appearances, including eight NCAA Tournament berths. During her time at Iowa, the Hawkeyes won the 2001 Big Ten Tournament championship and the 2008 Big Ten regular season title. She has also helped lead Iowa to eight first-division finishes in the Big Ten, including the last four seasons.

Fitzgerald is responsible for off campus recruiting and coaches the perimeter players for the Hawkeyes. She also handles most of the film breakdown, scouting and directs the summer basketball camps.

Under Fitzgerald's tutelage, Iowa's perimeter players have garnered numerous awards. She has coached 10 players to a total of 21 all-Big Ten honors, including seven first team selections and the 2010 Big Ten Freshman of the Year (Printy). She has also mentored four players that received all-district honors and three honorable mention All-Americans (Consuegra, Alexander and Printy).

The Hawkeyes have broken numerous school records during Fitzgerald's time at Iowa. In 2009-10, Iowa shattered both the single season and Big Ten record for three-pointers made and attempted and tied single season marks for assists, three-pointers made in a single game and free throw percentage. Individually, Wendy Ausdemore broke or tied seven school records in her four years at Iowa while Kristi Smith became the first Hawkeye ever to amass over 400 points and 100 assists in three seasons. In 2009-10, Kachine Alexander set new school records in free throws made and attempted in a single season, Kamille Wahlin tied the school record for three-pointers made and set a new mark for three-pointers attempted. Kachine Alexander also became the first player in school history, and just the fifth in Big Ten history, to collect 1,000 career points, 800 career rebounds and 300 career assists.

Fitzgerald is very familiar with both Lisa Bluder and fellow assistant Jan Jensen, both of whom she coached with for eight years at Drake University prior to coming to Iowa.

While at Drake, Fitzgerald worked with the guards, directed summer camps and handled the administrative duties for the Bulldog basketball program from 1993-2000.

From 1986-91, Fitzgerald was the starting point guard for the Drake Bulldogs. Fitzgerald graduated from Drake in 1990 with a bachelor's degree in business administration with a management major.

Fitzgerald is the daughter of Bob and Jan Fitzgerald. She has an older sister, Robin, and younger brother, Randy.

**ABBY EMMERT, DIR. OF BASKETBALL OPERATIONS**

Abby Emmert is in her third season as Director of Basketball Operations for the University of Iowa women's basketball program.

The Winterset, IA, native works closely with the Hawkeye basketball staff, helping coordinate and carry out day-to-day activities of the program. Emmert is responsible for arranging team travel and activities, supervising public service opportunities for the team and coordinating summer camps and training tables.

Emmert is also Iowa's chief scheduler, helping to build one of the most exciting and demanding schedules in the country for the Hawkeye program.

Emmert was a member of the Iowa women's basketball team from 2005-08. She was named team co-captain in 2008, and helped lead the Hawkeyes to a Big Ten regular season championship. Emmert also received the Dr. Christine Grant Leadership Award for women's basketball as a senior.

Emmert played in 123 career games as a Hawkeye, including 22 starts. Her 123 games played are the tied for the second-most of any player in Iowa women's basketball history.

She scored 299 career points, collected 144 rebounds and dished out 177 assists. She scored a career-high 17 points against Iowa State as a junior in 2006.

Emmert graduated with a Communications Studies degree from the University of Iowa in 2008, and worked for the United Way of East Central Iowa before taking over as Director of Basketball Operations.

THE SETTING

The Iowa Hawkeyes host the Mississippi Valley State Devilettes on Mediacom Court at Carver-Hawkeye Arena. Tipoff is scheduled for 5 p.m.

IOWA HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,079 games since beginning basketball in 1974. Iowa's overall record is 659-420 (.611). That includes a 329-165 (.666) mark in regular season Big Ten contests and a 314-90 (.777) mark in Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

SCOUTING MISSISSIPPI VALLEY STATE

The Mississippi Valley State Devilettes hold a 2-5 overall record.

The Devilettes are making their second trip to the state of Iowa this season. In its last game on Dec. 11, Mississippi Valley State was defeated by Iowa State in Ames, 77-47. Iowa State limited the Devilettes to a .271 (16-59) field goal percentage. Ka'Neshia Smith led the Devilettes with 11 points and nine rebounds, while Brittney Lakes added 10 points and five boards.

HAWKEYES DOWN DRAKE, 71-46

Iowa used a solid defense effort and a strong shooting night to defeat intra-state rival Drake, 71-46 Tuesday night inside Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

The Hawkeyes held Drake to just a .345 (20-58) field goal percentage, including a .240 (6-25) percentage in the first half. Iowa forced 22 turnovers and turned them into 18 points.

Iowa made its first five shots and six of its first seven to take an early 14-4 lead. The Hawkeyes led by as many as 27 points early in the second half.

Jaime Printy led Iowa with 16 points. Samantha Logic added 12 points, six rebounds and four assists.

CHARITY STRIPE SUCCESS

The Hawkeyes have cashed in from the free throw line so far this season.

Iowa is 194-236 from the charity stripe and their .822 free throw percentage ranks first in the Big Ten and ranked second-best in the NCAA entering the week.

Individually, Jaime Printy's .903 free throw percentage is second-best in the Big Ten and 27th-nationally entering the week.

JOHNSON NAMED BIG TEN PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Junior Morgan Johnson was named Big Ten Player of the Week after a career night at Bradley (Dec. 17).

Johnson notched new career highs in points (37), field goals made (13), free throws made (11) and free throws attempted (12). Her 37 points were also a Renaissance Coliseum record and are the most scored by any player in the Big Ten, so far, this season.

Johnson's 37 points were the most for an Iowa center since Megan Skouby netted 33 at Kansas in 2008. Skouby finished the game 10-17 from the field and 13-14 from the free throw line.

The award was Johnson's first Big Ten Player of the Week honor. She was named Big Ten Freshman of the Week once during her first season at Iowa.

WAHLIN LENDING A HELPING HAND

Kamille Wahlin has been unselfish in Iowa's last three games, while holding on to the ball.

Wahlin has a combined 14 assists to just four turnovers in Iowa's last two contests. She finished with five assists and zero turnovers against Western Illinois (Dec. 9) and followed with six assists and just two turnovers at Bradley (Dec. 17).

CONSISTENT STARTS

Two Hawkeyes have recorded consistent starts in certain statistical categories through 12 games this season.

- Junior Jaime Printy has scored at least 15 points in all but four games, including four 20 point performances.
- Freshman Samantha Logic has grabbed at least five rebounds and dished out at least four assists in eight of Iowa's 12 games.

DIXON HAS STRONG WEEK OFF THE BENCH

Freshman Melissa Dixon averaged 13 points and four rebounds in Iowa's two games at Iowa State (Dec. 7) and vs. Western Illinois (Dec. 9).

Dixon scored 11 points (4-7 FGs) and grabbed four rebounds in Iowa's game at Iowa State. She followed with 15 points and four rebounds against Western Illinois.

Dixon played a total of 39 minutes and did not commit a turnover.

LOGIC COLLECTS DOUBLE-DOUBLE

Freshman Samantha Logic scored 10 points and grabbed 11 rebounds at Northern Iowa (Nov. 19) for her first career double-double.

Logic's double-double was the first for an Iowa freshman since the 2009-10 season. Morgan Johnson had 16 points and 11 rebounds vs. Purdue (Jan. 31, 2010).

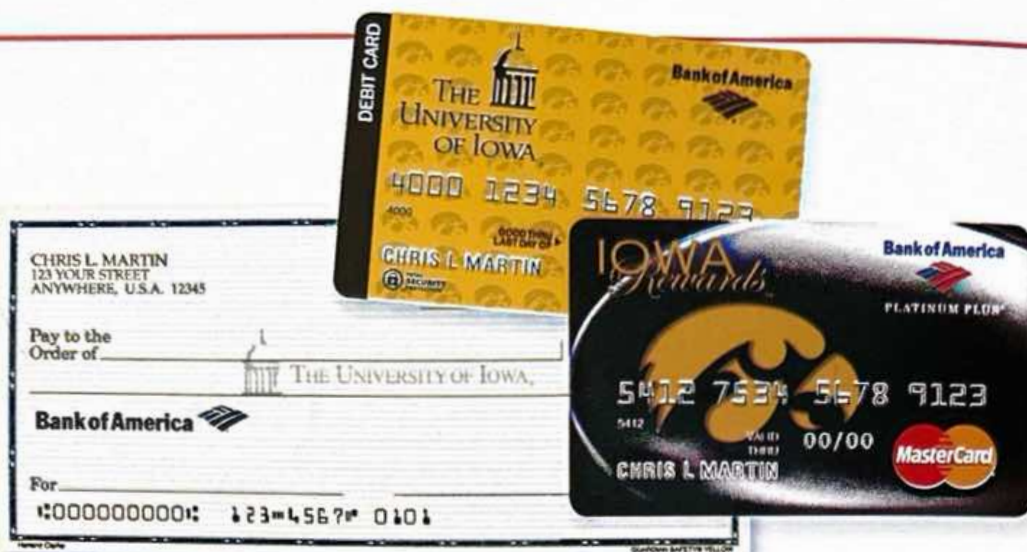
